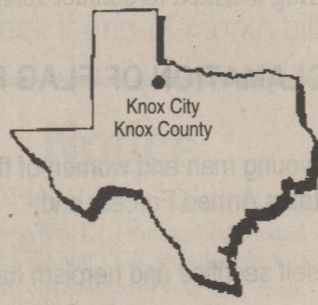

Here is information on a few observances that are being held in our local area in honor of Veterans Day, 1999.

• **The Wal-Mart store in Stamford** will host a breakfast for veterans inside the store from 8:00 to 9:00 in the morning on Thursday. This is an opportunity for veterans from throughout the area to come together and visit while enjoying a breakfast meal furnished by the folks at Wal-Mart. A good turnout of area veterans will show our appreciation to Wal-Mart for hosting this special breakfast gathering.

• **The Knox City Troop of the Boy Scouts of America** will hold a flag retirement ceremony on Thursday evening beginning at 6:30 p.m. Gathering at the flagpole in the downtown area, veterans and everyone else in the community who would like to attend are invited to join in the ceremony as old worn and tattered Stars and Stripes are disposed of in a manner that shows respect for our flag and all it stands for. The Boy Scouts selected Veterans Day for the Flag Retirement Ceremony as a way to honor our community and area veterans.



• **Immediately following the Flag Retirement Ceremony**, the Art Stall and Frame Shop will host a reception for Veterans inside the store, located across the street and just North of the downtown flagpole. With Jack Stubbs being a veteran of World War II, he and his wife Romain and their daughter Shea, will host the reception. Jack served with the United States Marine Corps in the Pacific Theater of Operations. These events serve as an opportunity for our area veterans to come together for fellowship, while also offering everyone throughout the community an occasion to remember and honor the many men and women of our area who are proud to be veterans of service to our great nation.

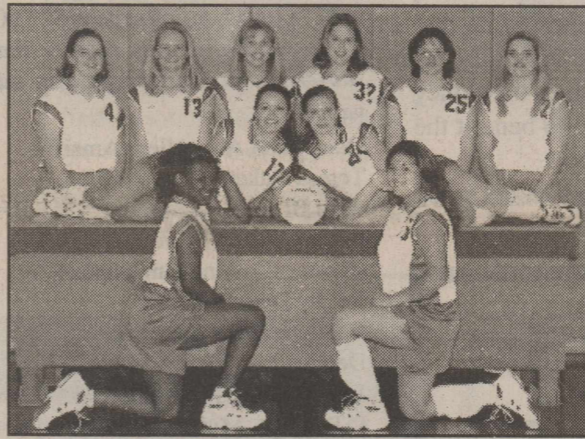

This is your chance to help Santa Clause!

