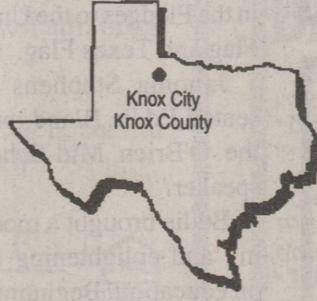


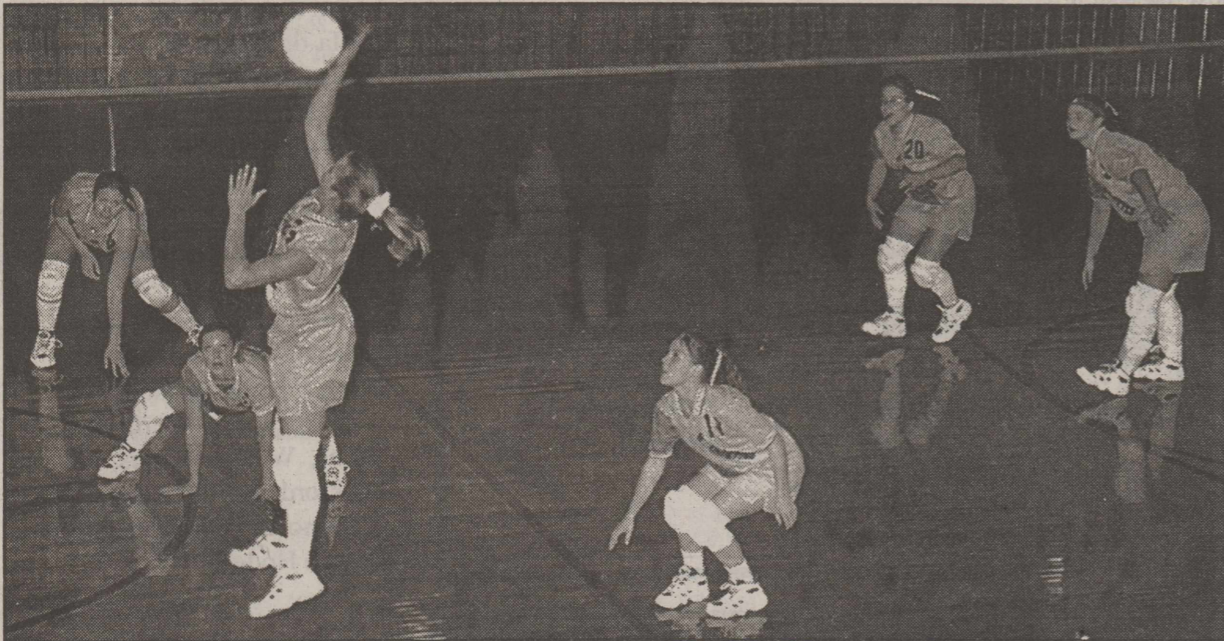

The Houndettes were led by

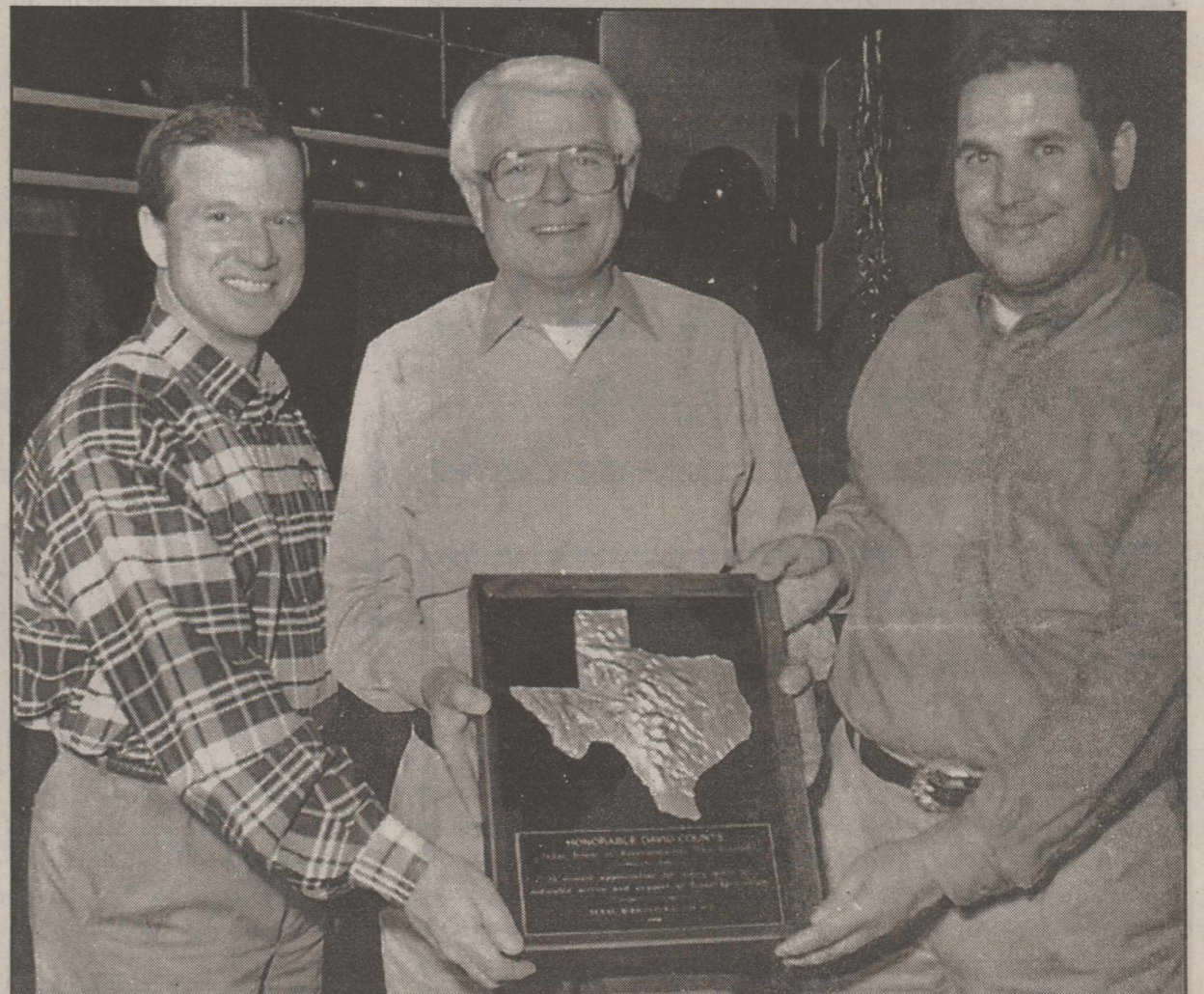
'Houndettes of the week'

Eddie Bland speaks to Study Club

The Knox City Study Club met Thursday, October 15, in the Community Center for a regular meeting.

President Winifred White called the meeting to order, Erma Liles gave the invocation, LaVerne Mayfield led the group in the Pledges to the United States Flag and Texas Flag.

Janoma Stephens then presented Eddie Bland, principal of the O'Brien Mid-School, guest speaker.

Eddie brought a most interesting and enlightening discussion on education. Beginning with the importance and results of TAAS tests. More students in the area or the local schools are passes each year the TAAS test. These test shows just about every phase of learning that shows how prepared the students are or need to be. So many students are from two income families. Rural communities has many low income kids.

Five years ago about 40% of local kids qualified for free lunches. This year about 62% qualify.

It was noted the O'Brien Mid-School has 25 less students enrolled on 8% than last year. The enrollments seem to be tied to the local economy.

