# The Sunday Movies vs. the Churches

Several years ago a former operator of the local picture show received a letter from a movie authority telling him how to begin the Sunday show and put it by the public. The letter suggested that the first step should be a preview given Saturday night run ning into Sunday morning. The letter further suggested that after the people became accustomed to sitting in the show a few minutes on Sunday morning, they would be ready for an afternoon show on Sunday. The letter also stated that when the proper time arrived the show should be begun immediately after the preaching on Sunday nights. And finally the show could be started on Sunday afternoon and go straight on through the afternoon and evening. One by one these steps have been taken and there remains only one more to take. We have the Saturday night preview, the Sunday afternoon and night shows. The writer of this article has conducted revivals in places where the Sunday night shows ignored the preaching of the Gospel and went on with their business.

We believe the Sunday show to be very hurtful to our church services. There is a class of people in every community looking solely for entertainment. These people do not care to attend two or three preaching services and a couple of shows on the same day. If they are left to choose between the show and the church they will choose the show. The church does not pretend to compete with the show in entertainment. The church is no place for entertainment, it is a place of worship. If the show allures away from the churches a class of people we are trying to reach, then it means that many will go out into eternity unpre-pared and the Sunday Show will be to blame for it.

If every show were a clean show there could be no argument for having it on Sunday. Sunday is the Lord's Day (Rev. 1:10). It belongs to Him and has been made holy by His Resurrection. On this day the churches are to put forth every effort to reach the lost for Christ. It is not rgiht that the movies should take the Sabbath from the church for commercial purposes. And to make it a thousand times worse, the people sit there many times and see a display of almost naked women, vulgar cracks, fiendish smiles and many other hurtful things that every child knows about.

It is time for the people who believe in the churches, better homes and love lost souls to get together and vote the Sunday shows out of Haskell. Hoping to accomplish this end, we will publish an article each week, for many weeks, on the subject "The Evils of the Moving Picture Show." The evils will be spoker of in no uncertain terms.

# THE MONEY QUESTION

It is claimed that only a few experts understand the money question, and that even the experts do not agree on the subject. It is, therefore, not strange that it remains a baffling mystery to the average citizen.

As explained by Secreatry of the Treasury Morgenthau, the President's monetary plan "means that the money system of the country shall be managed for you, to the end that a more steady purchasing power for your dollars will be maintained." Instead of having a dollar which may be worth anywhere from 100 cents in gold down to nothing, the new policy defines certain limits both ways -that is, "the new dollar is to contain not more than 60 per cent, nor less than 50 per cent, of the present amount of gold." This gives a leeway of 10 cents for adjustment to suit conditions as they may come up.

There is in the United States about four billion dollars in monetary gold. Under the President's plan all the gold will be held in the United States Treasury and used as a reserve fund to back up the value of all the money in the country. This makes Uncle Sam the undisputed boss of the money bags, and he will be in a position to take action instantly to meet any emergency-instead of having to consult private interests or wait for Congress to act. It gives the government complete control of the monetary situation, which is far better than to have it in the irresponsible hands of the money sharks in New York.

Just what is the dollar, now that it has been "devalued" down to 60 cents? Does it still have 100 cents or does it only have 60 cents? It still has 100 cents, two halves of 50 cents each, four quarters of 25 cents each and 10 dimes of 10 cents each. It is exactly the same dollar that you had before, but the intention is that it will have less purchasing power. The aim is to raise all prices, which means of course that people will get less for their dollar. However, it will become more plentiful and easier to get, and the man who is in debt will be enabled to pay his debt in the same kind of a dollar which he borrowed. In most cases the creditor will be better off, as it is better to get a 50-cent dollar than no dollar at all.





An insane person is not sent to an asylum for a definite period, but is supposed to be kept there until his condtion improves sufficiently to make his release safe. There is a similarity between the lunatic and the criminal in that both are sick. One is mentally sick, the other is morally sick. Both can often be cured by proper treatment. The condition of each should be determined by experts before turning him loose. At least that is the theory of the indeterminate sentence-and it seems sensible.


# TIME TO GO FORWARD
