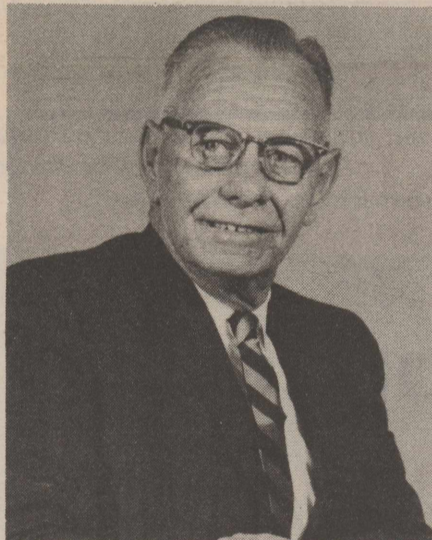
Services held recently for retired postmaster, Jack Hayes

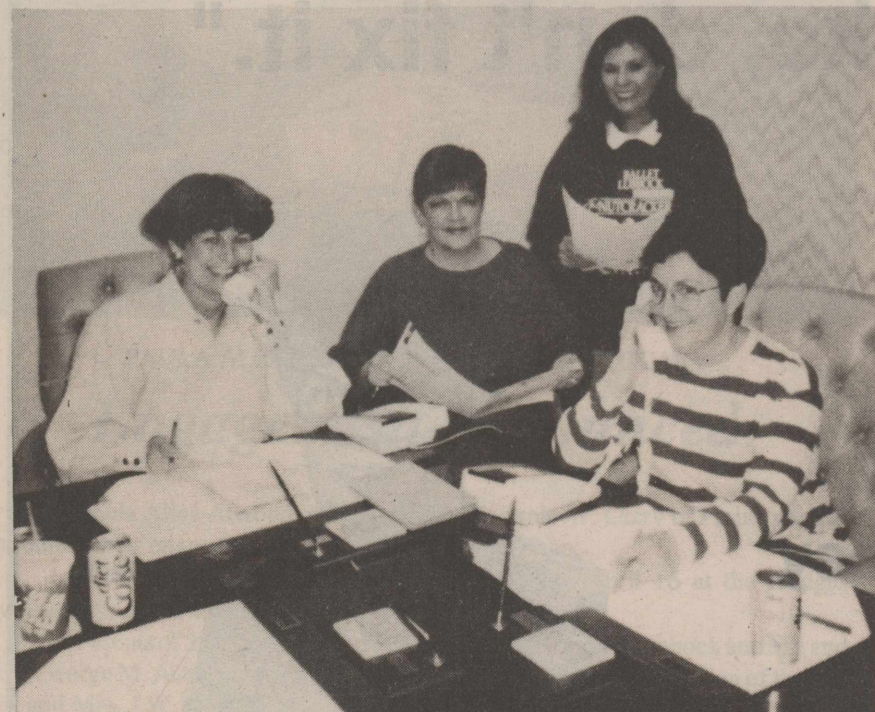

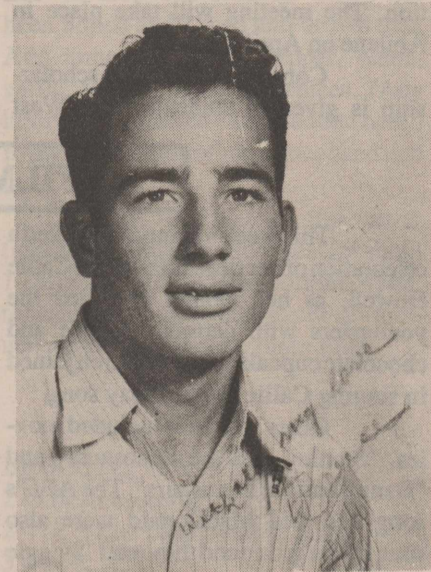

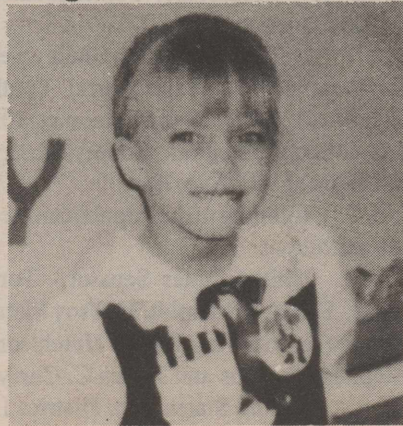
FILMTIME

LEWIS SPECIAL

1 lb ground beef, browned
Add and heat:
4 cans Ranch Style Beans
1 lb smoked sausage
1 sm can green chilies
1 can stewed tomatoes
4 T barbecue sauce
Add to taste:
Worcestershire sauce
garlic powder

JAMBALAYA

1 large fish filet
1 ring Polish sausage
4 chicken breasts
2 cans Cajun style stewed tomatoes
3 cans water
1 large bell pepper, chopped
1 large onion, chopped
1 can tomato paste
2 cloves chopped garlic
1 T basil
1 t salt, pepper to taste
1 t cayenne pepper
1 c raw rice

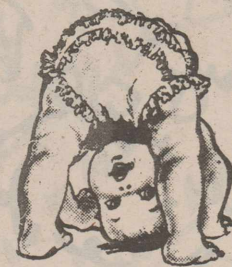
Cut sausage into small pieces into heavy three quart Dutch oven. Brown, then add chicken which has been boned and cubed and brown that. Add tomatoes, water, pepper, onion, garlic, tomato paste and spices. (Any leftover vegetables can be added here.) Bring to boil and sprinkle uncooked rice in.

