


On Sunday, June 7, all Homecoming '98 attendees are encouraged to attend Homecoming worship services at the church of their choice.


Hosting this time in addition to LaNell will be Danny and Jackie Fisher and Carroll Tankersley Kobernus.

Show steer validation set for Tuesday, June 16

Youth in Knox County that wish to show steers at major stock shows or the Knox County Junior Livestock Show will need to have their animal(s) validated. This year, the show steer validation will take place at the Tony Myers' barn and pens located just south of Munday. Validation will last from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00, on Tuesday, June 16.

Changes have been made for the 1998-99 steer validation. A Polaroid picture is no longer required. The procedure will be replaced by the new Anti-body Profile Assay identification procedure. This process utilizes blood samples to make a positive identification on any steer.

Because of this new process the validation costs have increased to \$6 per calf. Anyone that has not already paid this fee may be required to do so at validation. All youth and at least one parent/ guardian are required to attend so that proper paper work can be completed.

Dyess Air Force Base schedules airshow

Dyess' Big Country Appreciation Day is Aug. 22. Gates open at 9 a.m. More than 100 air and ground demonstrations and displays are planned and organizers say people of all ages should find something of interest.

Admission and parking are free, food and beverages will be on sale. Featured aerial demonstrations this year include Dyess' B-1 Lancer bomber and C-130 Hercules airlifter. The B-1 has thrilled crowds at the annual air show since 1985 when the first B-1 was delivered to Dyess. A low altitude, high speed pass will give spectators a close, although brief, look at the sleek, stealthy aircraft, whose silhouette is a familiar one around Abilene.

An F-117, the world's first operational aircraft designed to exploit low-observable stealth technology, will be on display. There will be an aerobatics demonstration by FINA and a wing walking demonstration. Numerous vintage aircraft will also be on display. Visitors are encouraged to talk with crew members at static display aircraft to get firsthand information about U.S. airpower.







Melissa Barnard named to Angelo State dean's list


Melissa J. Barnard has been named to the Angelo State University dean's list for the 1998 spring semester, posting a 4.0 grade average.





METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.







To the teachers and students of Knox City Elementary School:

I would like to thank all of you for the care package I received. All of the items that were sent were greatly appreciated. I was able to share everything with the other people that I work with.

There are 10 of us here that are from Texas, about half from our Abilene unit and half from our parent unit in San Antonio. We are about 2 1/2 miles from the Croatian border, and about 200 miles north of Sarajevo. During the war, there was major fighting in this area, with hundreds of thousands of land mines being placed all over. On a daily basis, we still find about 10 to 20 mines, and this is after two years. There isn't much actual fighting now, the major emphasis is on trying to rebuild the country. Which is where we come into the picture. I help coordinate with the local officials, ad act as a liaison between the military and the civilians. We have different areas that we have to work in. We also help with the rebuilding of schools, churches, hospitals, roads, water wells and houses.

There are about 8000 U.S. soldiers here, and the average time that we stay is anywhere from three to nine months. At the camp that I'm at, we live in tents, and when it rains we have to slog around in the mud. The living conditions are improving all the time.

The group that I'm with has been here since the middle of December, and are expected to leave around the middle of July. During the winter we had quite a few snow storms and below freezing temperatures, and now with spring we've had a lot of rain. It normally rains two or three times a week. The temperatures are normally in the 70s, with the overnight lows in the 30s and 40s.

I have to be going for now, but I want to thank you all again for the care package. It is a really good idea that you have, because it boosts our morale to get something from home. That is something that everyone over here looks forward to, is getting mail.
