

# School Board Trustees introduce new principals

Plains ISD Board of Education is proud to introduce the new principals for Plains ISD for the 1994-95 school year. The principals have been visiting in Plains this week and will officially report for duty on July 1. Steven O'Quinn will be working in the high school building; Ronnie Watkins with Middle School; and Joel Haragan, elementary.

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Mr. Steven O'Quinn was hired as the high school principal. Forty-years old, he is a native of Humble, with 18 years experience in education; nine as a classroom teacher and nine as an administrator. He is currently the principal of Wink Junior-Senior High School, where he has held that position since 1991.

Married to Rennetta D. O'Quinn, the couple are parents of two children, a daughter, Annaliesa, 10 years old and a fourth grade student; and a six year old son, Blake, who is in kindergarten.

O'Quinn is a graduate of Humble High School, and received a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in 1976 from Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. He earned his Master of Education degree in 1979 from Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches.

He began his administrative career at Pauline G. Hughes Junior High School in the Burleson ISD in 1985. After several years as an assistant principal, he was named principal of 2A Junction High School. Under his leadership the school received the Governor's Academic Excellence Award for Performance Gains and a \$10,000 monetary award in 1990.

O'Quinn sees some of his strengths as being a good instructional leader in the school, having positive expectations for students and encouraging students to rise to their potential.

He is a member of the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals and Association of Texas Professional Educators.

Listing hunting as one of his hobbies, Mr. O'Quinn presently serves as a deacon and Sunday School Director of the First Baptist Church in Wink.

Ronnie Watkins, a native of Brownwood, will be joining the Plains Schools as the Middle School Principal.

With 23 years experience in the educational profession, he has spent the

last 12 years as high school principal at May High School.

Watkins received his Bachelor of Science degree from Sul Ross State University in 1970 and also earned his Master of Education degree from Sul Ross in 1976.

His professional career has included teaching, coaching, Athletic Director and K-12 principal. He has acquired his Mid-Management Certification (principal K-12), Curriculum Supervisor Certification, and Superintendent Certifications.

Accepting the elementary principal post, Joel Haragan, says he is very excited about joining the team at Plains ISD and wishes to thank everyone responsible for giving him the opportunity to be a part of the school system. He also says, upon his return visit this week April 26-27, he hopes to be able to meet more of the Plains staff.

Mr. Haragan graduated from Portales High School in Portales, NM and also attained his degree from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales. He was a basketball enthusiast at both high school and collegiate levels, and also participated in other sports. He also attended Sul Ross State University where he achieved his Master's Degree and Mid-Management Certification.

Haragan began his teaching career in Stanton, where he taught science and coached football, basketball and track. In 1984, he returned to Portales and accepted positions including teacher, coach and husband. After their marriage, he and his wife, Linda moved back to Texas and began working with the Ropesville girls basketball program. Joel was head coach and Linda was his assistant.

After a very successful stay in Ropesville, Coach Haragan moved on to Knox City as head girls' basketball coach. He coached there for two years and the third year was offered Knox

City Mid-School principal's position, where he is presently finishing his fifth year.

Haragan says that he considers his home to be the South Plains area in spite of these wonderful sand storms and the lack of trees. Much of his life was spent on a farm, and he still has a love for the type of environment that Plains has to offer.



# Important issue to be voted on, in addition to trustee election

tion will be held on May 7, 1994 in the auditorium foyer of Plains Schools. This will be the first election under the courtordered system designed to give minorities a better opportunity to be elected to the board. Plains ISD voters will be converting to the one man - one vote system for electing school trustees.

Plains ISD has been divided into five (5) districts, three with a majority of voters who are Anglo under the new system and two where a majority of the voters are minority or Hispanic. In these designated districts, only registered votes who reside in the district will be allowed to vote in the race in that district. The other two trustees will be elected at-large with all district voters allowed to vote on them.

Three places are up for election this year: one minority, one majority, and one at-large.

Candidates for District 1 (minority district) are Hershel Smith, Anna Gonzalez and Donald Burgess. District 1 includes the southeast section of the City of Plains.

Candidates for District 5 (majority district) are Tim Addison and incumbent Rickey Bearden. District 5 begins four miles north and four miles east continuing to the north and east district lines east of Hwy 214 and north of Hwy 82. Also, District 5 includes a section beginning four miles west on Hwy 82 and four miles south on Hwy 214.

Candidates for District 6 (at-large) are Brad Palmer, Raymond Diaz and Ty Wilmeth.

Voters should check the voting place lines to determine if they live in the districts up for election. Only registered voters in these Districts (one and five) will be allowed to vote for candidates in those Districts. They will also be allowed to vote in the at-large race. Those not living in either District One or District Five will only be able to vote in the at-large race. Maps and other demographic data will be available at the polling place to help you determine the district of your residency.

Early voting is already underway in the Business Office of Plains ISD and will continue through May 3. Hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each business day.

Another very important issue being put before Plains voters is an issue authorized by the Plains Board of Education recommending that Plains voters give the board permission to purchase WADA (attendance credit) from other school districts. This was Option 4 of five options the board was given to reduce or share our property wealth under Senate Bill 7.

Last year, the board asked and the voters overwhelmingly approved Option 3 which allowed us to purchase WADA or attendance credit from the state. This resulted in our sending our excess wealth to the state to be used in other schools of the state's choosing. At that time that was the best method for complying SB7 for Plains ISD. Recent court interpretations and Commissioner of Education decisions have made Op-

The regular Plains ISD board elec- tion 4 more appealing to Plains ISD. By having the opportunity for our board to choose between the options, the board will have much more flexibility in securing the best option for Plains ISD. A recent Commissioner's decision allows more flexibility in the Option 4 method of sending money to other districts instead of the state.

> This flexibility lies in the following alternatives:

> 1. If the voters give approval on May 7 and the board chooses to purchase WADA directly from other school districts, the contracts can be fashioned in such a way as to cause as much as 5% of the money being returned to Plains ISD. Next year this could amount to approximately \$100,000.

> 2. Other advantages to Option 4 would be that our board would have flexibility in choosing those districts receiving our money and require certain conditions from other districts such as a similar tax rate to ours, specific uses for the money, etc.