Lay fish filet on top, cover tightly and simmer on low heat for about 10 minutes. Stir up from bottom of pan, replace cover and cook about 25 minutes more, stirring one more time.

BROCCOLI CHOWDER

2 lb fresh broccoli
2 - 12 1/2 oz cans chicken broth
3 c milk
1 c chopped cooked ham
2 t salt
1/4 t pepper
1 c light cream
1/2 lb swiss cheese, grated
1/4 c butter

Place the broccoli in a large kettle and add one can chicken broth. Bring to a boil and reduce heat. Cover and simmer for about seven minutes or until just tender. Remove broccoli and broth and cool. Chop coarsely. Add remaining chicken broth, milk, ham, salt and pepper to broth in kettle. Bring to a boil over medium heat. Stir occasionally. Add remaining ingredients and broccoli. Heat to serving temperature. About 2 1/2 quarts.



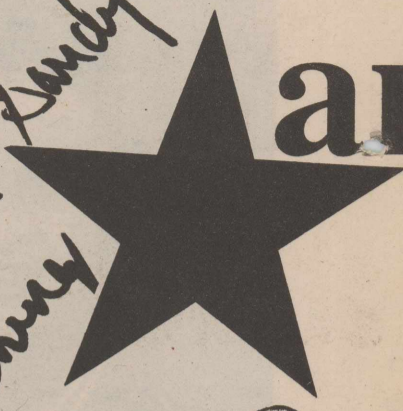
Who's New

Sandy Land UWCD receives \$800,000 Ag loan to help farmers


In January, the Texas Water Commission Development Board (TWDB) approved an \$800,000 Agricultural Water Conservation loan to the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District located in Plains.

The District will use the funds to make loans to area farmers and ranchers to purchase and install more efficient water conservation equipment. The District's loans will carry an interest rate of up to 4.8 percent with a five to seven-year term. The District will lend up to 80 percent of the value of the equipment.

The low interest rate resulted from the TWDB securing \$2 million in U.S. Department of Energy Oil Overcharge Funds provided through a grant

from the state's General Services Commission. The funds were used to buy down the interest rate by two percent on a \$7 million block of Agricultural Water Conservation bonds sold by the TWDB on Feb. 2 for loans to this and other underground water conservation districts.

The Sandy Land Underground Water District includes all of Yoakum County covering approximately 531,200 square miles in northwest Texas. Approximately 211,200 acres of the District are farmland of which 95,000 acres are irrigated. Cotton, wheat and milo are the principal crops grown; but peanuts, sunflowers, vegetables and hay have also been grown successfully using irrigation.

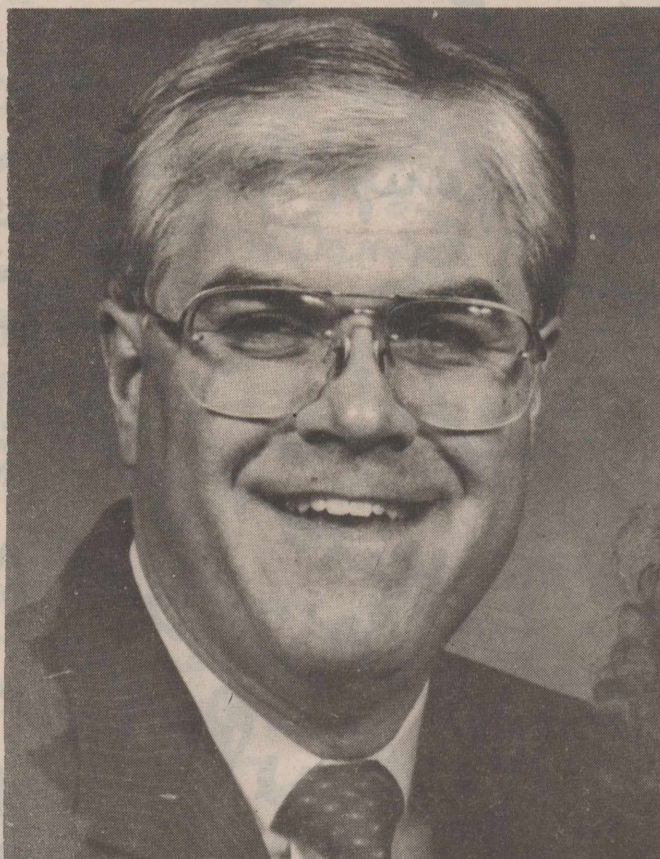

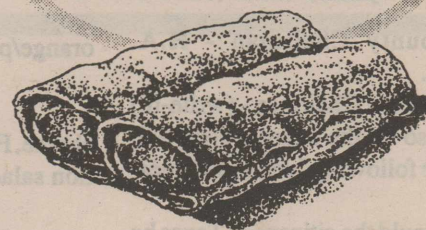
