





OATHS FOR TEACHERS

Teachers in both public and private schools in the state of New York are required to take an oath of allegiance, in compliance with a law recently enacted and signed by Governor Lehman, and bills containing similar provisions are sponsored in several other states.

It might seem to some rather superfluous to ask a teacher to take an oath of allegiance to the government and Constitution, but the fact that many of them have objected to taking the oath indicates that the requiremen may not be such a bad idea after all. A teacher, who unquestionably wields a marked influence in shaping the after life of the school child, is in a better position than any other except the parents to train a child to be patriotic and loyal to the country and no district would think of retaining a teacher who sows seeds of disloyalty in the minds of children. It might be assumed that teachers, who earn their livelihood through government, would be the last suspected of unloyalty, but it is said that no less than 800 of New York's teachers have protested against being compelled to swear allegiance to the government and the Constitution.

It may be that these teachers merely object to having their loyalty and patriotism questioned, but since every official must take an oath of allegiance and as there are few positions in which loyalty to the nation is more essential than that of a teacher, it is difficult to see why there should be any objection to the oath unless the teacher be a Communist or other enemy of the Constitution. A loyal teacher could have no valid reason for not declaring his or her loyalty, and refusal to make such a declaration might be taken as rather conclusive evidence that the teacher in question was unfit to teach future American citizens.

So the progressive merchant, having the welfare of his store at heart, endeavors to gain the confidence, the respect and the interest of his trade.

There was a time when the tradesman sat within his dingy shop and heckled and bargained across the counter with his customers. He drove keen bargains. Progress, however, has decreed that this type of merchant join the departed brotherhood of the itinerant peddler, the dinosaur and the three-toed horse.

A progressive community demands progressive stores. The shops and business establishments which a community supports bespeak the prosperity of that community. Their interests are identical. They work in harmony.

So the progressive merchant must have the interests of his community at heart. He is advertising his town. His town will not admit laxity in this service. He must serve his patrons with the best. He finds his business far more than retailing goods at a profit. He must inculcate into his business the progressiveness of the community; he must reflect the substantiality of his trade; he must inspire confidence in his business by service accomplished and value given.

GETTING THE BUSINESS

Make free use of printer's ink. Talk to the world about your business-the line of goods you carry; their style, peculiarities and adaptabilities. In purchasing, do so with care, remembering that goods well bought are half sold. Make careful selections, buy cheap, and make the selling price reasonable. Tell the people what you will do, and do as you advertise, every time. Send out your messages every week. The people look for it and are disappointed if they see it not; and it is often the case after your long silence, the constant appeals of others have caught the eye and drawn thitherward many a good customer you once had, who is now a patron of him who neglected not to tell where to go to get what he wanted, at reasonable rates. This is as it will be, and as it should be, in this busy age. People take and read the paper for a purpose, and one is to find out where they can get what they want without spending a day hunting all over town for it. The merchant who apprises them of this fact, in a judicious way, will be the one that catches the trade, builds up a lucrative business, and makes his calling a success.

Scarlet Fever Still Menaces

AUSTIN, Texas-"Scarlet fever still continues to be a menace to children," said Dr. John W. Brown. State Health Officer, in discussing diseases common to children. "Many cases are slight, but they may infect others who may become serously ill. It it treacherous and undesirable, and the only good thing about it is that if one can avoid it until grown, the chances of never getting it are excellent.

"Scarlet fever is spread by the transfer of the infection in the discharges of nose and throat, ears, or abscesses of persons ill with the disease and those who are carriers of the infection. The handling of ar-ticles soiled by the patient may cause the disease.

"Children under ten years of age are usually susceptible to scarlet fever. Children becoming suddenly ill with fever, sore throat, vomiting and showing a fine red rash, should have medical attention and be immediately quarantined to prevent the spread of this disease. The appearance of scarlet fever in the home should be immediately follow-

"The use of potent scarlet fever antitoxin is of value in shortening the course of the disease. The antitoxin should be administered within three days of the onset, Scarlet fever antitoxin lessens the com-plications, such as heart and kidney diseases, discharging ears and infected sinuses that ofetn occur after scarlet fever. Scarlet fever can be prevented by first giving the Dick test to all children and the administration of scarlet fever toxin to all children that are susceptible.
