



KC Lions Club to help with 'Trash-Off'

CHILDRESS - It's spring cleaning time in Texas. On Saturday, April 4, more than 82,000 volunteers statewide will take part in the 13th annual Great Texas Trash-Off, one of the nation's largest one-day litter pickup events. Part of the Don't Miss with Texas litter prevention campaign, the Trash-Off is organized by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB).

In Knox County, Adopt-a-Highway groups including Knox City Lions Club will rid state roads of litter.

In addition, 61,293 Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers will clean city streets, county roads and parks.

"The local groups who participate in the Great Texas Trash-Off are to be commended for taking time to help keep Texas beautiful," Barbara Seal, TxDOT Adopta-Highway coordinator said, "when motorists travel Texas roads to see the bluebonnets and wildflowers, their view should not be of litter."

Scheduled for the first weekend in April, the Trash-Off kicks off Keep Texas Beautiful Month and Keep America Beautiful Month.

The Great Texas Trash-Off is part of TxDOT's litter prevention programs, which include Don't Mess wth Texas, Adopt-a-Highway and a grassroots partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful. Together, these programs have reversed a trend in the increase in the amount of litter on Texas highways, resulting in a 72 percent reduction in litter and a cost savings to taxpayers of \$2 to \$4 million per year.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, David N. Perdue, County Judge, do hereby proclaim the month of April 1998 to be



It's clearly a tragedy. And when you consider that it's the third such incident in less than six months, it also gets you wondering whether there's an underlying thread joining them all together, or whether each one is just a senseless act of violence unique in its own right.

Some people are putting the blame on the upbringing of the young boys involved. Some of the national media suggest that because the boys were raised around guns, they were somehow more likely to commit this kind of heinous act. Well, I was brought up around guns, and I know a lot of other people in our part of the country who were as caused the shootings last week in well. So I just don't buy it.

I tend to agree with Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee, who was asked whether he thought the boys' experience with firearms could have led them to commit such a crime. He replied, in effect, that he



THE CURRENT IRS TAX CODE MUST GO.

"Reckless" and "irresponsible" are the words that President Clinton recently used to describe a plan to abolish the IRS tax code. With all due respect, Mr. President, what is truly irresponsible is a seven-million word tax code that is anti-work, anti-saving and anti-family.

By attacking this plan, the president is insulting thousands of small-business owners who have joined NFIB's Campaign to Abolish the IRS Code and signed petitions calling for the end of the current tax code. The goal is to collect one million petitions in 1998 and deliver them to Congress as "one million reasons to stop talking about the code and do something about it."

NFIB has designated April 15 as National "It's our money, not THEIRS" Day. Volunteers and supporters will be at designated post offices in more than 100 cities nationwide collecting signatures asking Congress and the president to abolish the IRS Code by the year 2001 and replace it with a code that lowers taxes and rewards work and savings. On the final tax filing date, we want to remind taxpayers that the money they are sending to the government belongs to them, not the IRS.

And veteran lawmakers agree that the only way we will ever have real tax reform is to scrap the current tax code and start over. "The Tax Code Termination Act," introduced by Sens. Tim Hutchinson, R-Ark., and Sam Brownback, R-Kan., and Reps. Steve Largent, R-Okla., and Bill Paxon, R-N.Y., has many congressional supporters. Both Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott and House Majority Leader Dick Armey have promised to schedule a vote on abolish-the-code legislation this year.

President Clinton has indicated in speeches that small-business owners want to create "fiscal anarchy" by scrapping the code and then figuring out what to do next. But small employers understand that a new plan must be ready for implementation before the old code is put to rest.

The debate on alternatives to the tax code has just gotten started, and small-business owners have been busy educating themselves about each plan. Reps. Dick Armey, R-Tex., and Billy Tauzin, R-La., have been traveling the country discussing the merits of two of the most popular alternatives—the flat tax and the national retail sales tax.

Far from being a reckless scheme, the Campaign to Abolish the IRS Code is based on these seven steps: One, Congress must pass legislation that would sunset the IRS Code by December 31, 2001. Two, the American people should have an opportunity at town hall meetings to debate and define the principles that any new tax code must contain. Three, in 1999, Congress will write two alternative tax codes—one based on a sales tax and one based on income tax—including transition rules for each proposal. Four, Americans will be educated about the two alternatives. Five, on November 7, 2000, a national advisory referendum will be held so that Americans can choose the least of three evils—a national sales tax, new income tax, or keep the current tax code. Six, by July 4, 2001, Congress will enact the tax code with no changes or amendments. Seven, the new tax code will take effect by July, 2001.

Instead of stubbornly embracing the status quo, President Clinton should join the Campaign to Abolish the IRS Code and champion the cause. If the president listens to small business on this one, he will be remembered as the president who got rid of the seven-million word, social engineering document that cost Americans so much time, money and grief.






