

The February fund raising project is being planned to raise funds for the future purchase of display cases to be placed in the proposed Travelers Center & Museum at the Knox County Courthouse.

This meeting is very important, and Clara Brown of Truscott urges all members to mark the date on their calendars now and plan to be there.

Remember, that's 3:00 p.m. on Monday, January 5, at the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin.

Health will conduct an immunization clinic at the Community Center in Knox City on Thursday, January 8, from 10:00-11:30 a.m. and 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps, and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations.

The Hepatitis series will be required for Kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. The Hepatitis B series (three immunizations) takes a minimum of six months to complete. Parents should check their child's immunization record for this series. Though not a school requirement, the Hepatitis B series is available for all school age children through the age of 19, if they or their parents want it for prevention or the child is at risk. For more information on the immunization or the disease, call the Texas Department of Health or talk to a health care provider.

Participants are asked to bringimmunization records to the clinic. A parent or legal guardian must accompany a minor. All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one isdenied services due to an ability to pay. Sales tax rebate to Knox City for Dec. of 1997 is \$11,172.37

(Austin) State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$164.7 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,087 Texas cities and 118 counties, including a check of \$11,172.37 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects an increase of 0.14% from a rebate check of \$11,155.85 for the same period in 1996. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards EDC funding. The total of payments to Knox City in 1997 totaled \$153, 367.29, down slightly by 4.03% from a 1996 total of \$159,807.91.

Texas cities received \$150.6 million, 3.9 percent higher than payments of \$144.9 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 14 million in rebates, 1 percent above the \$13.9 million in allocations for the same period in 1996.

December, 1997 payments include taxes collected by monthly filers on October, 1997 sales and reported to the Comptroller in November of 1997. Figures for other Knox County and area cities as provided by the State Comptroller's office are provided by chart below.