Study Club members say, "we are living in a selfish society it seems. We need more community involvement!! What can we do? We can and should volunteer to help in any way we can to become involved in our schools wherever it's possible. Practically everyone can do something. In today's society it's really difficult to save for the future. To save for a new car, washer, dryer, vacation, etc., it's impossible almost. Something seems to always arise, illness or even a neighbor needs help. That's just the way it is.

Mr. Bland urges the young people be your tractor driver, doctor, lawyer, teacher or whatever - be the best you can in what you

chose to do. Commitment!

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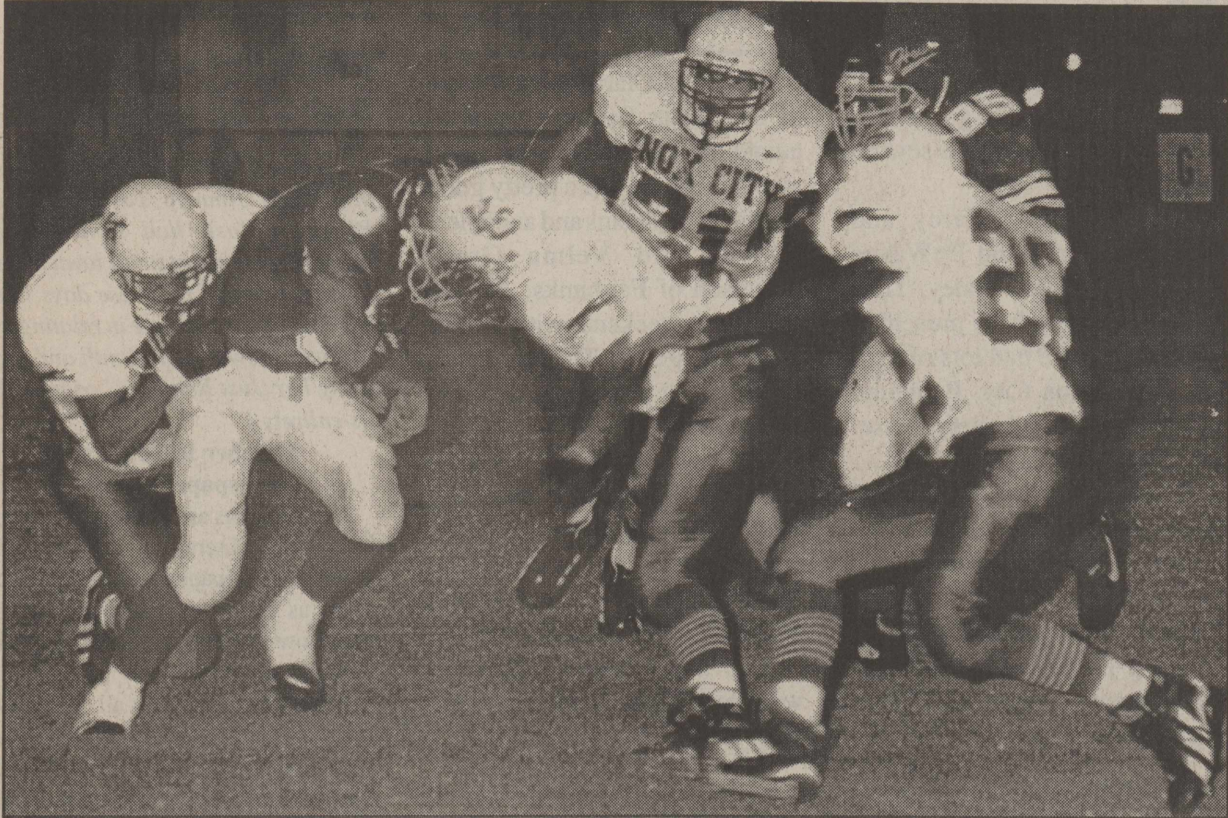

