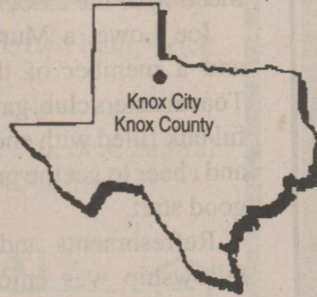

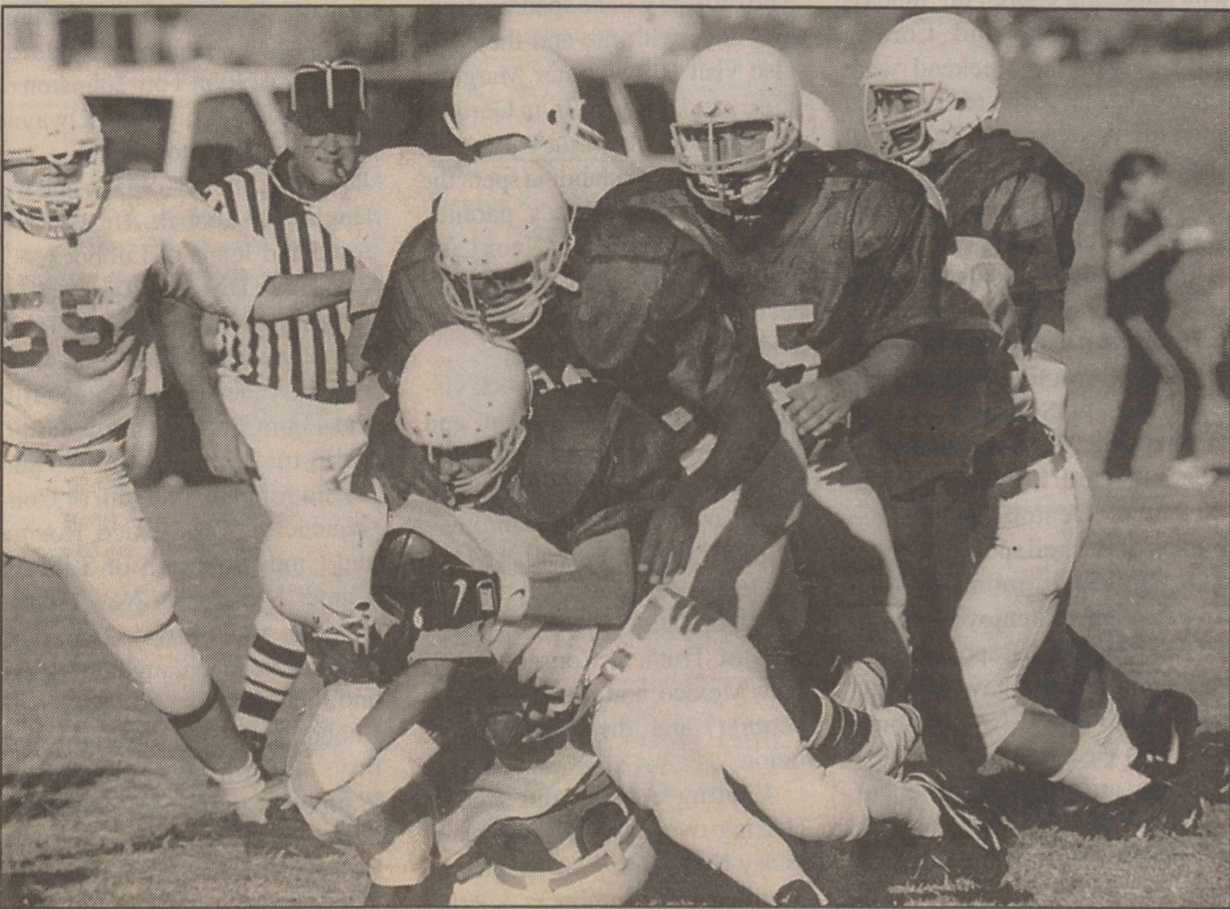

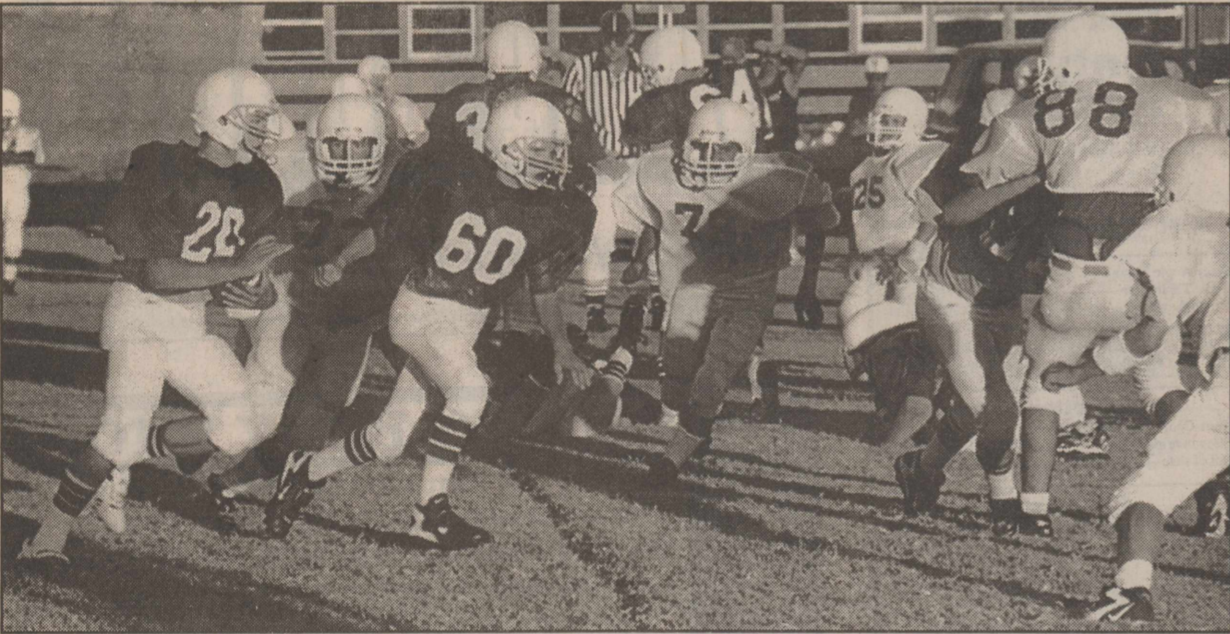


## O'Brien Bulldogs on a roll



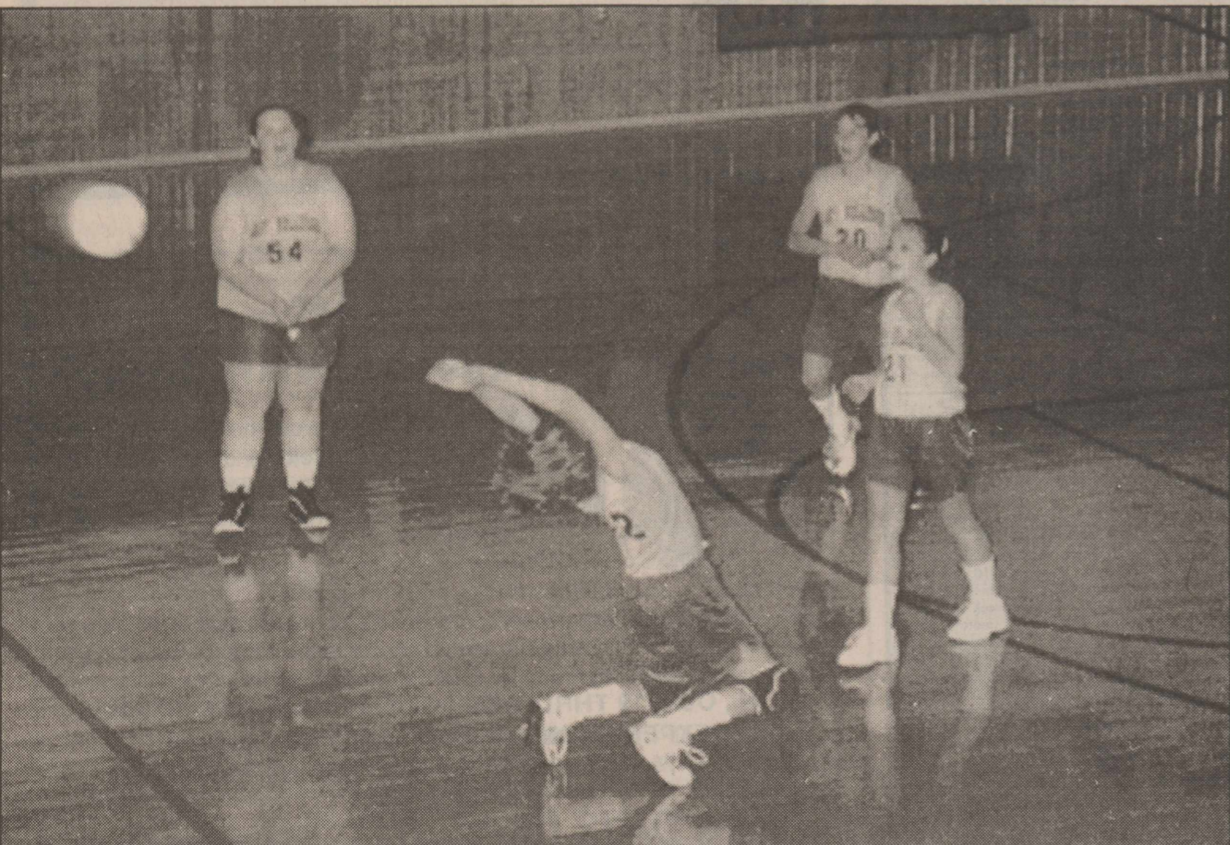

The Knox City girls are in the lead with only four district games remaining.

