Second Veteran Day Celebration Saturday

Fisher County residents are in the process of making final plans for the second annual Veteran's Day Parade and Celebration set for this Saturday, according to Ben Reaid, Rotan Chamber of Commerce President.

"We are expecting the largest downtown parade in the last 20 years in Rotan this Saturday with a multitude of floats, military equipment, and displays", said Reaid.

Those already making plans to enter floats in the parade include: Veteran's of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary, Calvary Baptist Church, Church of Christ, Rotan Seed Delinting

Company, Farm Bureau, Farm Tractor and Service, Hospital, Auxiliary Pink Ladies, Outstanding Citizens Float by the Newspaper Office, Rotan Fire Department, Double Mountain Seranaders, Eastern Star and Masonic Lodge, Western Auto, First National Bank, White Auto Store, Hinds Department Store, Landes Furniture, Rotan Band, and a POW Float.

Reaid said that a special float was being constructed to honor all former Prisoners of War and encouraged all POWs to contact his office and be prepared to ride on the float.

A flag raising ceremony is scheduled to begin the day long activities at 9:00 a.m. at the Rotan Football Field. The Rotan Boy Scout Troop, under the direction of Scoutmaster Jack Cadenhead, will raise the flag that will signal the start of the day's events.

The parade will start from the east end of the football field press box and follow the same route as it did last year, according to Reaid. All businesses and organizations entering floats are to assemble at the starting position at 9:30 a.m.

The parade will begin at 10:00 a.m. departing from the football field, circling

through the town and ending at the George Poe warehouse across from the Calvary Baptist Church.

At noon the Rotan Jaycees will begin serving bar-b-que plates to an expected 1,000 people. Jaycees are cooking 400 pounds of brisket, and serving pinto beans, cole slaw, bread, relish tray items, tea and coffee.

The Rotan Band will be performing in concert between noon and 1:00 p.m.

A total of 9 organizations will have bazaar booths set up in the George Poe warehouse, according to Jean McKinney, V.F.W. Auxiliary

coordinator. Those include the Rotan Booster Club, Pink Ladies, V.F.W. Auxiliary, Rotan Fire Department Auxiliary, Rotan Band, Rehabilitation Center, Lions Club and Cheerleaders from Rotan.

The Rotan Lions Club will be holding a silent auction on Saturday afternoon in connection with the Veteran's Day Celebration.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center Benefit Show will begin at 1:00 p.m. with seven hours of entertainment scheduled. Those attending are asked to bring folding chairs or lawn chairs.

\$4,000 Given To New Doctor's Clinic

The board of directors of the Fisher County Hospital District hosted a reception last Monday night concerning the construction of the new Fisher County

Doctor's Clinic for the hospital employees and members of the Fisher County Hospital Auxiliary.

The highlight of the meeting was the presentation of a check for \$4,000.00 by Jerry Krupka of Conoco Oil Company to the hospital district to be used to purchase equipment for the new clinic in memory of the McCaulley students that were killed in the bus wreck on December 8, 1978.

In making the presenta-

tion, Krupka said, "You people present tonight need to educate your neighbors so that if and when they get sick, they'll use the excellent medical facilities in Fisher County."

Administrator Perry Hunsaker reviewed the decisions by the board of directors to build the new Fisher County Clinic with the more than 50 people present. He told the group that the low occupancy rate at the hospital and the

declining oil evaluations were two of the factors taken into consideration in making the decision to build the new clinic.

Hunsaker said that at the end of 1977 the occupancy rate at the new Fisher County Hospital was only 43 percent. Steering Committee members anticipated that the rate of occupancy, based on occupancy at the Callan Hospital, would be in the vicinity of 55 to 60 percent, said Hunsaker. He also

pointed out that oil valuations and drastically dropped from 93 million at the Claytonville Field in 1974 to only 22 million in 1979.

In his talk, Hunsaker said that the recent hospital district wide tax-re-evaluation done by local people cost the district \$25,000, but that the lowest estimate received from a professional firm was \$80,000.

The administrator reviewed a patient origin

study with guests and was very complimentary of the excellent crew of doctors in Fisher County and the fine health care facilities available to the public.

Hunsaker said that Dr. V. Carandang patients have meant an added amount of revenue to the Fisher County Hospital District in 1979 along with \$111,000, while the total amount of funds spent on Dr. Carandang and the clinic only amounted to

\$19,200.00. "This is exactly why we've got to build a new clinic", said the administrator.

He said that the payments on the clinic building would be approximately \$18,000 a year, adding that one doctor in one month will make the yearly payment, so the clinic will not only be self supporting but will be a definite financial asset to the hospital district.

