Bullock to look into family violence

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has named a special Senate committee to look into possible changes in the way Texas handles family violence under criminal and civil laws.

"You don't have to look to California, you don't have to leave Texas to see painful reason to re-assess the protection we afford abused spouses and children in our own state," Bullock said, in appointing Sen. Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth to chair an interim committee on domestic violence.

"I worry that victims of domestic violence can fall through the cracks in the justice system," Bullock said. "We have got to see if there are holes that should be closed in our laws, including the new stalking law."

Dear Editor:

Dear Editor:

The recent acquittal of Dr. Jack Kevorkian and the judicial defeat of Michigan's and Washington's assisted suicide laws have once again stirred the national debate on end-of-life issues. Wherever you are on this issuewhether you have a decided position or whether you search to find a comfort zone - I believe you need to understand the Hospice philosophy of care for the terminally ill. Hospice centers on providing support and expertise to terminally ill persons and their families to live out their natural life in comfort at home.

The expertise that hospice brings to end-of-life issues includes specialized state-of-the-art management of the symptoms and pain that terminal illness can bring. If death is our fear, dying need not be. Hospice care addresses the physical, emotional, social, and spiritual issues of the terminally ill and their caregivers. Hospice care is comprehensive and builds on the combined skills and wishes of the patient, their caregivers, and their physician who work with the Hospice team. This team includes hospice nurses, nurse aides, social workers, chaplains, volunteers, music therapists, dieticians, pharmacists and other health care professionals.

In the span of the last two decades, the world hospice movement has been focused here in the United States where the Hospice model of care for the terminally ill has grown into a network of 2,000 providers. Hospice cared for 275,000 Americans in 1993 with Medicare, Medicaid and virtually all private insurers recognizing Hospice as a desirable part of an effective and cost-managed health plan.

Death is a difficult topic for most of us. Death either in the guise of our own mortality or the grief that comes when a loved one dies, can be one of life's most difficult experiences. But death is also the natural end of all life. Death is something we should try to understand, to talk through and to make our wishes known. Hospice provides community education, support and counseling for issues related to death, dying, grief and bereavement.

Dr. Kevorkian has become the champion of the assisted suicide movement for the stand he has taken, for the assistance he has offered, and his desire to make such assistance more readily available. Hospice champions the issue of quality of life for the terminally ill by addressing their symptoms and meeting their needs, one person at a time. We will debate the assisted suicide issue for some time to come and Hospice will continue to serve 50,000 terminally ill persons every day by echoing and delivering a philosophy care and support during life that carries us through our grief and through our death. The terminally ill face the reality of knowing life is particularly short - precious time to complete the work and love of their lifetime. Hospice patients teach us this every day.

Brush Management

What is brush? Most people think of mesquite, shinoak and other noxious weeds. Some brush is good for the land. Depending on the desired results. Most livestock producers want only grass in a pasture. Hunters and wildlife enthusiasts want to see stands of brush mixed with open areas, because they provide habitat for antelope, deer, quail and other wildlife.

"Brush management can be achieved in several ways," says Mark Lewis, Soil Conservationist for Yoakum County, "by applying mechanical, chemical, or prescribed burning methods. These methods can reduce brush to restore natural plant community balance and patterned treatments to meet specific needs of the land and objectives of the land user.

Mechanical control is achieved by using root plowing, dozing, or chaining. This is recommended for areas that have a high percentage of woody species and thick topgrowth.

"There are many types of chemical herbicides that can be used to control certain types of grasses and woody plants. These methods are widely used. However, special precautions must be followed because some of these chemicals control forbs and woody species that are beneficial to wildlife. For best results, they should only be used at certain times of the year," says Mark.

Prescribed burning is another method of control, in which fire is used to burn off an area that is infested with brush. This is the most effective, but if not done correctly, can be the most dangerous.

These methods can be used separately, or together to achieve the desired results.

Deferred Grazing is needed after brush control has been applied. Anywhere from three months to a full growing season is needed to establish the proper cover. Life lengths of various brush control methods vary widely, therefore maintenance is critical to the effectiveness of the practice.

Brush Management should be based on sound and wise planning practices that will control erosion, brush, and achieve the desired quality of plant life.


