THE MONEY QUESTION
It is claimed that only a few experts understand the money question, and that even the experts do not agree on the subject. It is, therefore, not strange th
mains a baffling mystery to the average citizen.
As explained by Secreatry of the Treasury Morgenthau, the President's monetary plan "means that the money system of the country shall be managed for you, to the
end thate steady purchasing power for your dollars will be maintained." Instead of having a dollar which may be worth anywhere from 100 cents in gold down to nothing, the new policy defines certain limits both ways -that is, "the new dollar is to contain not more than 60 per cent, nor less than 50 per cent, of the present amount f gold." This gives a leeway of 10 cents for adjustment There is in the United States about four billion dolthe gold will be hold. Under the President's plan used as a reserve fund to back up the value of all the money in the country. This makes Uncle Sam the undisputed boss of the money bags, and he wild be in a posi-
tion to take action instantly to meet any emergency-intead of having to consult private interests or wait for Congress to act. It gives the government complete con-
trol of the monetary situation, which is far better than to have it in the irresponsible hands of the money shark
Just what is the dollar, now that it has been "deval ued down to 60 cents? Does it still have 100 cents or
does it only have 60 cents? It still has 100 cents, two halves of 50 cents each, four quarters of 25 cents each and 10 dimes of 10 cents each. It is exactly the same dollar that you had before, but the intention is that it will have less purchasing power. The aim is to raise all prices, which means of course that people will get less for their
dollar. However, it will become more plentiful and easer to get, and the man who is in debt will be enabled to pay his debt in the same kind of a dollar which he bor-
rowed. In most cases the creditor will be better off, as is better to get a 50 -cent dollar than no dollar at all.

society The idea is that when convicted of a serious crime the offender should be restrained antil he gives ev As we understand it, under this plan the criminal is treated somewhat as an insane person is treated. An in-
sane person is not sent to an asylum for a definite period, but is supposed to be kept there until his condtion im proves sufficiently to make his release safe. If his condi-
tion can not be so improved he stays for life.
