Chamber Banquet is Tuesday, March 24


Wildlife Photographer Wyman Meinzer is program speaker

With tickets on sale now, the members of Knox City's Chamber of Commerce are looking forward to a large crowd at next week's annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Slated to begin at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 24 in the Knox City High School Cafeteria, the featured speaker this year will be noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer of Benjamin.

Also featured each year at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet will be the presentation of the e. Hobb Smith Most Appreciated Citizen Award. The award is presented to an individual or group within the community in recognition for services contributed to make Knox City a better place to live. Some of the past recipients of this prestigious award are the Knox City Volunteer Fire Department, The Knox County Hospital 'Pink Ladies' Auxiliary, Joe M. Clonts, Leon Burkham, the late John Crownover, and current Knox City Mayor Bud Reynolds.

Rita Rosencranz will be honored during the banquet as she steps down from her year long position as President of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce. Retiring Chamber of Commerce Directors Charles Auburg and Ben Vasquez will also be honored for their service to the chamber . Replacements for the two directors and the new President for 1998-1999 will be named.

Famous throughout the world for his still photographs and slides of native wildlife, Wyman Meinzer has also achieved success in recent years with three book publications. A Benjamin native and 1974 graduate of Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Meinzer has also been recognized as an Outstanding Alumni from Texas Tech. Working all his life as a photographer, his work has been published in more than 60 magazines from all over the world, including France, Italy, Great Britain, Japan, and the United States. The country's two largest outdoors magazine, Field & Stream and Sports Afield, featured six Meinzer photographs on their covers in the course of a year. His work has also been included in three National Geographic books. The amazing twist to Wyman's success is that he has never received any formal training in photography. Trained and working the first 20 years of his life as a cowboy, he grew up being a fanatic on hunting and the outdoors. Cattle work took second seat to his eventual career of wildlife photography. Approaching his photographs from the viewpoint of a hunter, many magazine editors have commented that his photographs have a unique approach that is different from other photographers. Wyman's ability to "read" animals, their signs and body language, also add greatly to his photographs. Although Wyman did spend a few years photographing models in fancy clothes and another few years photographing weddings, his true love of animals and the outdoors are reflected in every photograph he shoots. From laying on his belly in the



dirt to photograph a Texas Horned Toad to being honored at the State Capitol by Texas Governor George Bush, Wyman has remain a very humble 'country boy' from Benjamin, Texas. Wyman's talks are truly entertaining, so be sure to make your plans now to attend the Chamber Banquet.

Tickets for the evening's festivities are \$10.00 each and are available from the Chamber of Commerce office, or from any director of the Chamber. As an added feature that ties in with Wyman Meinzer as the guest speaker, a drawing will be held during the banquet for a Wyman Meinzer print. being vacated. As of Tuesday noon, none of the three incumbents had filed.


For the School Board, two seats are being vacated. Dale Turner has filed for the position he is now holding and Raul Espinosa Jr. has also filed.

Hospital Board incumbents Peggy McGaughey and Don Bunton have both filed.


KC's Ainsworth selected for All-District Team





CHILDRESS - The Texas Department of Transportation will hold a public meeting on April 13 at 7:00 p.m. in the Benjamin City Hall.



A concerned parent

Last week I had a conversation with a parent here in Knox City who was concerned about how easy it was for our youth to obtain smokeless tobacco products here in Knox City.

It seems that some store clerks will sell dip and snuff to the kids while most will not. Most clerks follow the state law and ask for identification, but there seems to be a few that do not. In a recent edition of this newspaper, we quoted the Knox City Police Chief in an article that he submitted to us about how strict he was going to be on youth who violated the new, stricter laws on youth in possession of alcohol or tobacco products. At this point, that seems to be the only solution for the problem described in the concerned parent's conversation. Not only is it against the law for minors to be in possession of this stuff, but is very much against the law for an employee of a store to sell tobacco products or alcohol to a minor in the first place. But, being the resourceful kids they are, some minors seem to skirt around the law by having an older person go in to the store and buy the illegal products for them. The store employees are not violating any laws if they are selling it to an adult who in turn gives it to a minor. Then, the only solution is for adults to say NO when approached by a juvenile to buy the products. Again, when this does happen, the only action that will have an effect seems to be that
