Rotan Council Gives Lone Star Gas Service Hike, Mayor Appoints

The members of the Rotan City Council granted Lone Star Gas Company a new schedule of service charges at their last meeting on November 13, according to City Secretary Kenneth Vann.

The new charges, to go into effect on December

20, include increasing re-connect charges to \$20.00; increasing appliance service call charges to \$18.00 an hour; air conditioner service charges to \$20.00 an hour; returned check charge to \$5.00; dis-connect or re-connect for customer line

repair to \$40.00.

and Ranchers Radio Transmission, Inc., allowing them to install an antenna on the tower east of town and allowing them to install a base station in the radio equipment house.

The city council members listened to a police report by Chief Gene Pack that included a report that Patrolman Ron Jones has issued his letter of resignation effective on November 24.

Mayor Lester Sescil re-appointed Glen Holt and Carlton Burrow as members to the Rotan Housing Authority Board of Directors. Their terms are to expire on June 9, 1981. A new member was appointed to fill a vacancy

left by Wayne Harris. Virginia (Dude) Woodson was named to a 1981 term. Other board members with terms expiring in 1980 include Blair Berry and Essie Pearson.

The council voted to give the Rotan Community Center \$200.00 to replace and repair inside Christmas lights.

Council members voted to extend the 3 percent tax discount through December 30th, Vann indicated that he thought the tax notices would be in the mail by the first week in December.

In other action, the City of Rotan entered into a contract with the law firm of Perdue, Branon, Blair, Shiever and Fielder of Fort

Worth to collect past due taxes due the City of Rotan. According to Vann, approximately \$39,000 in past due taxes dating back as far as 1939 remain on the city books.

The council passed a resolution limiting the establishment of private clubs that sell alcoholic beverages to 300 feet from any residence, business, church or public building.

The council made the final bond payment on the 1963 series street and paving bonds of \$10,000. The original issue was for \$90,000. Vann indicated that the only remaining bond payments due by the City of Rotan are \$20,000 in sewer and water improvement bonds.

Bland In Abilene Rodeo

Hogs may be supplying the pork on the table at the John Bland house—but as far as supplying the bread, potatoes, etc.—they are not.

Bland, an employee and partner of Big 3 Pork Producers, McCaulley, has plans to remedy the situation. Maybe the Blands will even get turkey for Thanksgiving.

Bland is a professional rodeo cowboy, who now rodeo only part-time due to family and job commitments. He will be participating in the Lone Star Circuit Finals Rodeo in Abilene November 22-25.

Rodeo is not just a hobby to Bland. It has been his livelihood since the tender age of eight. It is a business to him, just as the "hog farm".

Bland started competing in junior rodeos, winning numerous buckles, saddles and trophies.

He attended Tarleton

State University and was a member of the college rodeo team. Bland was the Southwestern Regional bull riding champion his freshman year.

Bland decided to give the professional rodeo circuit a try. He became a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) in 1971.

After many miles and numerous rodeos (average 125 a year), Bland qualified for his first National Finals Rodeo (NFR), held in Oklahoma City in 1976.

He was to make a repeat performance in 1977. Bland ended up sixth for the year winning \$23,000.

Bland failed to qualify for the 1978 and the 1979 NFR. He did qualify for the Circuit Finals in 1978 and this year.

The Circuit Finals are comprised of the top 15 cowboys and cowgirls in Texas. The top 15 are determined by points

made by competing in PRCA rodeos held in Texas.

Bland is currently in ninth position in bull riding. He will be vying for \$3500 which is put up in each event plus the entry fees of a hundred dollars.

Mrs. Floyd mentioned being prepared to give the doctor information about your illness or any past illness that might relate to it. A list of notes will prevent forgetting to men-

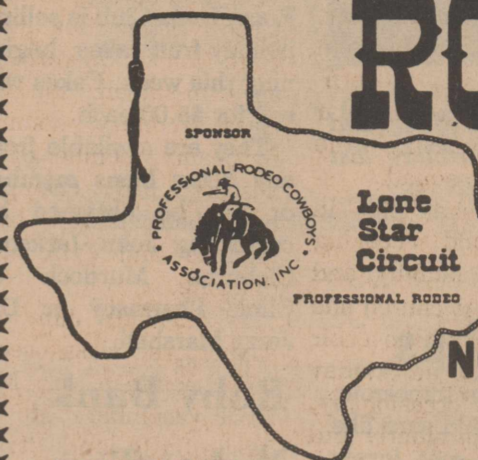
tion things the doctor will need to know. Feel free to ask questions, understand the drugs you are given when to take and any side effects.