He urged the town to "get behind us and work with us in attempting to provide the finest in medical care for the residents of Fisher County".

The administrator also announced to the group that Dr. V. Carandang would be taking on a partner when he moves into the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic.

Dr. Carandang will team up with Dr. Simpiao, currently practicing in Turtle Lake, North Dakota. Dr. Simpiao, like Dr. Carandang, is originally from the Philippines.

Hunsaker closed the meeting by telling the group that "We're going to have an active campaign to recruit additional doctors for Fisher County". He haven't had a place to offer them to practice, but when the new Doctor's Clinic is finished--we'll be able to make some offers to some qualified doctors" he concluded.

Hospital District Board member Glen Copeland presented a plaque of appreciation to Betty Carter, president of the Fisher County Hospital Auxiliary for the dedicated work

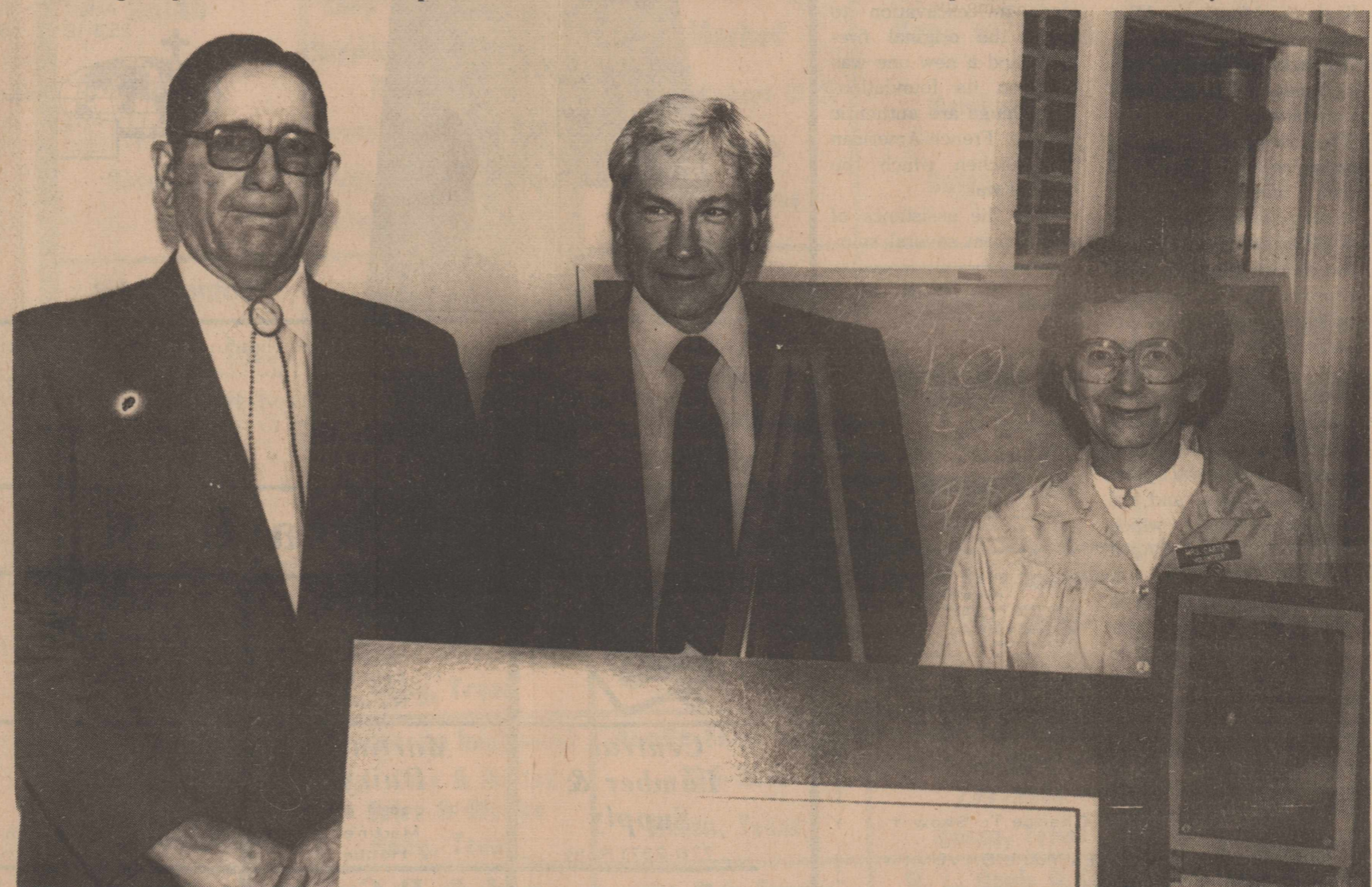

DRT's Attend Annual Meeting

The Col. John H. Moore Chapter, Daughters of the Republic of Texas, hosted the District X Annual Meeting in Snyder's County Club. Mrs. Gene L. Dulaney, Mrs. Bill Line and Mrs. Lawson Stiff were arrangements chairmen.

