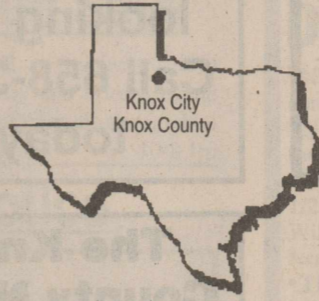

HealthFair '98 is Saturday at hospital

The Knox County Hospital District will be sponsoring HealthFair '98, Saturday, October 10, from 9:30 a.m. until 12:00 noon on the front lawn of the hospital.

Among the features this year will be free blood pressure checks, First Flight Air Ambulance, bone density scan, cholesterol screening, glucose levels, refreshments and drawings for free t-shirts. Flu shots will also be given and are \$5.00 payable at the time of service.

The purpose of HealthFair '98 is to allow the area residents to browse around various healthcare related vendors and providers, to

see first hand the various healthcare options that affect daily lives.

Whether it is preventive medicine, wellness or the latest in medical technology, all aspects of the medical field will have representation. This year will be the first year to have the bone density scan testing which will be of no charge to the patient. The purpose of this test is early detection of possible bone loss and osteoporosis. The test is completely painless and is conducted on adults over the age of 30 and the results are tabulated instantly.

As in prior HealthFairs for the hospital district, cholesterol and

glucose screenings will be offered at no charge. It is requested; however, that glucose screenings have the blood drawn prior to eating or drinking for the day.

In the hospital's 'Wellness Center', a climate controlled atmosphere with the latest in treadmills, exercise bicycles, rowing machine, stair steppers and a complete set of weight equipment, are available. Contact Teresa Murray at 658-3535 for details on discounted regular membership fees.

In the event of inclement weather, the HealthFair will be held inside the hospital. Come rain or shine, its HealthFair '98 time!

Greyhounds robbed of win in final 17 seconds of tough game

Friday night's game against the Petrolia Pirates was an exciting battle that came down to the last few seconds of the game.

The Greyhounds took the ball on their first possession and drove down the field. Their drive stalled following a holding penalty, but they kept the ball for most of the first quarter, and turned the ball over on downs deep on the Pirates' end of the field.

Early in the second quarter, the Greyhounds drove down and scored on a short run by Michael Baez. Myles Richardson added the point after, and Knox City was up 7-0. Petrolia, however, came right back with a couple of big plays to score and added the point after to take the lead 8-7.

The score remained unchanged until the fourth quarter when Knox City put together nice drive which ended in a Brandon Gutierrez touchdown. Myles Richardson's kick for the point after was blocked leaving the Greyhounds ahead 13-8.

Again, those pesky Pirates came right back to score a touchdown with 5:31 left in the ball game. Their extra point attempt was no good, but they had the lead 14-13.

The Knox City Greyhounds then mounted an impressive drive which ended in a Nefro Gonzales run for a touchdown and a Nefro Gonzalez run for the two point conversion with only 1:34 left on the clock.

This last Greyhound drive included some nice runs and some well executed blocking from the front line and seemed to pull out a victory for the Greyhound Homecoming. However, the Petrolia Pirates came right back with a long pass and a short run to score. Then, the Pirates' attempt at a two point conversion was good to take the lead 22-21 with only 17 seconds left to play. The players on both teams should be commended for their tremendous effort and a very thrilling game.

help defray medical and travel expenses for Carol Felts who is waiting for a heart transplant in a

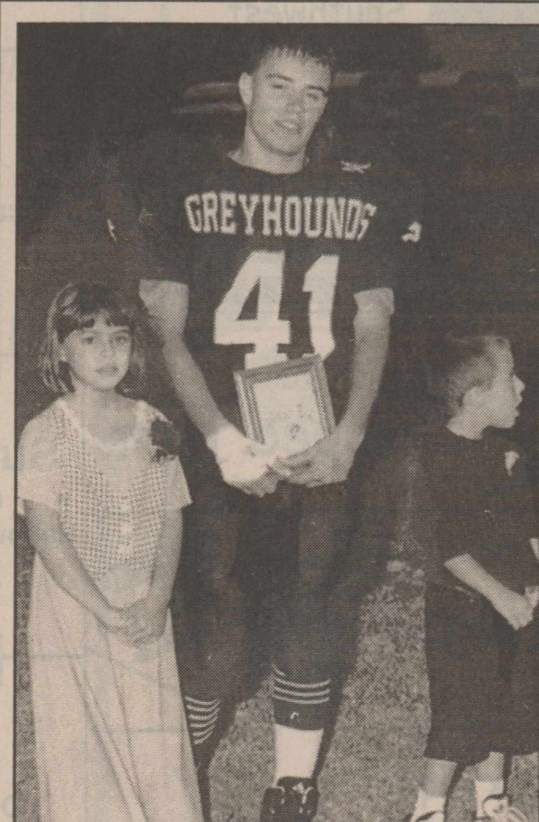

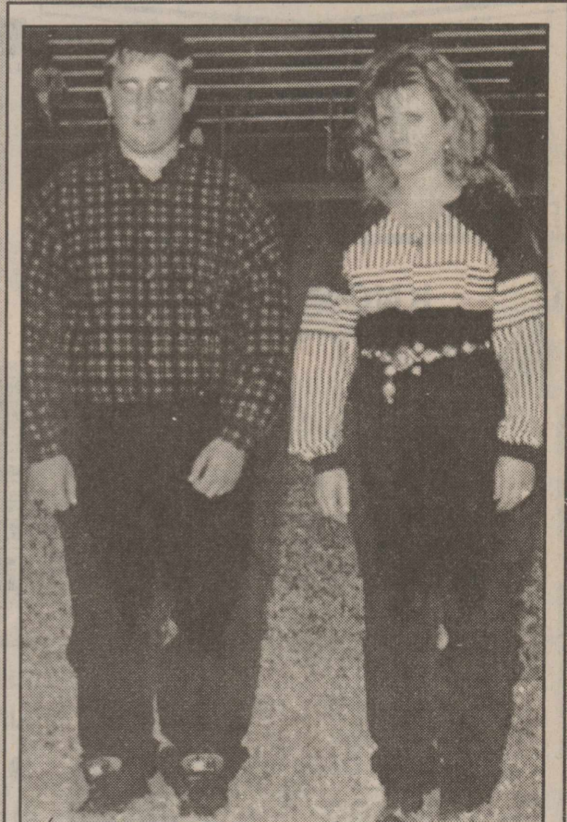

Hospital to participate in 'Think Child Safety'

Knox County Hospital Trauma Center is participating in a "Think Child Safety" program sponsored by Big Country Regional Advisory Committee.

This program is geared toward educating the youth in Knox County on how to be safe in their everyday lives and avoid unnecessary injury and death. To utilize the teenage student population to reach younger children in the message of safety. To create safe zones for children in emergencies using community resources. To build community safety coalitions to protect children and to reduce the number of injuries and death in Texas children.

This program was originally started by the Paris-Lamar county EMS after they lost nine children in a six-month period.

The Regional Advisory Committee has adopted this very worthwhile program for public education. The trauma center will be needing "Think Child Safety Partners" from all the town in Knox County to assist with buying t-shirts, stickers and other material.

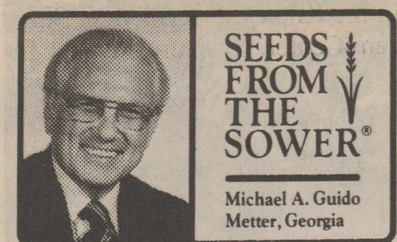
