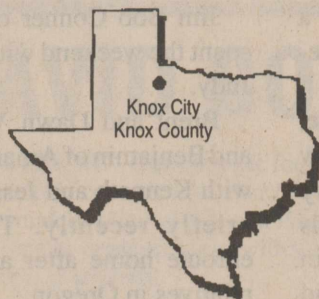

Although the score remained 0-0 for most of the game, Motley County scored with 3:43 left in the 4th quarter, and then again in the last minute of the game to defeat the Greyhounds 14-0.

The Greyhound defense played an extremely tough ball game, holding the Matadors scoreless until the final minutes. On both offense and defense, the Greyhounds were severely hampered by a high number of penalties.

Knox City will play at home this Friday night, hosting the Cowboys from Bryson with the game time set for 8:00 p.m.

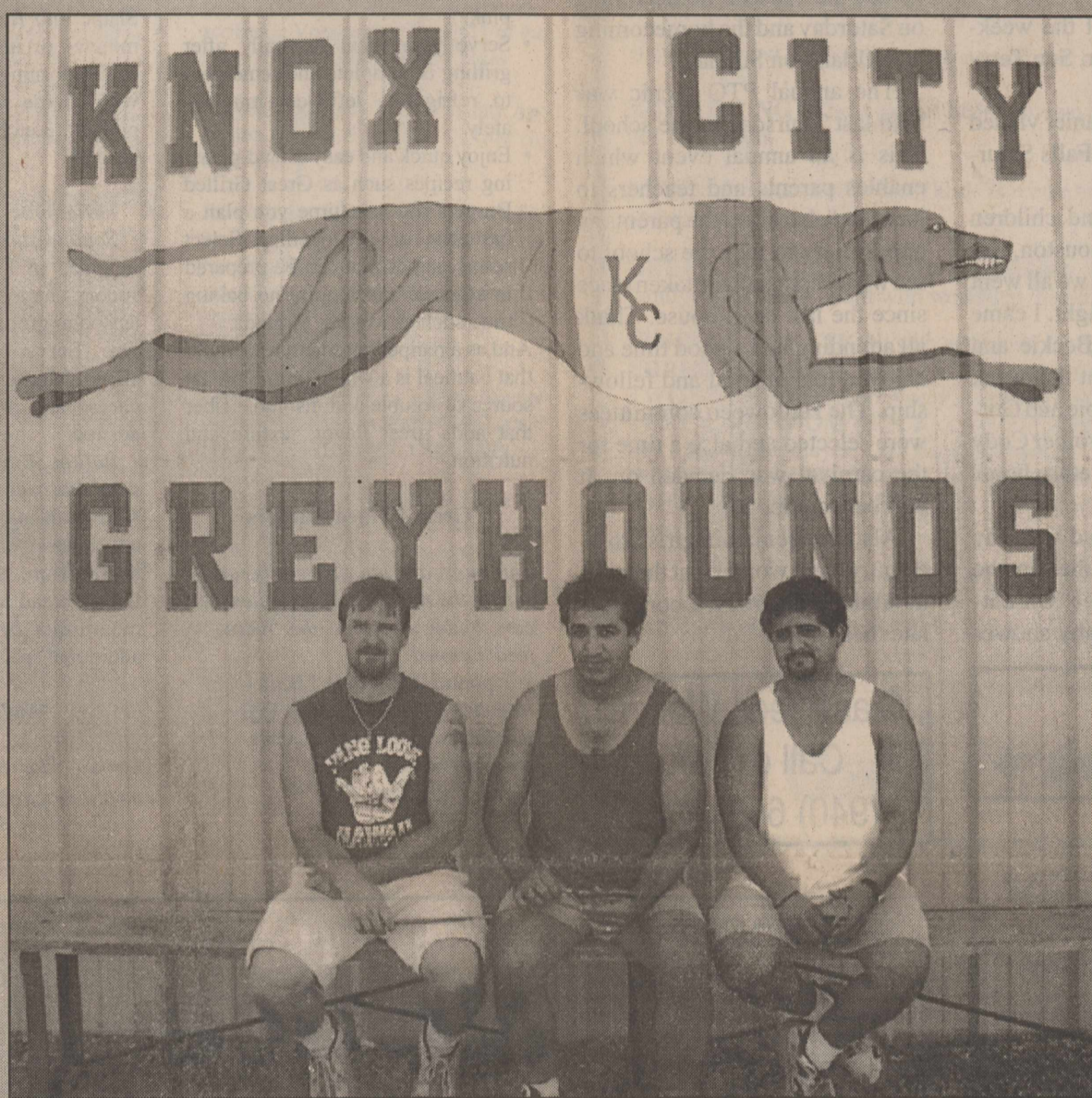
### Immunization clinic set

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center/Housing Authority in Knox City on Tuesday, September 22, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps, Chickenpox (Varicella) and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Hepatitis B immunization is required for kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. This immunization series consists of three injections taking a minimum of six months to complete. The hepatitis B immunization is also available for any child at risk or any child whose parents wish them to have for protection or prevention.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor. Services are provided on a sliding fee scale, but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. For more information, call 817-574-2159.