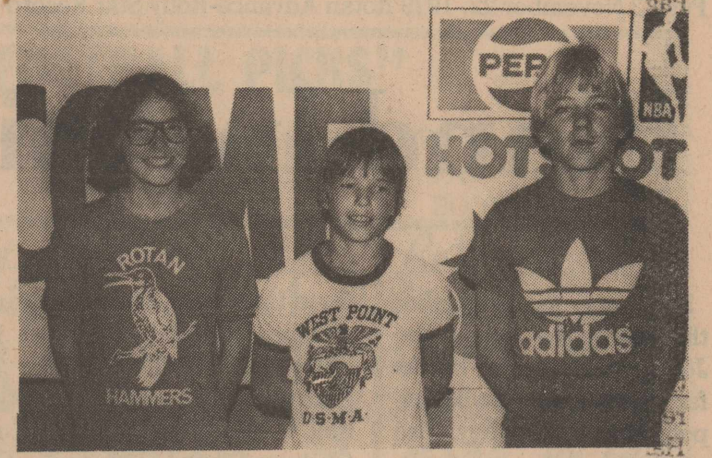

These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association.

Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

protect the wound from insect and disease invasion and moisture loss.

As important as seasonal pruning is, it's even more important to prune when needed. Prune and repair damaged plants as soon as possible. And, always prune after transplanting, particularly with balled and bare rooted plants. Pruning will compensate for roots the plant lost in the digging.

Pruning is perhaps the least understood and most abused of all the many chores a gardener may tackle. When pruning, have a purpose in mind and do the job right.

Look for feta cheese, a popular ingredient in Greek dishes, in some grocery stores, gourmet shops and delicatessens. It is a crumbly, white cheese made from goat's milk and stored in salt brine. It is low fat and comes in mild, regular and sharp varieties says a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

As the dormant season for many plants approaches, home gardeners should review proper pruning techniques before manning pruning shears and saws.

Improper pruning can result in poor growth, unnatural plant forms, poor flower and fruit production, and occasionally even death of the plant.

Following basic guidelines for pruning can transform a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen.

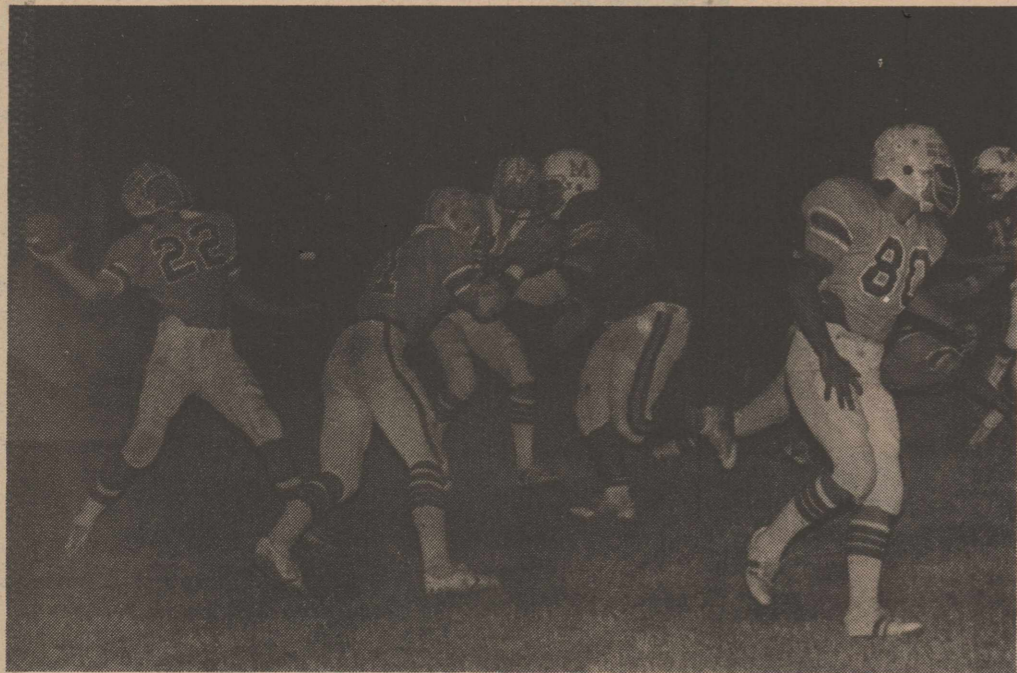
To begin, have a reason for pruning. Consider technique, season of the year and the need for pruning before taking that first snip. Many times there is no reason at all for pruning if the tree is hale and hearty.

The dormant season of November through January may not necessarily be the best time to prune every plant on your landscape. Deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers, and evergreens probably can be pruned at this time of year. However, exceptions include spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias, which should be pruned after they flower. Do not prune roses until mid-February.

Using proper tools is important for safety and adequate cutting. Use hand shears for small twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are best for branches one-half to one inch in size. Larger branches require a pruning saw. A long-handled pole pruner or saw is necessary for cutting higher branches.

