

## County approved for emergency haying, grazing

Knox County has been approved for emergency having and grazing of CRP acres due to the current ongoing drouth, according to information released by the Knox County FSA.

Rules are as follows: Grazing: 1. The CRP annual rental payment will be reduced by 25% for the number of acres actually grazed regardless of the stocking rate or the number of days grazed.

2. The grazing deadline is now thru September 30, 1998, unless grazing conditions return to normal before that date.

3. Grazing may be used by the CRP participant or leased to any eligible livestock producer in the

4. The CRP participant must obtain a modified conservation plan from NRCS (SCS).

5. Participants must sign an agreement and obtain approval from Knox County FSA Office before grazing begins.

6.25% of each field or contiguous field must be left ungrazed for wildife or grazed at no more than 75% of the stocking rate determined by NRCS (SCS).

7. Acres grazed must be reported to the FSA Office by October 9, 1998.

Haying: 1. The CRP annual rental payment wil be reduced by 25% for the number of acres actually hayed.

2. The baling deadline is now thru August 31, 1998 unless conditions return to normal before that date. Hay must be hauled off of the CRP acres by October 1,

3. Haying is limited to one cutting.

4. The same acres cannot be both hayed and grazed.

5. CRP participants may use the hay for their own use or lease the having rights to an eligible livestock producer in the county. The actual hay may not be sold.

6.50% of each field or contiguous field must be left unhayed for wildlife.

7. CRP participants must obtain a modified conservation plan from NRCS (SCS) before haying.

8. Participants must sign an agreement and obtain approval from the Knox County FSA Office before haying begins. Acres hayed must be reported to the FSA Office by September 4, 1998.

# Tobacco settlement to aid county

### Involving indigent health care obligations

What should be an historic agreement involving parties representing the State of Texas vs. the tobacco industry have agreed in principle that allows Texas counties with indigent health care obligations to receive an equitable share of the state's settlement with the tobacco industry. The agreement provides that counties and hospital districts will receive all additional money from the tobacco companies which will be approximately \$2.2 billion.

Knox County would receive an estimated \$90,000 over a three year period starting January 1999, Knox County Judge David N. Perdue reported. Judge Perdue is the first vice-president of the

County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas that was one of the front runners seeking those funds for counties.

Approximately \$450 million will be paid to local governments in lump sum payments during January 1999, 2000 and 2001. The remaining \$1.8 billion will be used to establish a permanent endowment fund, the income will then be distributed solely to local governments for unreimbursed health care expenses. The interest on the endowment fund, which will vary year to year, should generate \$1 million per year on a permanent

Judge Perdue said, "this is certainly the largest mutual agree-

ment achieved between the state and its counties and will provide substantial benefits to county tax-

Speaker Pete Laney, State Representative Rob Junell, Senator Bill Ratliff, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock and Governor Bush's active participation in this settlement were vitally important in these negotiations.

The unified support of both the Texas Association of Counties and the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas were essential to this successful effort. It is anticipated that the terms of this agreement will be completed and that a final agreement will be executed by the first of August.











# Rep. Counts says area to receive more than a million from tobacco agreement settlement

State Representative David Counts, D-Knox City, announced Monday that counties and hospital districts within House District 70 will receive more than a million dollars from a tobacco agreement reached over the weekend.

Legislative leaders have been working with counties and hospital districts for several months to find a fair and equitable way to distribute part of Texas' multibillion-dollar settlement to those entities. Under the agreement, the entity receiving the payment may be the county, hospital district and / or other political subdivision depending on which entity has the legal responsibility for providing indigent health care.

Preliminary estimates indicate that in January 1999 an estimated \$14,111 will be distributed within Borden County; \$85,515 within Fisher County; \$90,831 with Garza County; \$571,212 withing Howard County; \$291,231 within Jones County; \$17,838 within Kent County; \$6,252 within King County; \$85,427 within Knox County; \$119,354 within Lynn County; \$293,068 within Nolan County; \$329,096 within Scurry County; \$35,552 within Stonewall County. This money will come from an initial lump sum payment of \$300 million that will be distributed on a per capitabasis by the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

In addition to the initial lump sum payment, a Permanent Trust

Account will be established and funded over a four-year period in

the amount of approximately \$1.8 billion. The income from this permanent fund will be distributed to the counties and hospital districts on a pro rate basis in proportion to their amount of unreimbursed health care expenditures for indigent health care.

"This trust account will provide a large continuing source of revenue to help offset the cost of providing health care. This approach will guarantee that this settlement will provide lasting benefits for Texans," Representative Counts said.

