It's that time again!


The annual "Neighbor to Neighbor Walk" for the American Heart Association will find volunteers out walking February 22 through March

Born September 22, 1915, in Lee County, Mississippi, he moved to Andrews in 1936. Mr. Hall worked in the oilfields there for one year and in 1937, he moved to Anson and entered a business venture with Bill Lepard. The company operated as Hall & Lepard Oil Company until 1956. Mr. Hall entered the Armed Services in 1942 and served for four years in the United States Army. One year of that time was in the European theatre. Following his discharge, he returned to Anson and on January 21, 1949, married Myrl Horn. In 1956, Mr. and Mrs. Hall purchased the Chevrolet dealership in Anson, a business that has operated as Lawrence Hall Chevrolet since that time. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church.



Free Soil Tests Available Now Through Mar. 6

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsoring free soil tests for producers in the Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project now through March 6.

Soil sample bags and information sheets can be picked up at the local SCS, ASCS, or County Extension Service offices both in Knox and Haskell counties. Soil sample bags also are available at Benjamin Fertilizer and Terra in Knox City; Allison Farm Supply in Rule; Zeissel Brothers Fertilizer, Quality Implement, Parker Implement, Farmers Grain Coop, and Knox Prairie Coop in Munday; Farmers Gin and Home State Bank in Rochester; and O'Brien Coop Gin or Rhineland Coop Gin.

After taking the soil sample, it can be returned to any of the participating businesses, and SCS or Extension Service employees will send the sample in. The results will be mailed to the producer.

In addition to the free soil test program, the Seymour Aquifer Project also gives free water tests. The water sample will be tested for nitrates and salinity. Water samples can be left at the Soil Conservation Service offices in Knox City and Haskell.
