



Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 1/3. 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 79-1 of the State of Texas issued September 5, 1978 (renewal application was submitted July 17, 1979 and is pending at this time) intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows: The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include 3 cm and 5 mc radar systems, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems. during the period from March 1 through





Cotton Samples Are Gaining In Abilene

Cotton sample receipts are gaining as expected, reports B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Harvesting is beginning in all areas of the Abilene area, and probably have reached a peak in and around the counties of Tom Green and Runnels. During the week ending October 19, 24,000 samples were classed at the Abilene office, bringing the season total to about 35,000.

Local cotton prices were unchanged during the week. Most cotton sold at 9 to 9½ cents over 1979 loan values. Grade 31, Staple 31 cotton miking 35 to 49 sold for about 55 to 56 cents per pound. Cottonseed prices paid producers at gins were mostly 115 dollars per ton.

Quality of cotton continued high, being very bright and clean, with

Grade 21 comprising 17 percent of the samples classed. Grade 31 comprised 58 percent and Grade 41 comprised 13 percent. Fiber length showed little change from a week ago with 32 the predominate staple at 49 percent. Other staple lengths were 31 at 35 percent, and 33 at 12

Mike readings were 88, percent in the 35 to 49 range; and 10 percent in lower ranges. About 2 percent miked in the high ranges above 50. About 5 percent of samples were reduced because of grass content. Fiber strength averaged around 89,000 pounds per square inch breaking strength.







Clay cookware revives in populatiry on the homefront. With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and

disadvantages. Advantages: Enthusiasts claim that the selfbasting action allows use of less-tender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds in the steam as well as the food juice. In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed--a plus for weight watchers.

Disadvantages: One disadvantage is the pots may stain. Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clean since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware. Also, sudden temperature changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.



Post Office Scheduled To Hold Survey

"Where have you been and where are you going"? United States Postal Service employees here will soon be asking every tenth customer that question to determine where its postal facilities might be better located.

In announcing vey, Postmaster Charles Thornton stated that postal units are often the secondary stop for postal customers and we want to make sure that our Post Offices are not off the beaten path. In the past, the major consideration in locating postal facilities was where we could get the cheapest land. This is the first time the Postal Service has asked our customers for their input said Postmaster Thornton.

The customer survey will begin October 29, and should be concluded by November 10.

the survey, which is being conducted in most major cities an dtheir metropolitan areas, will result in more convenient locations for new Post Office outlets in the future.

Results from the survey will be computerized. The computer will then analyze the shopping patterns of customers who use postal facilities and project the demand areas for the location of those facilities.