May cuts flush with the trunk since stubs do not heal properly. As years pass stubs decay and the deterioration spreads down the trunk until the tree falls over.

Seal cuts more than two inches in diameter with a pruning paint sealer. The sealer will dry hard and

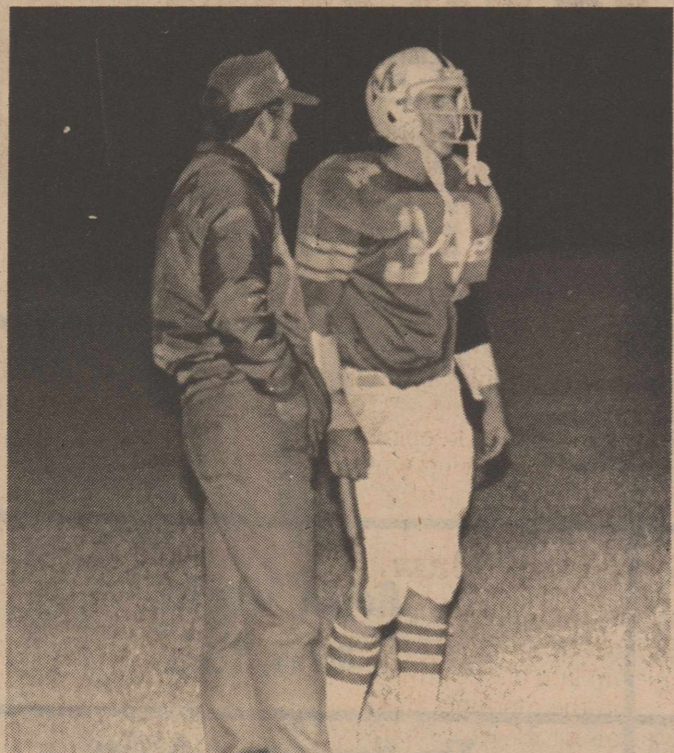

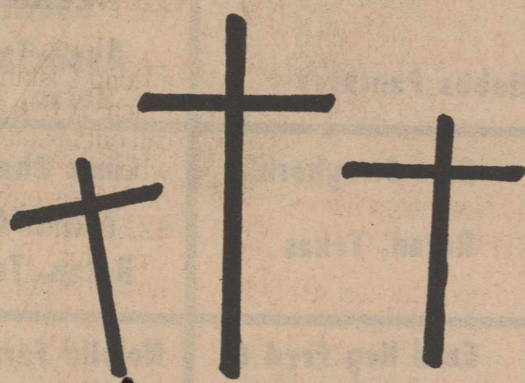

Parking At Sweetwater Is Problem

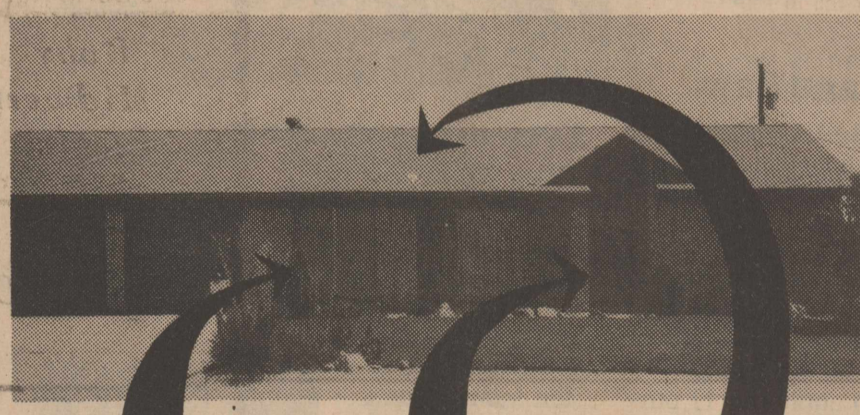

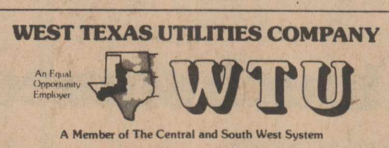

The Social Security Administration has available several services which aid in cutting energy costs and offer convenience to its beneficiaries, according to Glyn Hammons, District Manager of the Abilene District.

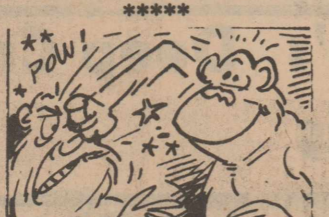
Teleservice is an important aspect of Social Security's services. Many claims can be processed from start to finish by a phone contact with a Social Security representative. Once the claim is taken the forms and proofs necessary for completion of the file can be mailed to the office. A person can file for retirement, disability, survivors, Supplemental Security Income or Medicare payments at his convenience from the comfort of his own home.