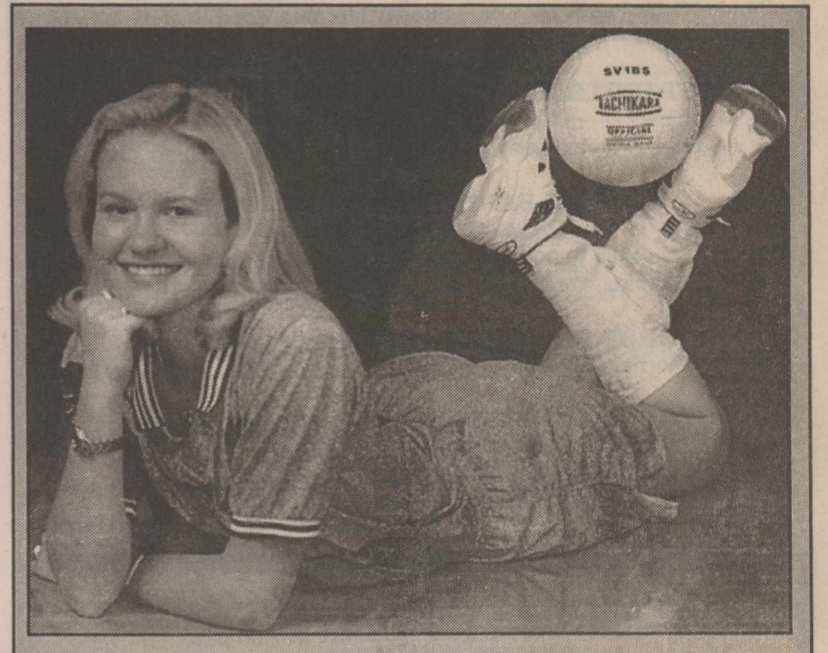

Friday night's game against the Munday Moguls was a hard hitting, tough battle.

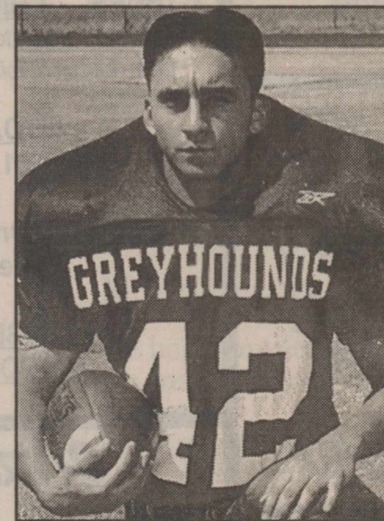
Early in the game, the Greyhounds turned the ball over four times on their own end of the field. Those four turnovers led to three touchdowns, putting Munday up 21-0.

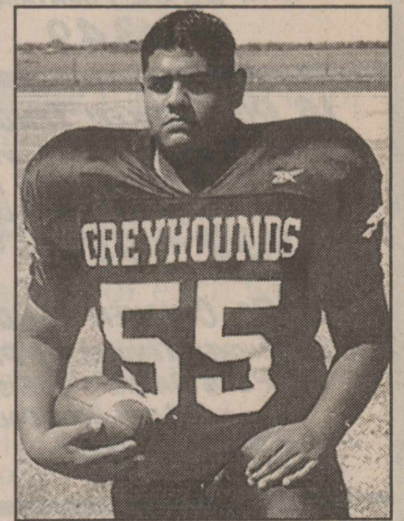
The final score of 35-7 does not indicate the play of the Knox City Greyhounds, who played well at times.