Legislative leaders met Saturday, July 18, with the counsel for the counties and hospital districts that intervened in the tobacco settlement and Judge Jim Meyers, a court-appointed mediator. As a result of that meeting, an agreement was reached. It includes the stipulation that the motion for sanctions against the governor and several legislators must be withdrawn before this agreement is finalized.

Activities began with an opening assembly. During this assembly, 4-H'ers nominated candidates for District 3 4-H council offices. This activity was followed by "The Real Game".

"The Real Game" is an exercise used to teach youth better financial management. Every youth was given a career. This included vacation time and a salary. They could then select a place to live, type of transportation and any other luxuries.

Once the youth made these decisions they were given formulas to figure utility bills, vehicle expenses, clothing & food costs, etc. Their challenge was to spend less than they made.

This exercise was followed by an hour and a half of free time (swimming for most), an evening meal, and a dance. The day ended with vespers. The second day began at 7:30 a.m. with flag raising. The two delegates from Knox County - Jennifer Eaton and Logan Morrow from Knox City were assigned KP duty after breakfast. Jennifer helped clear dishes while Logan swept the dining hall.

After breakfast, the youth at-


volleyball and mush ball.

# July Sales tax rebate for Knox City

Monthly total down 15.18% from year ago

(Austin) State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$174.5 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,091 Texas cities and 118 counties, including a check of \$9,091.12 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects a decrease of 15.18% from a rebate check of \$10,718.66 for the same period in 1997. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards EDC funding.

Texas cities received \$159.6 million, 13.9 percent higher than payments of \$140 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 14.9 million in rebates, 9.45 percent above the \$13.6 million in allocations for the same period in 1997.

The checks delivered this month are for sales taxes collected in May and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in June.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$144.48, a 22.46% increase from \$117.98 for the same period a year ago. Goree received \$262.17, down 31.04% from a payment of \$380.23 last year at the same time. Munday received \$4,870.34 down 6% from a payment of \$5,181.73 in 1997 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$20,413.63, up 8.94% from a payment of \$18,737.35 in 1997. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$21.82 this period, down 5.50% from a payment of \$23.09 a year ago. Rochester received \$550.85, up 34.70% form a payment of \$408.92 during the same period

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$40,479.18, up 8.30% from a payment of \$37,374.68 in 1997. Anson received \$9,763.11, up 25.04% from a payment of \$7,807.43 last year. Hamlin received a check of \$11,012.17, up 2.06% from \$10,789.61 in 1997. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax.

In Baylor County, the city of Seymour received a payment of \$10,875.45, down 4.77% from a payment of \$11,420.29 in 1997. Seymour collects a 1.000 rate of sales tax.

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$2,358.85, down 2.61% from a payment of \$2,422.29 in 1997. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received \$1,999.55, down 11.30% from a payment of \$2,254.32 in 1997. Spur received a payment of \$3,203.02, up 0.18% from a 1997 payment of \$3,197.03. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$3,639.67, up 71.96% from a payment of \$2,116.46 in 1997. Paducah collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax.

# Descendants of James N. and Margaret A. Brooking McGaughey enjoy biannual reunion

Descendants of James N. and Margaret A. Brooking McGaughey met, July 4 and 5, 1998, at the Vera Community Center for their biannual reunion. Sixty-four family members and three guests registered for the event.

James N. McGaughey was born March 7, 1867, in Mt. Hope, Alabama. His parents, James Harvey and Fannie Baldridge McGaughey and their children moved to Waco, Texas about 1871. Soon after his father died in 1883, James N. set out to make his own way. His youth was spent working for various ranches in Baylor and Wilbarger Counties, Greer County, Indian Territory, and in the Texas Panhandle.

Margaret A. Brooking was born August 9, 1873, in Brinkley, Arkansas. Her parents were William Horton and Sarah Golightly Brooking. They moved their family from Goliad, Texas to Baylor County, about 1883. They made their home on land that is now a part of the Waggoner Ranch.

It was in Baylor County that James N. McGaughey and Margaret A. Brooking met. They married there August 17, 1891. In 1905, they moved to the Vera community, where they farmed and reared a large family. They, their children, and many of their grandchildren and great-grandchildren were members of the Vera Methodist Church. Several are still members of that church and attend regularly. James N. and Margaret A. McGaughey are buried in the Vera Cemetery.

Lewis and Betty Lyles attended a family reunion in Abilene during the weekend.