### Lions Club schedules 1998 fundraising sale

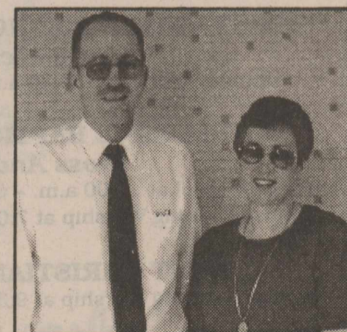

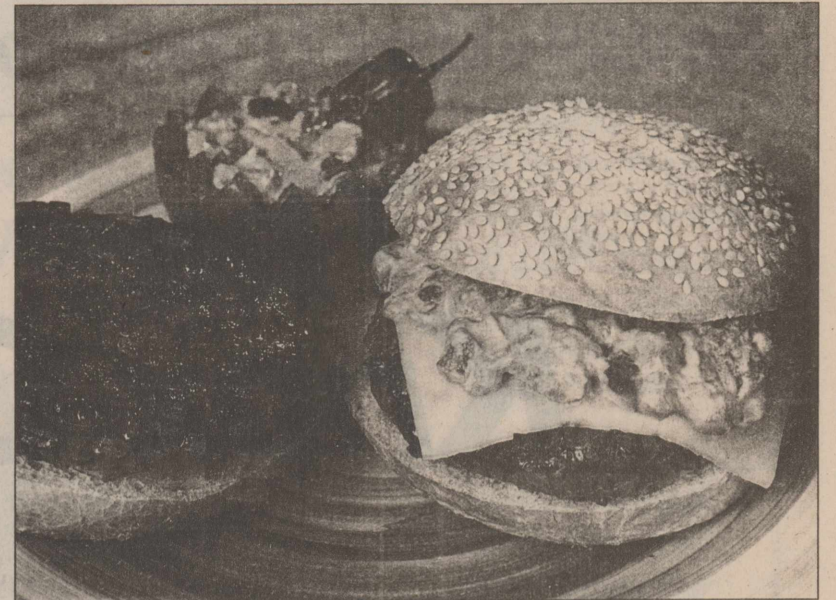

**Italian Burgers:** Use meatless spaghetti sauce in place of ketchup. Add 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese and 1 teaspoon dried basil leaves to beef mixture. Serve on thick slices of Italian bread topped with a slice of mozzarella or provol cheese and additional spaghetti sauce, if desired.

### Muddy Mounds

*Let the kids help make these oatmeal-filled sweet treats. The colorful*

*gummy worms make this high fiber no-bake cookie a fun dessert or snack.*

- 2 cups sugar
- ½ cup unsweetened cocoa
- ½ cup (1 stick) margarine or butter
- ½ cup skim milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4½ cups 3 Minute Brand® Quick or Old Fashioned Oats
- 24 gummy worms

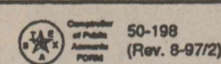

## County lowers tax rate, adopts budget

Knox County Commissioners Court lowered the tax rate and adopted a budget for 1998-99.

Commissioners unanimously approved a tax rate of .7350 cents per \$100 valuation down from last year's rate of .75 cents.

This makes four years in a row the court has either reduced the tax rate or held the same rate. The new rate will generate approxi-

mately the same amount of tax revenues as last year's.

Total revenue was projected to be \$1,535,000 with an operational budget of approximately \$1,494,518.

