Dove season expected good, despite dry weather Begins September 1 through October 30

State wildlife officials expect good dove hunting despite widespread drought conditions across Texas. Hunting near watering and feeding sites should be as productive as ever.

"Our surveys this past spring indicated dove breeding populations remained similar to last year," Jay Roberson, dove program leader with Texas Parks and Wildlife, explained. "There will probably be an impact on production due to the drought and that could have a negative impact on hunting, since most of the birds

harvested are from the current year's hatch. But, some hunters may not see that if they're hunting around water, which will concentrate more birds."

Texas boasts a dove population in excess of 40 million birds, See Dove season, Page 3

David Crain of the David Crain New Life Ministries, Inc. of Grand Saline will be the musician and speaker for the four night cru-


Crain, who is known as a high-energy, dynamic musician and speaker, is said to inspire and challenge people to live for Christ.

KC-O'Brien CISD 'makes the grade'

With TEA ratings, high school is exemplary, mid-school recognized, elementary acceptable

FORT WORTH - Knox City High School was among a record number of Texas school district campuses earning an exemplary rating, the highest rating possible, from the state's accountability system, Commissioner of Education Mike Moses, has announced.

O'Brien Mid-School was rated as recognized and Knox City Elementary was acceptable.

The accountability ratings are based on the percentage of students passing the reading, writing and mathematics sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills examination, the dropout rate and attendance rate.

Campuses can earn ratings of exemplary, recognized, acceptable and low performing.

This year, 120 districts earned the exemplary rating, compared to 65 in 1997. Exemplary ratings were earned by 1,042 campuses in 1998, compared to 683 last year.

This year, 328 districts received arating of recognized, as did 1,641 campuses. That is an increase over the 321 districts and 1,617 campuses that received this secondhighest rating last year.

There were 3,310 campuses that earned acceptable ratings, compared to 3,679 last year.

The number of campuses earning low-performing status dropped from 67 in 1997 to 60

To earn an exemplary rating this year, at least 90 percent of all the students and each student group (African American, Hispanic, white and economically disadvantaged) had to pass the reading, writing and mathematics sections of the TAAS test.

A dropout rate of less than 1 percent for all students and each student group and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent were also required.

A recognized rating required a TAAS passing rate in each subject of at least 80 percent for all students and each student group, a dropout rate of 3.5 percent or less for all students and student groups and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent.

To earn a rating of academically acceptable for a district or acceptable for a campus, a TAAS passing rate of at least 40 percent for all students and each group was needed, as was a dropout rate of six percent or less for all students and student groups and an attendance rate of at least 94 per-

A TAAS passing rate below 40

percent for all students or any student group, a dropout rate above six percent for all students or any student group and an attendance rate below 94 percent caused districts to receive an academically unacceptable rating and campuses to receive a low-performing rating.

The 1998 ratings criteria include a five percent increase in the TAAS passing standards for the recognized and acceptable categories.

This year, the TAAS performance of 1,544,688 students was included in the August accountability ratings. That number will increase when year-round results are included.

The program was developed by WTU's Economic Development department to assist communities in preparing strategies that will enhance opportunities for economic growth and development.



"If there is seed on the ground, dry weather usually makes it easier for doves to feed. They prefer feeding on open ground where they can get to the seeds and they like to land on dry, open ground near tanks and lakes when watering."

If the dry weather persists, George added, it may actually be of benefit to hunters. "With fewer sources of water, the birds are

going to congregate around those remaining watering places," he explained.

Dove season runs from September 1 to October 30 in the north zone where Knox County is

The daily bag limit is 15 birds, including no more than two whitewinged doves.

Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit and hunters are reminded that they cannot legally take more than one daily bag limit in one day.

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


