

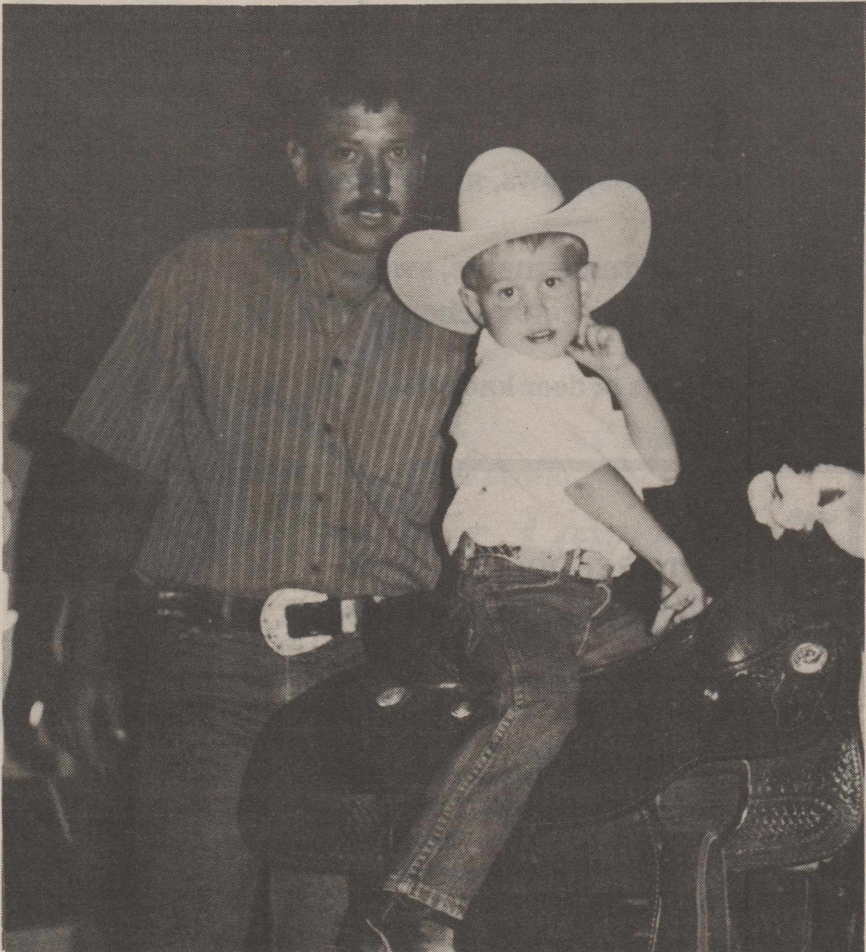

Important meeting set Aug. 25 to help with CRP decisions

The Soil Conservation Service will host an informational meeting about the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) on Aug. 25 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Lubbock Civic Center. Purpose of the meeting is to provide the latest and best information available about the CRP.

Information provided at the meeting will enable CRP participants to make informed decisions about future land uses and resource management needs. It will also be of special interest to farm commodity groups, livestock organizations, agricultural related businesses, agricultural lending institutions, real estate agencies, chambers of commerce, tax offices, county and city governments, and other interested citizens who will be affected by the future use of CRP lands.

Congressman Larry Combest has been invited to speak and has indicated he will attend. Other speakers will in-

clude representatives from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Agricultural Research Service, Texas Tech University, and the Texas A&M University System, as well as representatives from the national and state offices of the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Items to be discussed include conservation compliance, management of weeping lovegrass, wildlife management, national and state program updates, legislative perspectives, environmental impacts, and economic alternatives associated with the CRP.

