Rep. Counts stands up for constituents against powerful electric, utility industry

AUSTIN-State Representative David Counts, D-Knox City, was one of several members of the House State Affairs Committee who questioned claims that residential, small business and farm and ranch consumers would benefit from competition in the electric utility industry, during a public hearing the committee held on Monday. The Texas Legislature is expected to consider opening electric utilities to competition when it convenes in January, a step that California and several other states have already taken.

Counts closely questioned Jonathan Day, a Houston attorney representing Texas Industrial Electric Consumers, an organization that includes petrochemical, oil refining, steel and other large manufacturing and industrial users of electricity. "We support retail competition," Day said. "We also believe it will be very good for residential and commercial customers."

Day said he could not guarantee any rate cuts as a result of competition.

"Tve got to show them something." Rep. Kim Brimer, R-Arlington, asked Day whether large industrial users would be willing to pay all of the so-called "stranded costs" as a way to resolve one of the major sticking points in the effort to restructure the electric utility industry. Stranded costs are the debt that utilities incurred in building uneconomical nuclear power plants. lic Utility Commission (PUC) recently estimated that stranded costs would total about \$4.5 billion if competition began in 2001.

Counts complained that when Day was insisting that competition would be good for residential customers, he minimized the size of stranded costs, but when asked whether the big industrial users would be willing to pay them, he characterized them as enormous.

Counts also chastised PUC Chairman Pat Wood for published remarks in which he threatened the state's electric cooperatives for talking to their legislators about PUC actions. "This is absolutely wrong, because I listen to my constituents," Counts said, "because that's the only way I know what's going on. I hope you don't plan to punish them for talking to me as you have stated in your published remarks." In addition, Counts accused Wood and his agency of getting ahead of the legislature on the electric restructuring issue. "I think at times that you overstep your authority, and I have some problems with that," the Knox City lawmaker said. "I hope you'll be more cautious in the future and leave public policy to the legislature."

To start off I hope to answer a few questions that may develop. Since late May, I have visited several farms, greenhouses, and

homes looking at what appeared to be dying plants. Several of these had the same problem-thrips.

Thrips are a very small insect. They range in color from a yellowish-white to almost black. Thrips will get on people and bite. For such a small insect they carry a powerful punch. Those who wish to control the thrips should try chemicals like malathion, diazinon, dimethoate, Orthene and others. Most chemicals that work

The reward comes with that first smile following the surgery. Since this project began, ten thousand of children worldwide have benefitted from this worthy cause.

Following a short sightseeing tour and a cruise (2 1/2 hours) up the Mississippi River among other outings, Janoma and 26 other women from Texas attended the installation of new GFWC officers. Janoma commented that the 1,000+ women in one room was a lot of ladies.

In 1997, I trapped 1404 weevils in six traps (average of 234). In 1996 I trapped 72 (average of 9); 1995-934 (average was 116.75); 1994 - 1328 (average of 166); and. 1993 - 505 (average was 63.13). As you can tell, 1998 is the lowest year that I have trapped.

Well, I didn't quite get to everything that I had hoped to cover. Maybe what is left will fit in nextweeks article. Anyone interested in the cotton insect guides or the small magnifying lenses should give me a call (454-2651) as soon as possible. I only have ten and they will go fast. If you are interested in the boll weevil trap counts please let me know. I check traps (normally) on Friday mornings. Call my office Friday after lunch or on Monday and I should have the numbers calculated. I also have some copies of "Suggested Insecticides for Managing Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans Pecos Areas of Texas - 1998" available. These are updated annually by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are a good cotton insect pest control guide. For more information about the contents of this article, please give Paul Weiser a call in the Knox County Extension office at 454-2651.

on aphids will control thrips. Whatever product is used, be careful to check that all directions on the label are followed and that it is labelled for that particular plant or crop.

Thrips have been a problem in blackeyed peas, onions, watermelons, tomatoes, trees, shrubs, and flowers. I have not scouted any cotton fields. I believe that with the over abundance of thrips so far this year, they will soon hit cotton fields in strong numbers.

Methods of control in cotton include Di-Syston, Furadon, Orthene, Temik and Thimet at planting. Foliar applications include Bidrin, Bimethoate, Cygon, Cythion, Metasystox and Orthene.

In order for good control you must positively identify the pest-- whether it is thrips, aphids, boll weevils, etc. The Bayer Corporation has graciously mailed me ten cotton insect identification and control guides along with the pocket manifying glasses. The combination of these two can help with proper insect pest identification. Contact the Extension office in Benjamin if you would like one of these.

