

Local citizens will identify needs of Yoakum County

In an effort to serve the needs of Texas citizens, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service conducts a long-range planning process about every five years. During the months of March and April, County Extension Agents will meet with citizen groups from every county in Texas to identify the most compelling needs of Texas citizens and their communities.

Discussion will be focused on issues that relate to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's statewide goals:

* issues affecting the health, safety, productivity and well-being of people;

* issues affecting the stewardship of the environment and the natural resources of the county and Texas;

* issues affecting economic competitiveness, viability and stability in the county:

* issues important to the develop-

ment of life skills and leadership qualities in youth and adults.

Approximately 90 Yoakum County citizens representing diverse groups have been asked to serve on committees to discuss these issues. However, anyone who is interested in attending is invited to come and observe the decision making process.

Yoakum County Extension Agents, Joan Chandler and Terry Millican, along with the Yoakum County Extension Program Council will summarize the issues and select the priorities that can be addressed through Extension programming. This summary will be written and will be obtainable in October of 1994.

The meeting will be held on Tuesday, Mar. 29 at the Denver City Community Center. It will begin at 6:30 p.m. Anyone who plans to attend should call the Yoakum County Extension Office at 456-2263 to register.

Harry Neil Parks services held in First Baptist Church


Henry Neil Parks, 82, resident of Plains since 1954, died Wednesday, Mar. 9, 1994, at South Plains Nursing Center in Brownfield. Services were held Friday, Mar. 11 at First Baptist Church, Plains, with the Rev. Bill Wright, pastor, officiating. The Rev. Rick Doyle, pastor of First United Methodist Church, assisted. Interment was in Plains Cemetery under the direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

Special music for the service was presented by granddaughters, Carissa Parks, Kristi Swinnea, Karen McMinn and Kemi Cobb. Piano accompaniment was offered by a niece, Melba Blair.

He was born Jan. 31, 1912, in Parker County, the son of Charlie and Lela Campbell Parks. He was educated in Parker County, graduating from Peaster High School in 1932 as valedictorian of his class. He married his high school sweetheart, Mary Lou Wolfenberger, Dec. 24, 1935 in Weatherford.

He was a welder at the Naval Shipyards during WWII in Norfolk, VA. While living in Weatherford, he owned and operated Parks Welding and was a teacher of welding in Parker County and Dallas. He was an industrial welder at Plains until retiring in 1979.

He served as pastor of Antioch Baptist Church several years and also interim pastor at one time for First Baptist Church of Plains. He was a member of First Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

A farmer and rancher, he was a member of First Baptist Church in Plains.

He is survived by his wife and a number of nieces and nephews.



Services held for area pioneer

Services for Ethel Alexander were held Wednesday, Mar. 16, 1994 at 10:30 a.m. in First Presbyterian Church in Brownfield with the Rev. Robert Fortney, pastor, officiating. She was 96 years old.

Special music was offered by Steve and Carolyn Brown of Brownfield and by her granddaughter, Beth Gwinn and husband Steve of Levelland. They sang "Glory to God" and "It is Well with My Soul". Sarah Rozaen played the piano and Leonard Ellington played the organ.

Burial was in Terry County Memorial Cemetery under the direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

Mrs. Alexander was born Christmas Eve, 1897 in Clark, SD to Annie and William Harris. Her parents, of Norwegian and English ancestry, came to Texas following a drought and blizzard in South Dakota, when a friend who had previously moved to Texas, had told them how beautiful the land was and of the excellent opportunities here. Ethel and sister, Eva drove a team and wagon to the Texas area, along with her family's move. There were three girls, Ethel, Eva and Fern; and four boys, Clyde, Lynn, Roy and Glenn.

Ethel attended Harris School and college at West Texas. She was a teacher for a number of years, serving Turner, Harris and Tokio Schools.

Married to the late George R. Alexander on Oct. 23, 1921, he preceded her in death Oct. 20, 1969.

Mr. and Mrs. Alexander were farmers and ranchers. Ethel continued to take care of her ranching duties, along with son, Carleton, following her husband's death, and was able to ride a horse until she was 80 years old. She was a member of First Presbyterian Church.

Interested in her heritage and community, Mrs. Alexander wrote a document depicting "Harris Community History" and it is on file at the Yoakum County Library in Plains.

Survivors include three sons, Dean of LaFeria, Gerald of New Braunfels and Carleton of Brownfield; a daughter, Jo Ann Price of Levelland; seven grandchildren; 29 great-grandchildren; one great-great-grandchild; and two sisters, Eva Ellington of Naithrop, Colo. and Fern Pray of Tulsa, Okla.