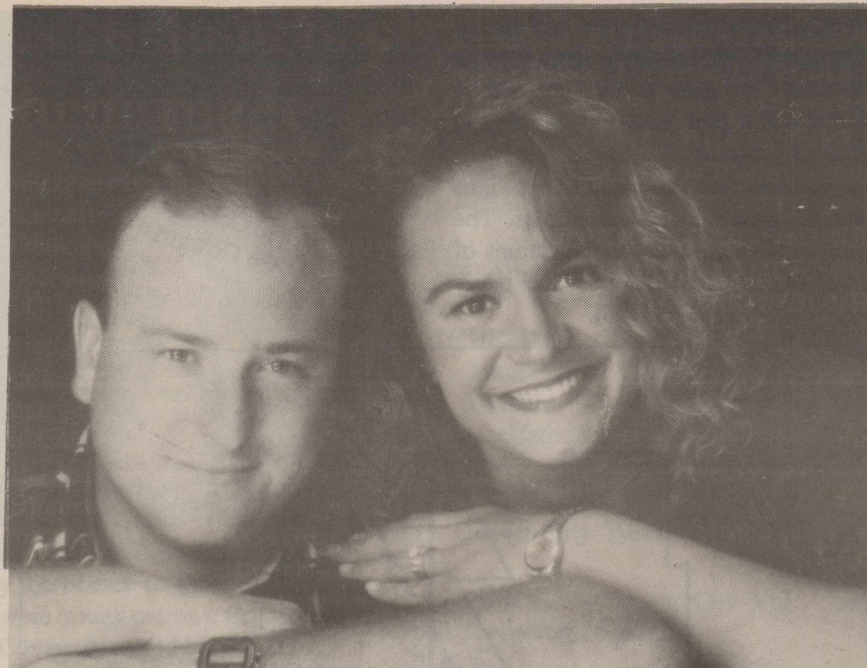

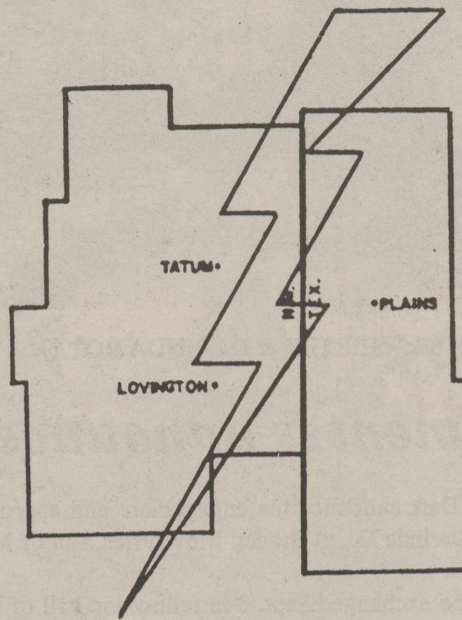
New Plains tee shirts for football and volleyball will be available. New bumper

ALLTEL informs customers of dialing changes to be made

ALLTEL is investing approximately \$453,500 to install new telephone switching equipment for customers in the Higginbotham (732) and Plains (456) exchanges. The projects involve the installation of Northern Telecom digital switching offices. The new equipment has features to protect against loss of service in the event of power outages and replaces mechanical, relay-type switching equipment.

The change to the new digital switching equipment will take place in September and will require an important change in dialing procedures for customers in the Higginbotham and Plains exchanges - the use of the complete seven-digit telephone number for local calling. After the conversions, Higginbotham customers will need to dial 732 plus the last four digits of the number they are dialing, and Plains customers will need to dial 456 plus the last four digits of the number they are dialing. These procedures also apply to multi-party customers trying to

reach another party on their line. Higginbotham and Plains customers will no longer need to dial the special party codes that they previously dialed.

"The digital equipment will provide improvements in local and long distance services, as well as reduce the potential for calling congestion during heavy calling periods," said Ken Barnes, manager-operations for the Higginbotham and Plains areas.

Additionally, ALLTEL will be able to offer a variety of new enhanced services which includes a complete section of custom calling services. These custom calling features include Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling.

ALLTEL employees will be performing pre-cutover testing and will be responsible for placing the new digital switches into service. All efforts will be made to keep any service interruptions to a minimum during the installation of the switches.

"We apologize in advance for any service interruptions that might occur during these projects," stated Barnes.

Farmer Stockman Show slated for Oct. 11-12-13

Any first time visitor to the Farmer-Stockman Show near Lubbock this fall may feel like he has landed in the middle of a not so small farm city during busy harvest season.

That's by design.

The whole idea for the farm show is built around making it possible for farmers and ranchers to see all sorts of agricultural equipment and supplies at work in a real life environment doing actual farm and ranch work. The exact location will be at the Lubbock City Farm one and one half miles east of Loop 289 on Farm Road 835, East 50th Street. Dates for the show are October 11-12-13.

By then, the farm will even look like a tent city surrounded by 500 acres of cotton crop, sorghum and forage crops that will be harvested while the visitors look on. In the middle of all this activity will be the 56 acre exhibit field divided up into streets where commercial and educational exhibits will be located and where other major events will be staged.

And in case visitors may have attended the first show last year, they will immediately be struck by how much the farm show will have grown this time. In 1993, the exhibit field included 225 exhibits laid out along five major streets running east to west and three avenues running south to north. That layout has already expanded so that two new streets have been added to the north.

As well, new crops and new events have been added for the visitors to examine.

Admission for the show will be \$3 for adults. Those under 18 will be admitted free. Show hours will be from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. each day.

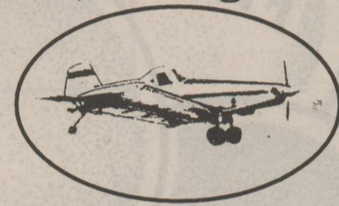

Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Letter to Households (single-child) or (Multi-Child)
National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program

August 15, 1994

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Plains Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day and all Plains I.S.D. students receive free meals from our cafeteria, however, Plains I.S.D. may be reimbursed for meals served to children from families who qualify under the stated guidelines.

In order to claim reimbursement for these meals, a completed application form must be on file for each ELIGIBLE child. If your child/children would qualify for free or reduced price meals, please complete the application form and return it to the school as soon as possible.

PLEASE ANSWER ALL QUESTIONS ON THE APPLICATION FORM. An application that does not contain COMPLETE information on household members and income cannot be used by the school.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member.
If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.
If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.


Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.