For the reception on the evening preceding the Saturday meeting, Mrs. Dulaney was hostess. The room was decorated with red, white and blue floral center piece with smaller arrangements on each table. While guests enjoyed punch and party sandwiches, State Officials and members present used the time to get acquainted and to share problems and experiences in the Society's work.

The morning meeting held next day began with coffee, fresh fruit bowls, and doughnuts. During this social hour guests were registered.

For the meeting, Mrs. Jimmy Hale presided. Mrs. Hale was the local chapter's first president and is presently serving the Texas Society as District Ten Representative. Mrs. Ben M. Harris, Plainview, Chaplain General, voiced the opening prayer; Mrs. Dulaney led the group in the pledges to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Texas Flag.

Following the regular

rituals, Mrs. Hale introduced the President General, Mrs. G.F. Hollis of Cold Springs, who spoke to the group on The French Legation. She stated that the building now known as the French Legation was built by Pierre Jean Isadore Alphonse Dubois de Salingy, a secretary in the French Embassy in Washington, D.C.

Tradition says that he was in love with an American heiress and hoped to further his suit by investigating the new Republic for the French Government. He sent several reports to France, the last so enthusiastic that it brought about a French-Texas Treaty in 1839 signed by King Louis Philippe, the Texas Senate and President Lamar. The original of this treaty is in the Texas Archives, beautifully bound in blue velvet.

For his reward Salingy was made Charge de Affaires of the new mission. On his second trip to Texas he presented his credentials to President Lamar in Austin in December 1839. The famous pig incident caused him to leave Texas in a huff, but he returned in 1842 at the request of President Houston.

Perhaps Salingy wanted to impress the Texans by

building a prestigious house in Austin. Salingy did not have the funds to complete the house, so he sold it to Bishop Odin of the Catholic Church for the sum of 32,550 francs.

Although the house has been called an embassy, it was never the property of France. A drawing of the house was found in the State Archives. It was made in 1850 and Legation de France can be seen clearly across the railing.

Bishop Odin had hoped to use the building to house a fine frontier school but was not able to persuade Mother Superior to undertake the task. So the property was sold to Moseley Baker in 1847 at a heavy loss.

In the meantime Albert Sidney Burleson had negotiated with Bishop Odin's agent and though he had purchased the house; so moved in only to learn of its sale to Baker. So Burleson moved out taking with him the parlor sofa, a pair of love seats and the place-chair. In 1917 Miss Emma Burleson gave the sofa to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. In 1935 she gave the other pieces to the Governor's Mansion. The arm-chair and other place-chairs were left in the house and passed on to the Robertson family. Moseley Baker sold the house to Dr. Joseph Robertson on May 16, 1848. The Robertson family lived in the house from 1848 until World War II when Miss Lizzie Robertson closed the house during the war.

The French Legation was purchased by the State of Texas May 31, 1945 out of the remaining Centennial Funds which had been given the state by the United States. The State placed the Legation in the hands of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. It has been restored and opened to the public.

Restoration had been done carefully and thoroughly. The kitchen and carriage house long since disappeared; Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Beretta contributed funds to reconstruct the kitchen, the Texas Archaeological Department made an excavation to locate the original fireplace and a new one was built on its foundation. Furnishings are authentic for the French-American type kitchen which the original was.

With the assistance of grants from several sources,

Mrs. George P. Red, President General, 1973-75, was able to reconstruct the Carriage House on the grounds.

Mrs. Hollis illustrated her talk with color slides of the buildings and the interior rooms of the home. She further stated that as President General for the present term, she plans to make the repairs needed to keep the 139 year old building in good condition. It needs painting, some columns need repair, ceilings need repair, the air conditioning unit needs to be moved from the attic to the exterior of the building, etc. She requests chapters to contribute to the cost of the repairs.

Following Mrs. Hollis' report on the Legation, other State Officer made reports; Mrs. B.F. McKinney, Waco, First Vice President General, gave a brief report on the Alamo and its contents; Mrs. Albert Smith, Stephenville, stated that one new chapter had been organized during the year.

