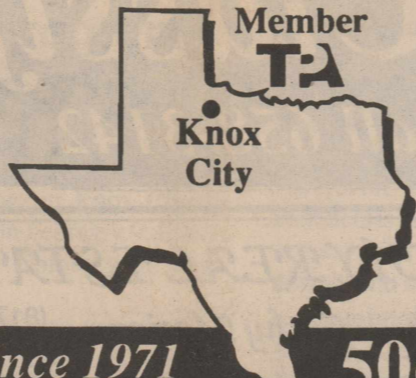

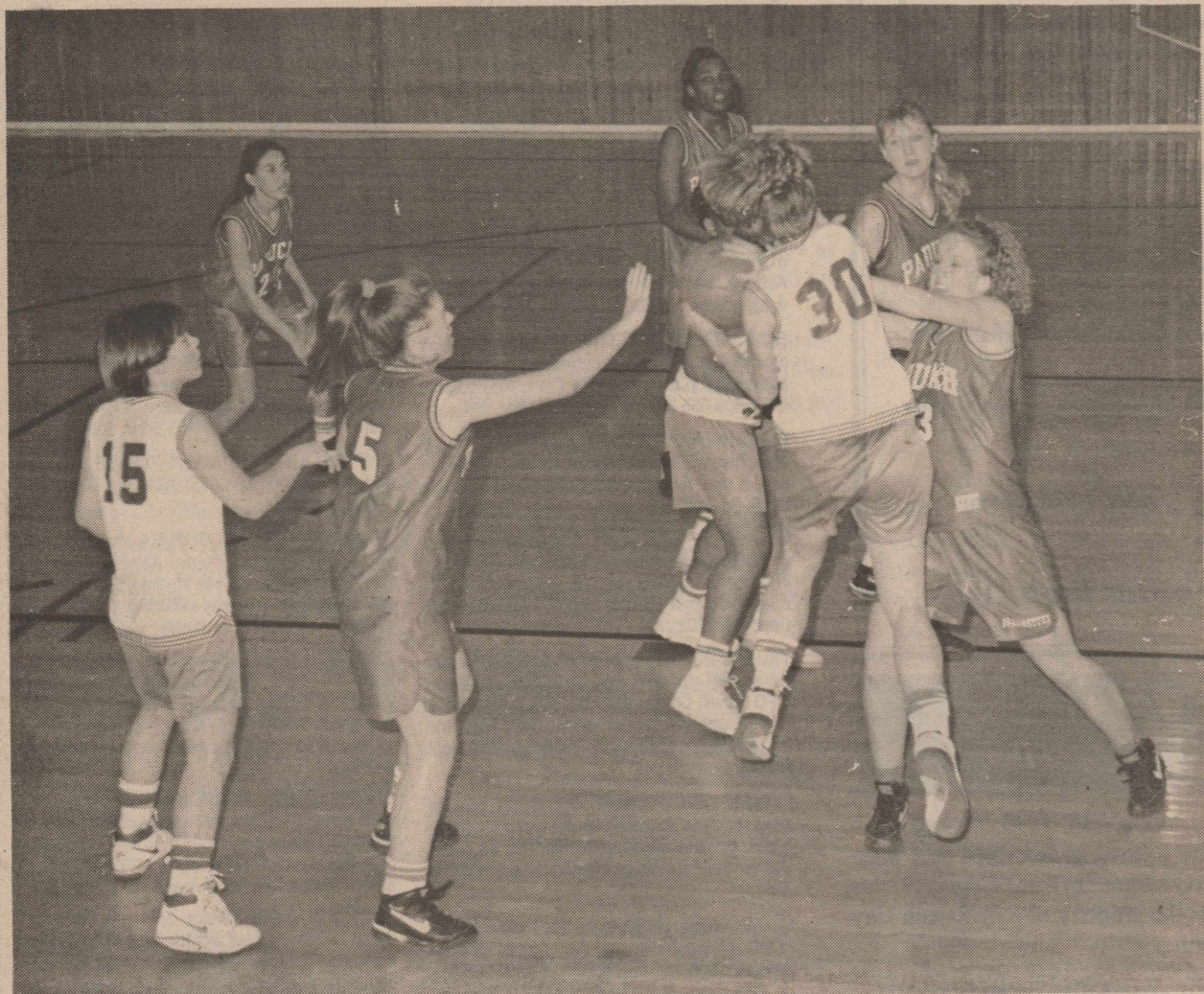

It's Girl Scout Cookie Time, and NorCenTex Girl Scouts will be taking door-to-door and telephone orders through February 19. The girls will be delivering cookies and having booth sales March 5 through March 21. Those not contacted by a Girl Scout and would like to order cookies may call Jane Penman at 658-3756, Service Unit Cookie Manager.

This year, there are seven delicious varieties to choose from including: Samoas (vanilla cookie covered with caramel, coconut and cocoa coating), Thin Mints (double rich mint coating with fudge cookie middle), Do-Si-Dos (peanut butter sandwiches), Tagalongs (chocolate, peanut butter combination), Trefoils (tender shortbread), Chalet Cremes (lemon and vanilla creme assortment), and the newest cookie Golden Nut Cluster (chewy caramel and pecans on a tender cookie covered with a light maple flavored coating). Money will be collected when the cookies are delivered.