## October, 1998 state sales tax rebate for Knox City up 1.86% from one year ago

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$173.6 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,093 Texas cities and 118 counties, including a check of \$9,378.12 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects an increase of 1.86% from a rebate check of \$9,206.63 for the same period in 1997. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards Economic Development (EDC) funding.

Texas cities received \$159.3 million, 7.8 percent higher than payments of \$147.7 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 14.2 million in rebates, virtually unchanged for the same period in 1997.

The checks delivered this month are for sales taxes collected in August and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in September.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$163.51, a 48.60% increase from \$110.03

for the same period a year ago. Goree received \$220.58, down 30.13% from a payment of \$315.74 last year at the same time. Munday received \$5,685.41, up 22.45% from a payment of \$4,642.75 in 1997 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$19,853.80, down 1.29% from a payment of \$20,113.50 in 1997. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$23.83 this period, down 18.80% from a payment of \$29.35 a year ago. Rochester received \$337.71, up 13.75% from a payment of \$296.88 during the same period last year.

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$37,566.96, down 2.26% from a payment of \$38,437.61 in 1997. Anson received \$8,706.69, up 1.84% from a payment of \$8,549.00 last year. Hamlin received a check of

\$10,609.96, down 6.76% from \$11,379.30 in 1997. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax.

In Baylor County, the city of Seymour received a payment of \$10,620.95, down 9.01% from a payment of \$11,673.91 in 1997. Seymour collects a 1.000 rate of sales tax.

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$2,503.78, down 1.36% from a payment of \$2,538.45 in 1997. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received \$2,616.86, up 15.42% from a payment of \$2,267.13 in 1997. Spur received a payment of \$2,658.45, down 9.86% from a 1997 payment of \$2,949.30. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$3,221.71, up 38.68% from a payment of \$2,323.01 in 1997. Paducah collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax.

## Shaver captures ASC honor again after second record performance at McMurry

*Also named NCAA Division III National Co-Player of the Week*

McMurry University quarterback Braxton Shaver has been named the American Southwest Conference Football Offensive Player of the Week for the second straight week after another record-setting performance.

Shaver completed 17 of 24 passes for 248 yards and seven touchdowns in a 55-0 win over Texas Lutheran. His seven touchdown passes eclipsed the McMurry and ASC mark that he tied a week earlier when he threw for six touchdowns against the

University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. McMurry's Mark Cox set the standard in 1980 and Hardin-Simmons University quarterback Kevin Beam tied the mark in 1994.

Shaver's performance against Texas Lutheran gave the 6-1 junior his highest single-game efficiency rating of his career at 253.9. He has now thrown a touchdown pass in 14 consecutive games. Over the past two games, Shaver has completed 50 of 71 passes for 658 yards and 13 touchdowns while leading McMurry to its best

start (4-1) since 1983.

Shaver was also named NCAA Division III national co-offensive player of the week by Don Hansen's *Football Gazette* for the week of October 5.

The junior quarterback shared the honor with running back R.J. Bowers of Grove City, Pennsylvania.

Braxton is the son of Brack and D'Anna Shaver of Watauga and the grandson of Faye Shaver of Knox City and the late Eddie Shaver.

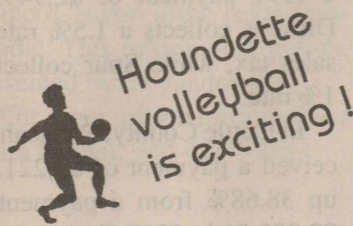

Two new offices, one in Knox City and another in Quanah, are in the process of being opened and two full-time staff persons have been hired for those two sites.

Presently, 16 CFS youth crisis counselors provide counseling and skills building sessions (conflict resolution, communication, self-esteem, etc.) to youth, seven to 17 years of age, at-risk of escalating family conflict, running away from home, engaging in delinquent behaviors, or becoming homeless, through the Youth At-Risk Program.

The program carries out early intervention with at-risk youth and parents in order to teach / train youth and parents to improve their communication and interpersonal skills and avoid further anti-social behaviors.

The mission statement of Catholic Family Service states that "We take our mandate to serve people of all faiths . . . to empower those we serve . . .". This speaks clearly of CFS's efforts to help youth and their parents help themselves.