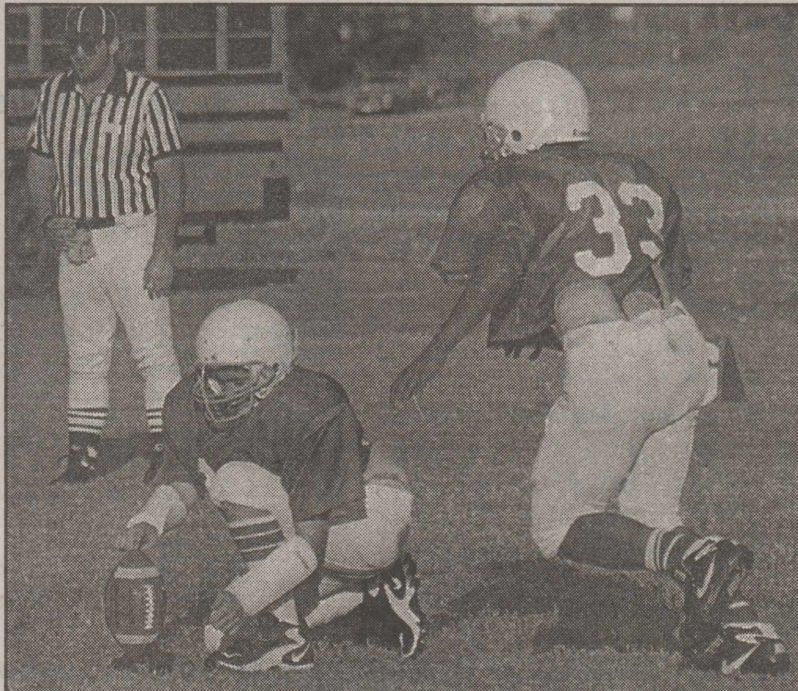

Paducah Post publisher's thoughts true to all papers

(Editor's Note: Our fellow news publisher, Jimmie Taylor of the Paducah Post, had some great thoughts that many small town news folk are relating too these days. We agree with her message in relating to National Newspaper Month and are using her 'Just Ramblin'' column in its entirety.)

October Is National Newspaper Month

Newspapers are folding -- no pun intended -- literally every day and when a newspaper dies, it should scare us to death; it certainly does me! How many more will disappear in the future?

Will we one day get all our news from a computerized version of a newspaper, or radio or television? Maybe radio's days are numbered too, for that matter.

Rep. Charles Finnell visits with me at the paper occasionally and laments the fact that Holliday, where he lives, has no community newspaper. The community is almost unrepresented in the area, with only a correspondent for the Wichita Falls paper; all their advertising and news go to the bigger daily.

Have you every stopped to think about what we would do without our newspapers? With this small newspaper in the community?

How would you know of the weddings and engagements and graduations and anniversaries of your friends and neighbors? How would you keep up with our school and learn of city and county government activities, officials to be elected and laws enacted?

Where else would you learn of criminal and law enforcement activity in our town and where would study clubs and PTOS and 4-H Clubs, and the bridge club report their news? What other news medium would be interested in a photo of a longtime cowboy making his last ride, or a group of little girls in tap-dance costumes proudly holding their trophies.

How many radio stations and TV stations are going to carry our hometown football or volleyball games in detail, or carry a photo of that youngster and his calf or show pig, for his scrapbook? Or do a big write-up on the Fireman of the Year, complete with photos?

How much radio and TV news is preserved for posterity to show your grandkids one day?

Yes, we are a business, we are here to make money - is that a crime? We hope that in trying to do that, we can do those other things too - inform our readers, keep a watch on politicians and governments - that is one duty of the newspaper.

But in order to do this, we must sell advertising, just as retail businesses must sell their goods to stay open.

We have nothing to sell but space. If we don't sell space, we don't have room in the paper for news items, or your stories. If we don't have news and your stories, we don't sell papers. We can no more afford to give away free advertising, than a retail business can afford to give away free clothing or free groceries!

We feel the pinch of taxes and bills and payroll, just like you do, so we understand when you feel that money spent for advertising could be used somewhere else better. *Wrong.* Trying to run a business without advertising is like winking at a girl in the dark. YOU know what you're doing, but SHE doesn't!