Mrs. Harlee, Third Vice President, congratulated the local chapter on its plans to organize a Chapter of Children of the Republic of Texas; other officers made brief reports giving instructions to chapters on the importance of the various phases of the work of the Society.

The meeting adjourned at eleven thirty a.m. to convene again at twelve for lunch.

Service Officer, served as host for the meeting. Dr. Duane Hood, Dean of Student Services and Registrar at WTC, welcomed the workshop participants.

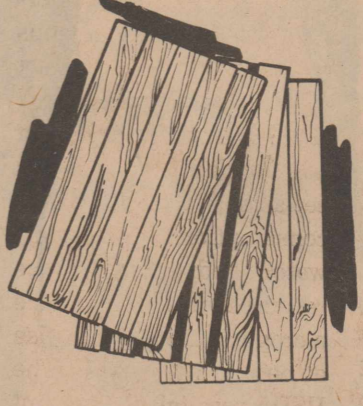
Letter To Editor

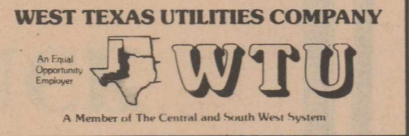

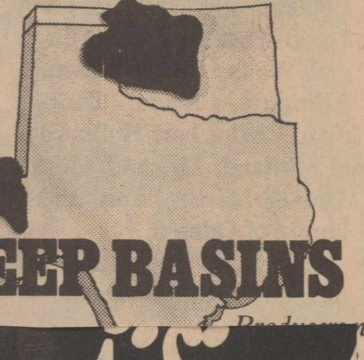

Orange Crush Muscles 8th Season Win Against Albany, Gary Harkey Shines

The Rotan Yellowhammers scored four times last Friday night to beat the Albany Lions while amassing a total of 401 yards to the Lions' 235 yards on offense. Rotan had 22 first downs to 12 for Albany with quarterback Byron Weathersbee completing 6 of 14 passes for 107 yards to Albany's 8 of 12 for 74 yards.

The Yellowhammers took the opening kickoff and marched 79 yards to take a 7-0 lead. Julio Carrillo snagged the kickoff at the 25 yard line and returned it to the 41 before being tackled. Runs by Byron Weathersbee, Mark Nowlin, Kieth Mullins and a 12 yard pass to David Thornton set up a 4 yard run by Kip Pease for the score. The extra point kick by David Thornton gave the Rotan eleven a 7-0 lead with 8:24 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Lions picked up 4 first downs on their first possession but their opening drive failed when they ran on 4-15. Dale Cox, Gary Don Harkey, Bob McArthur, Willie Hayes, Mark Nowlin, Mike Morrow and Julio Carrillo had key tackles in the first Rotan defensive stand.

Rotan ran 12 plays on their second possession with the biggest ground gainer a 32 yard screen pass from Weathersbee to Pease that set up a 1-10 from the Albany 15 yard line. The drive died with a 4th and 6 from the 11 yard line giving the Lions the ball at their own 10 yard line.

Albany's second posses-

sion was short lived with Bob McArthur blitzing to kill one drive and Willie Hayes and Alva West teaming up on a third down play to hit the ball carrier behind the line of scrimmage.

Albany punted to Rotan but a fumbled handoff between Mullins and Weathersbee gave Albany another shot on offense.

With 6:26 left in the first half, Rotan's Weathersbee took off on a 5 yard dash around left end for the second score of the night. Nowlin opened the drive with a 24 yard gainer, Mullins picked up 17 yards and Pease had a sweep from the 18 yard line to the 5 yard line setting up the score. Thornton's extra point gave Rotan a 14-0 lead.

Albany's deepest penetration came on their next drive when they had a first down, 10 yards needed for a score. They took seven cracks at scoring and failed on 4th down and 1 foot needed for a touchdown. Harkey, Morrow, Sepeda, Jeff Posey, Bob McArthur make key defensive plays to keep the Lions from getting on the scoreboard.

In the opening seconds of the second half, Gary Don Harkey intercepted a Lion pass setting up Rotan's third score of the night. Mark Nowlin carried the ball over the white stripe from 1 yard out and Thornton kicked the extra point giving Rotan a 21-0 lead with 5:48 left in the third quarter.

Eli Sepeda intercepted a pass on Albany's next

possession but the drive was killed with a Rotan fumble.

The final Rotan score came in the 4th quarter when Weathersbee hit

Daivid Thornton with a pass from the 25 yard line. Ruben Cabrera kicked the extra point to close out the scoring at 28 points for the Hammers.

Rotan's closing offensive drive saw a score by Cecil Turner called back for a rules infraction. Turner ran 30 yards for the score. Mark Harris picked

up 19 yards on 5 carries in the game ending drive.