County Judge David N. Perdue advised that evaluations were up over last year but cautioned that the county could be in serious trouble if the price of oil contin-

ues to decline. "We are pleased to be able to again lower the tax rate without cutting service. We have actually added to our budget by including the County Historical Commission to our budget, combining some equipment purchases in our commissioners' budget for updated equipment purchases and building a new District Courtroom annex," Judge Perdue reported.

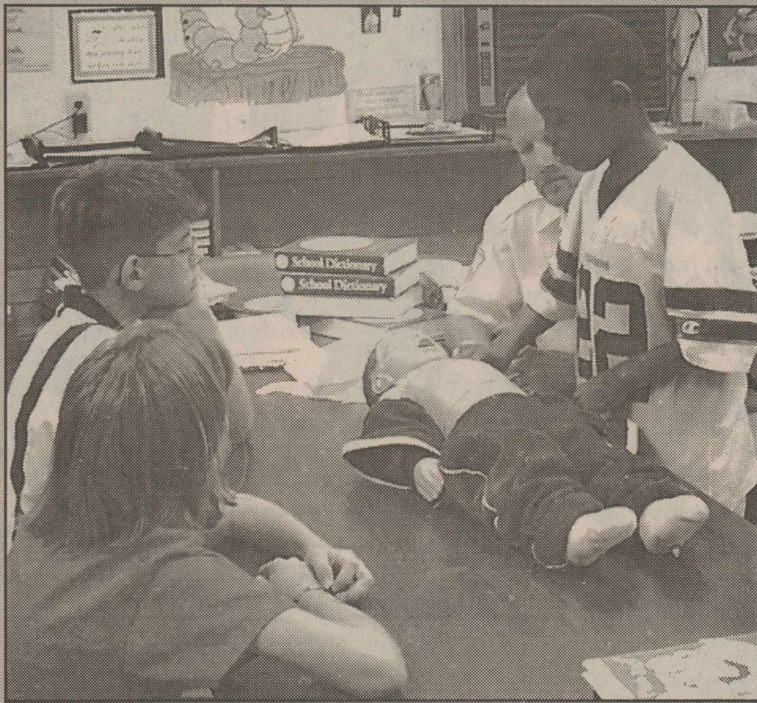

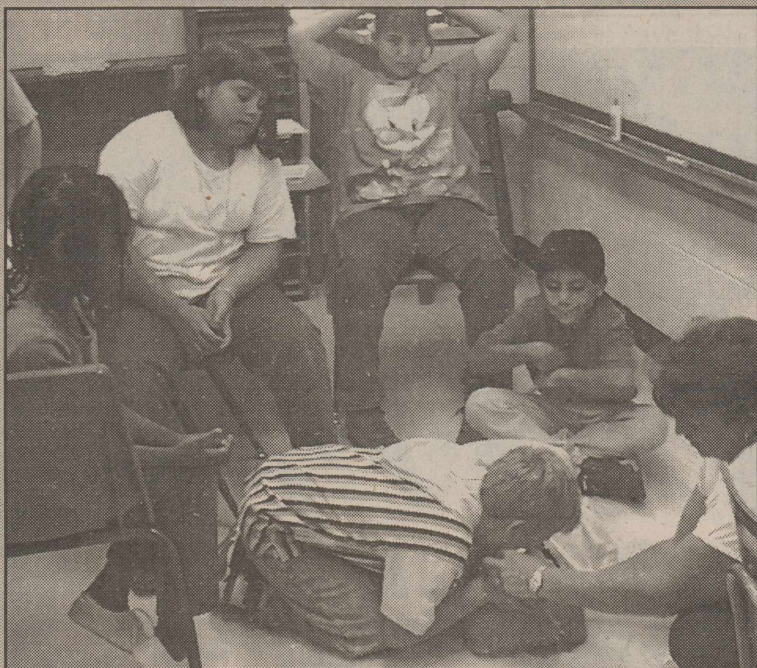

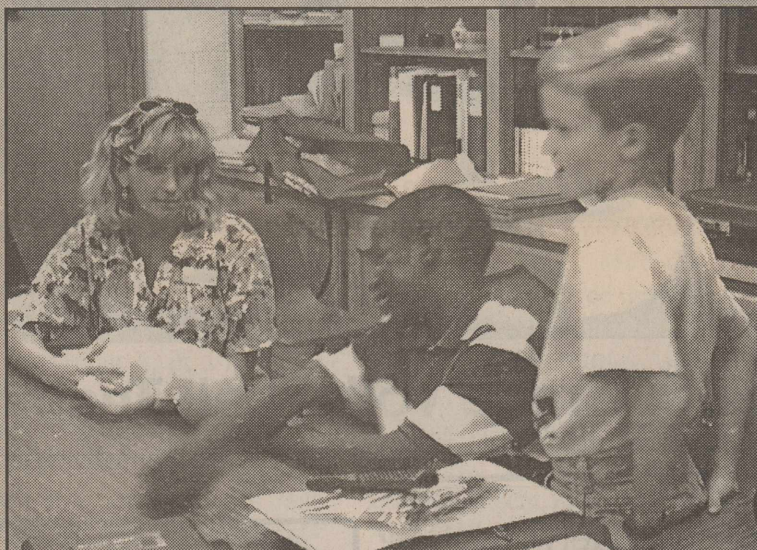

...let's root FOR our kids

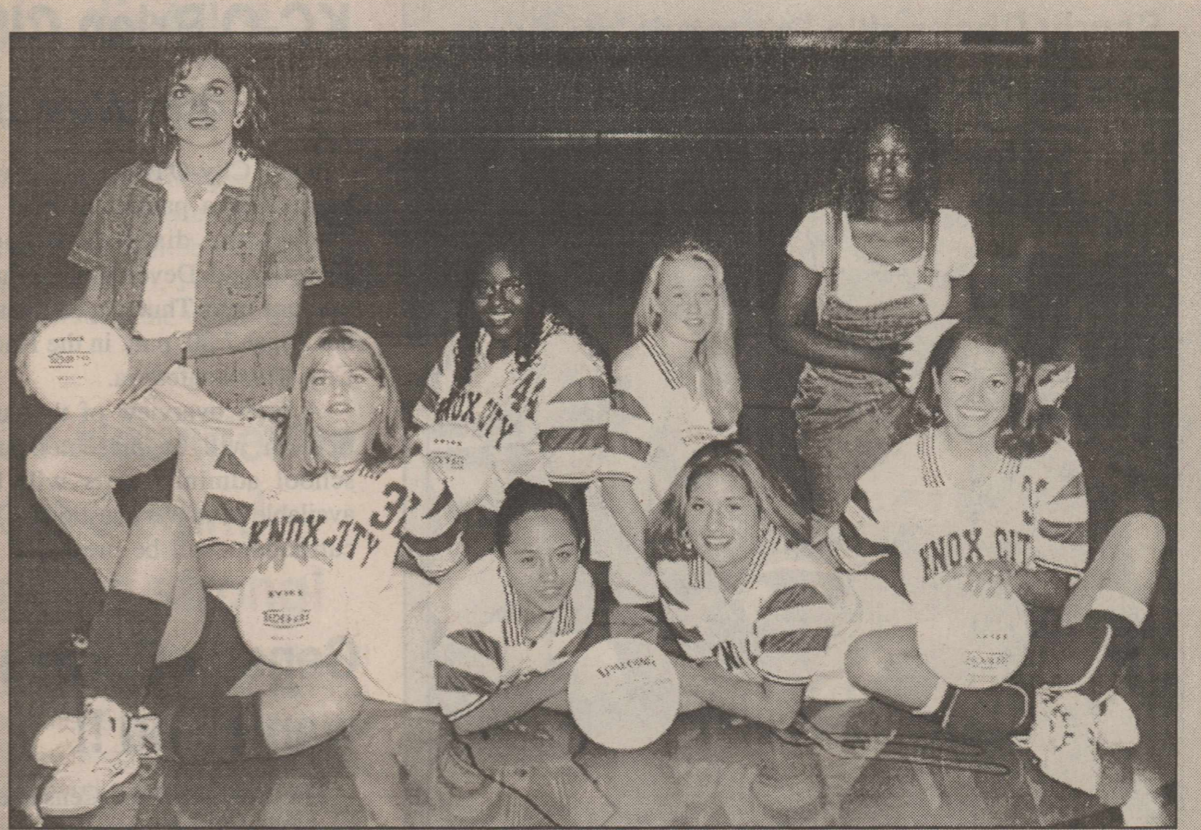

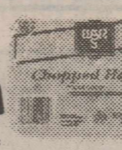

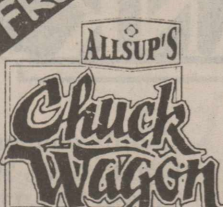