One distinctive characteristic of thrip damage is leaves that appear to be wilting. However, if drought is causing the leaves to wilt they will curl down. If thrips are a problem the leaves will curl upward. Look on the bottom of these leaves and some nearby healthy leaves and you should find some tiny yellowed colored insects.

While on the subject of cotton insects, lets look at this years boll weevil trap counts. I have been checking these traps since 1993. Here is how the week of May 30 through June 5, 1998 compares to the first week of June in 1993-1997. This year I trapped a total of 6 weevils in eight traps for an average of 0.75 weevils per trap.







Tony Romero

...an inspiration to me

This past week and a half, I've been gone from the News office, gone from Knox City, and gone from my family and just about everything I know and feel comfortable with. On vacation? No. flew to Albuquerque, New Mexico, to be a patient at the Veterans Hospital while having a brand new knee installed in my right leg. The one previously put in back in 1991 had worn out, and it was time for 'new parts.'

While there, I had a wide variety of experiences, ranging from the pain and discomfort of the surgery, to meeting some of the nicest people I've ever met in my life.

The surgery was not an easy one, and a full recovery is sure to take quite some time. The uncomfortable time following the operation was made easier by being around a wonderful group of Doctors, nurses, therapists, and fellow patients. The professional staff at the Albuquerque VA Medical Center is second to none. Their dedication, compassion and kindness was something I have never experienced in the VA system before.

A brilliant therapist (Lynn) in the Physical Therapy unit was assigned to me and it was her task to get me up and walking once again. Hers was not an easy task, I assure you. The pain worsened with movement, but she knew how to get me past the pain to work the knee. Her positive attitude wore off on me and won out as I progressed fast enough to be

roommate was a man in his late 50's who had suffered a stroke. Tony Romero was one of the biggest inspirations I have ever had in my life. Here was a man who was having a hard time using one side of his body, was fighting to regain control of his speech, and in my opinion, had every right to be mad and be asking 'why me?' Yet Tony never did this, he never looked back to why he was there, he just accepted it and went on with his life. His sense of humor was always present as he pulled off one prank after another against both nursing staff and fellow patients alike. More important than his humor though, was Tony's dedication to his Christian beliefs. Tony wheeled around the hospital with his one good leg and good hand propelling his wheelchair from one patient to another, either reading his bible or offering prayers. He explained his mission to me this way: His stroke had happened while he was in church. The church was right next to a fire station where the paramedics were located. Since Tony had his bible with him in church, it went to the hospital with him in the ambulance. Tony then figured that God wanted him to have his bible there in the hospital since it happened that way, so he'd better do God's will and use it!

Tony had a profound impact on me. Seeing what he could do in his condition made me realize. what I had to do - without any complaining. He introduced me to his family, and what a wonderful group they are. This man was indeed blessed to be a husband, father and grandfather.

Tony was a blessing to me, helping me through recovery sooner than expected, and help-: ing me to square away a few thingswith God. My faith was renewed. and some questions were answered, all by a man who was in: worse shape than I, yet who never let his mission for God falter because of a hindered physical condition.

While I left for Albuquerque

with mental reservations about this *

surgery, I returned with both a

new knee and a renewed spirit.

Thanks to Tony Romero, that is



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A closer look at aging eyes

According to ophthalmologists glaucoma can also impact central viwith the Cullen Eye Institute at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, changes in prescription lenses will often allow people with cataracts to see well enough to continue their usual activities. Surgery to remove cataracts, a clouding of the lens, is another option for patients. It has a success rate of nearly 100 percent, as long as no other eye disease is present.

Glaucoma is referred to as the "silent thief" because it is a disease that strikes without warning and presents few initial symptoms. It causes increased pressure in the eye, which damages the optic nerve. Patients experience the loss of peripheral or side vision first. If left untreated,

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sion and cause blindness. Once vision is lost, there is no treatment to reverse the damage. However, if detected early, there are several treatment options to prevent further loss of vision. Eye drops, medications and laser surgery are all used to lower the pressure in the

eyes and help patients live more

comfortably with glaucoma. Regular eye exams are vital to help you see clearly later in life. Ophthalmologists recommend that people over the age of 50 have a complete medical eye exam every two to three years. Diabetics and people with a family history of glaucoma or other eye disease should be examined once a year.

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