Mark Nowlin and Kieth Mullins were the leading ground gainers against Albany. Each carried 11 times for 75 yards. Pease had 8 carries for 64 yards with Weathersbee picking up 39 yards on 6 carries.

The Rotan Yellowhammers have scored 244 points to their opponents' 41 points through 8 games of the 1979 season. In district, Rotan has scored 86 points and only yielded 9 points to opponents.

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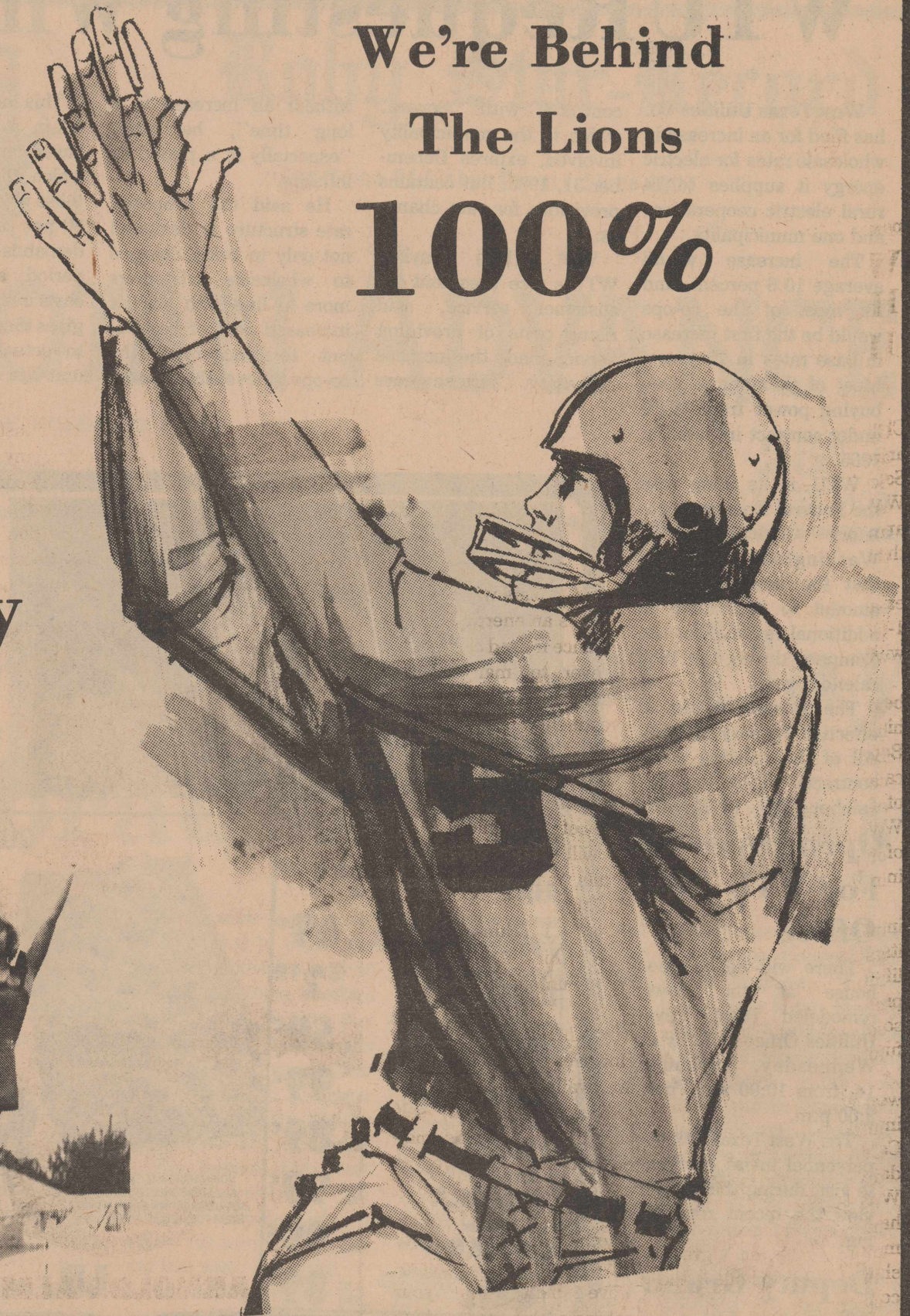

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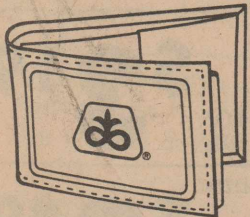
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