In addition to claims processing by telephone, answers to general inquiries, information regarding benefit amounts; answers to questions about both Social Security and Supplemental Security Income checks; and inquires about Medicare coverage and Medicare claims can usually be resolved by a simple phone call to the local Social Security office. Most people can quickly and easily conduct their Social Security business by telephone without leaving the comfort and convenience of their home and without the expenses for gasoline to travel to and from a Social Security Office.

In many areas of the country, there are toll free numbers available for Social Security. Check the local phone directory for this service.

Another improvement service available to Social Security beneficiaries is direct deposit of their

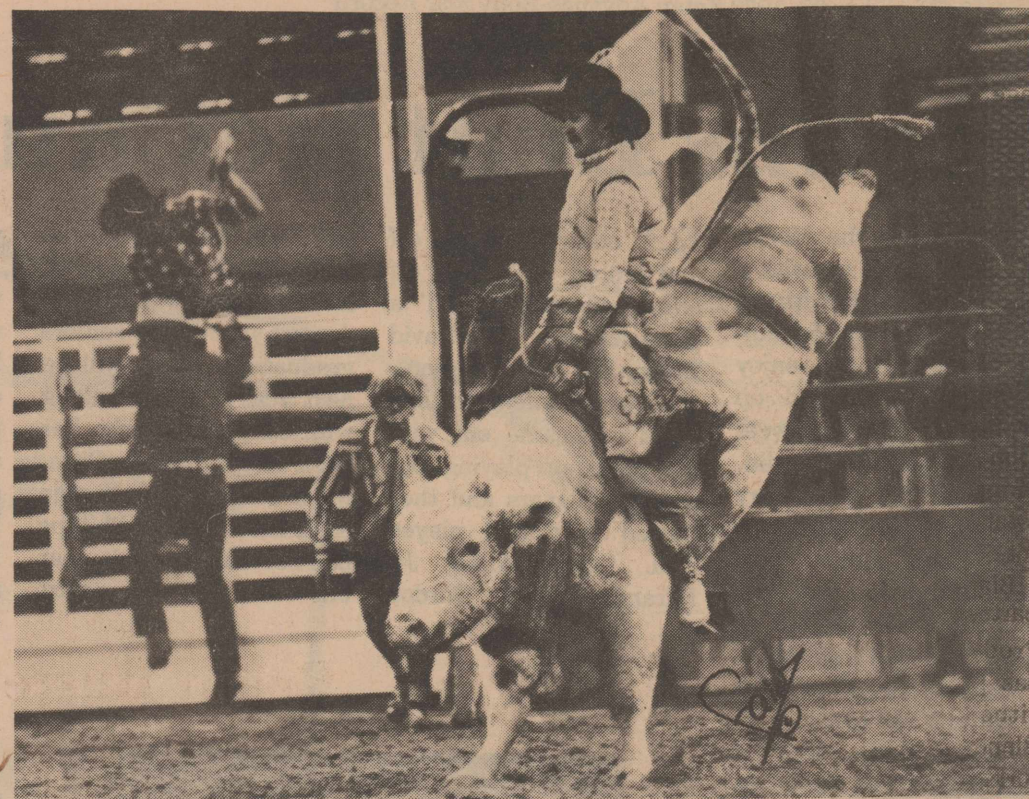

County Gins Record Over 32,000 Bales

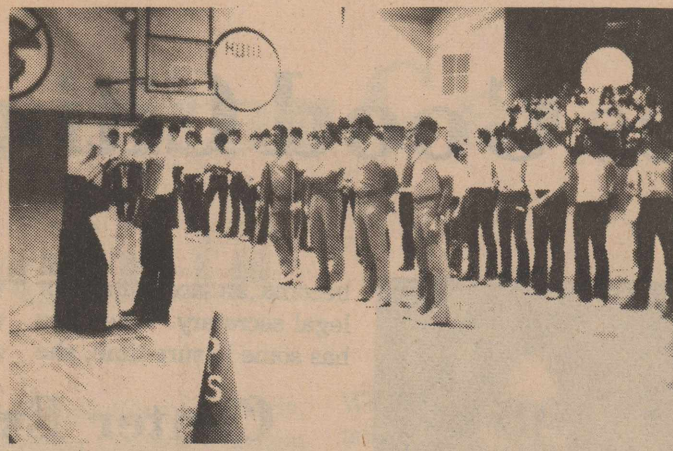

Rotan Gin leads Fisher County gins in 1979 production with 8,338 bales. In second place is Hobbs Gin with 6,400 bales. The Farmers Gin at Rotan has ginned 4,956; Farmers Union Co-op Gin in Roby, 4,823; Terry Gin, 3,620; Longworth Gin, 2,600 and Sylvester Gin, 1,400 bales.