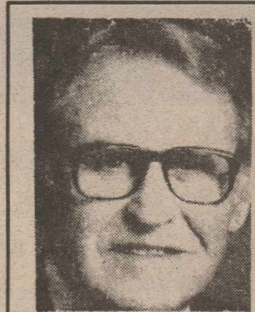

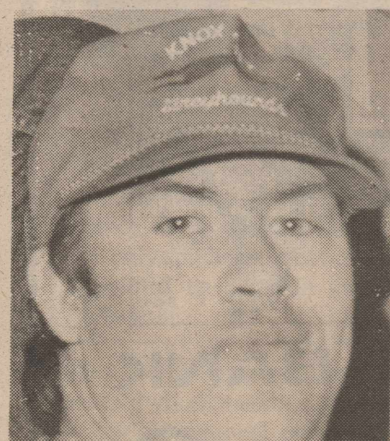


Lawrence Hall 1915 - 1993

Born September 22, 1915, in Lee County, Mississippi, he moved to Andrews in 1936. Mr. Hall worked in the oilfields there for one year and in 1937, he moved to Anson and entered a business venture with Bill Lepard. The company operated as Hall & Lepard Oil Company until 1956. Mr. Hall entered the Armed Services in 1942 and served for four years in the United States Army. One year of that time was in the European theatre. Following his discharge, he returned to Anson and on January 21, 1949, married Myrl Horn. In 1956, Mr. and Mrs. Hall purchased the Chevrolet dealership in Anson, a business that has operated as Lawrence Hall Chevrolet since that time. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Myrl of the Anson home; two sons, Larry and Mitch, both of Anson; three daughters, Ann (Mrs. Jimmy) Tankersley of Knox City, Jan (Mrs. Steve) Lollar of Anson and Beth Hall, also of Anson; twelve grandchildren, Boyce Tankersley, Richard Lollar, Ty Baynes, John Scott Dyer, Lance Hall, Haskell Hall, Hayes Hall, Lawry Lynn, Stephanie Perez, Michele Hall, April Tankersley, Christian Hall; three great grandchildren; and two sisters, Mrs. Purlee Braden of Tupelo, Mississippi; and Gladys (Mrs. Ervin) Baucum of Abilene.

### Free Soil Tests Available Now Through Mar. 6

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsoring free soil tests for producers in the Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project now through March 6.

Soil sample bags and information sheets can be picked up at the local SCS, ASCS, or County Extension Service offices both in Knox and Haskell counties. Soil sample bags also are available at Benjamin Fertilizer and Terra in Knox City; Allison Farm Supply in Rule; Zeissel Brothers Fertilizer, Quality Implement, Parker Implement, Farmers Grain Coop, and Knox Prairie Coop in Munday; Farmers Gin and Home State Bank in Rochester; and O'Brien Coop Gin or Rhineland Coop Gin.

After taking the soil sample, it can be returned to any of the participating businesses, and SCS or Extension Service employees will send the sample in. The results will be mailed to the producer.

In addition to the free soil test program, the Seymour Aquifer Project also gives free water tests. The water sample will be tested for nitrates and salinity. Water samples can be left at the Soil Conservation Service offices in Knox City and Haskell.

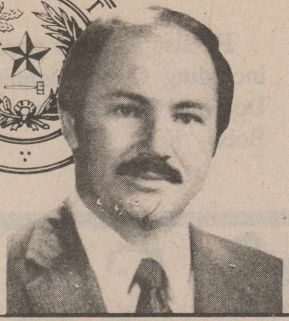
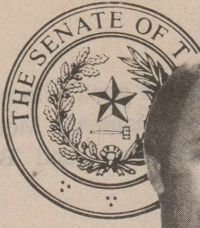

### STALKING IS A CRIME

What would you do if you suddenly realized someone was following you, possibly with the intention of harming or even murdering you? Under current state law, until the "stalker" commits an actual crime, the only recourse available is a protective order issued by the court.

The protective order makes it a crime to come within a set distance of the person's residence or work place. Protective orders, however, are only effective if the offender obeys the order, and they're issued only when family members or live-in mates are involved.

I am co-sponsoring Senate Bill 25 this session, which would include stalking within the definition of harassment, a Class A misdemeanor. The measure also makes stalking a third degree felony if the offender has been convicted in the past for stalking the same person, or if the suspect violates a court order

to stop harassing the victim.

Over the last few years, "stalking" has become a major concern all across Texas. Last year in Wichita Falls a parolee, who was convicted in 1982 for killing an 18-year-old cheerleader who had refused his romantic advances, was charged with attacking a woman in a grocery store parking lot. In this case, Wesley Wayne Miller was convicted on a misdemeanor charge of violating his parole, and was sent back to prison for at least five more years.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, 31 percent of all female murder victims are killed in domestic violence, with many of the victims enduring long-term abuse.

S.B. 25 will provide a tool for police to use in heading off violent situations, and give victims an avenue to protect themselves from long-term harassment and episodes of terror.

**Casualty Losses.** Losses suffered from events such as fires, tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and car accidents may be deductible.

**Elderly or Disabled.** You may be able to claim this credit if you're 65 or older, or if you are retired on disability and were permanently and totally disabled when you retired.

**Electronic Filing.** This won't save you money, but will get you a refund faster, usually about three weeks after we receive the return.