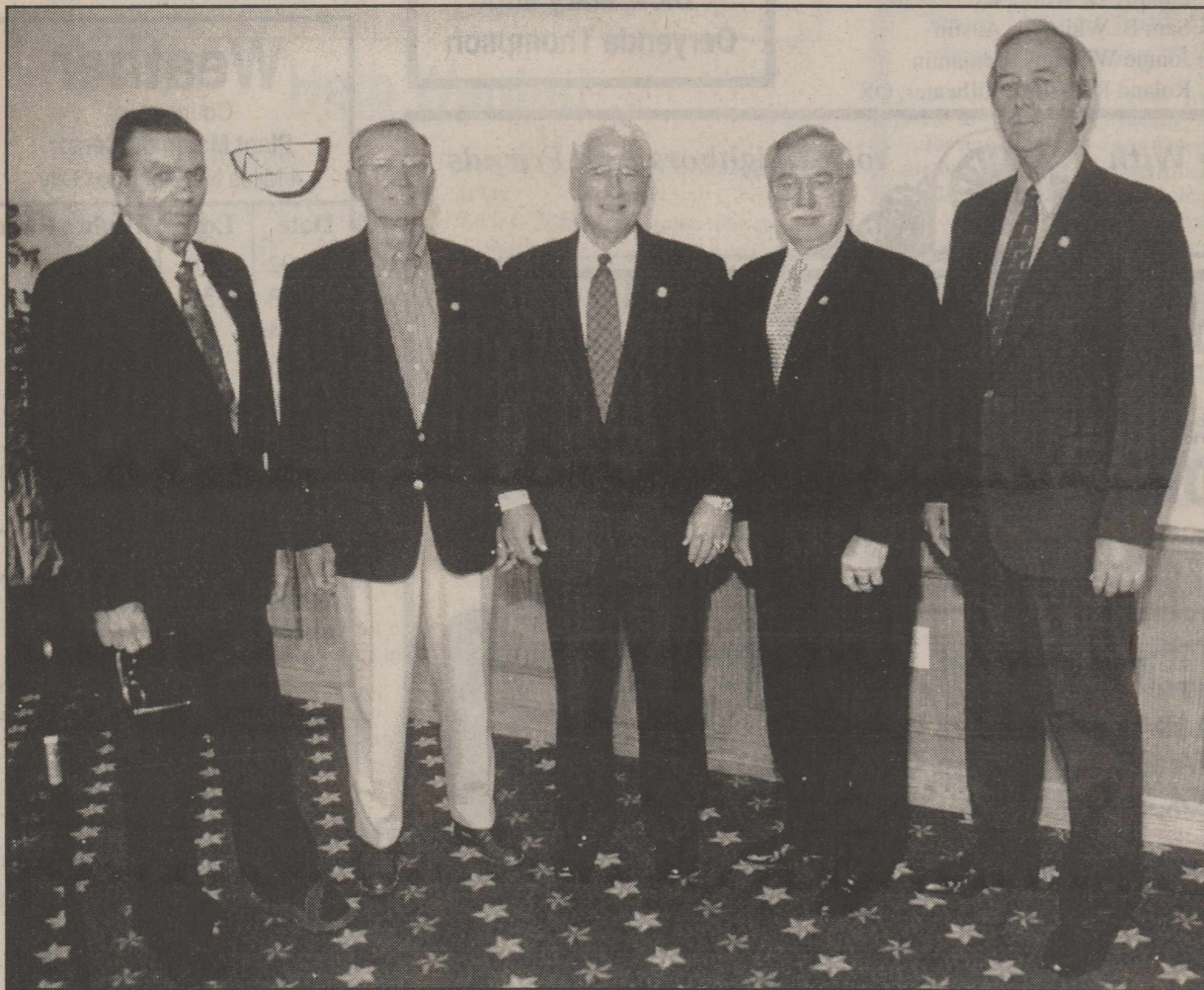

TAC honors past presidents at conference

In celebration of the 30th anniversary of the Texas Association of Counties, past presidents of TAC were honored recently during the Legislative Conference in Austin.

Three of the five honored have Knox County connections. County Judge David N. Perdue, former Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts and former Swisher County Judge Jay Johnson, brother of Darlene Bellinghausen of Knox City, were among the

honorees. Others honored were Retired District Judge Buck Douglas of Navarro County and Dallas County Treasurer Bill Melton.

The conference, sponsored by the Texas Association of Counties, provided detailed information about how to implement changes in state statutes passed by the 76th Session of the Texas Legislature. Many of these new laws will become law on or before January 1, 2000.

Many of the 900 county offi-

cial at the conference completed state-mandated continuing education requirements. There are some 4600 county officials in the Texas Association of Counties.

Sam D. Seale, TAC Executive Director stated, "to have two presidents from the same county is very unique for any association much less one that has as many members as we have from all 254 counties and we are not that old. Knox County should be proud of that distinction."


WHEREAS, many young men and women of the State of Texas have entered the service of the United States Armed Forces, and;


WHEREAS, their self sacrifice and heroism have brought honor and distinction to all Texans, and;

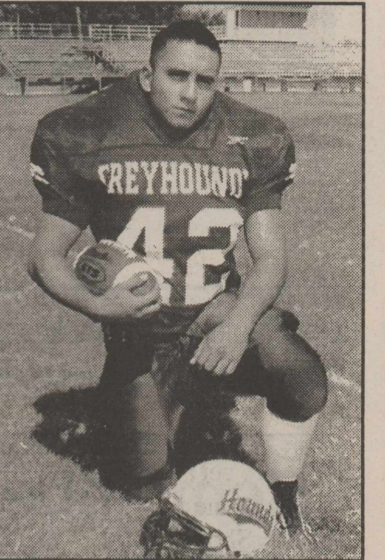
His father and mother, Benjamin and Mary Mannuzza, two brothers, Eddie and Joe, and two sister, Francis and Rosemary, preceded him in death.

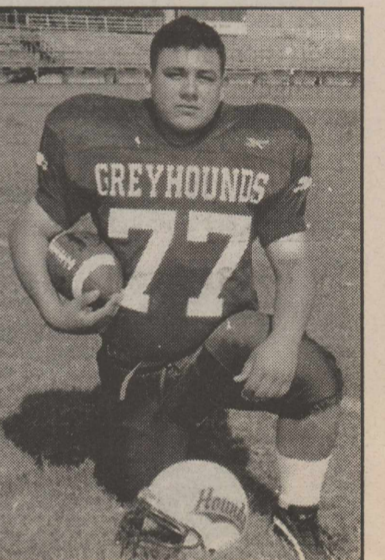

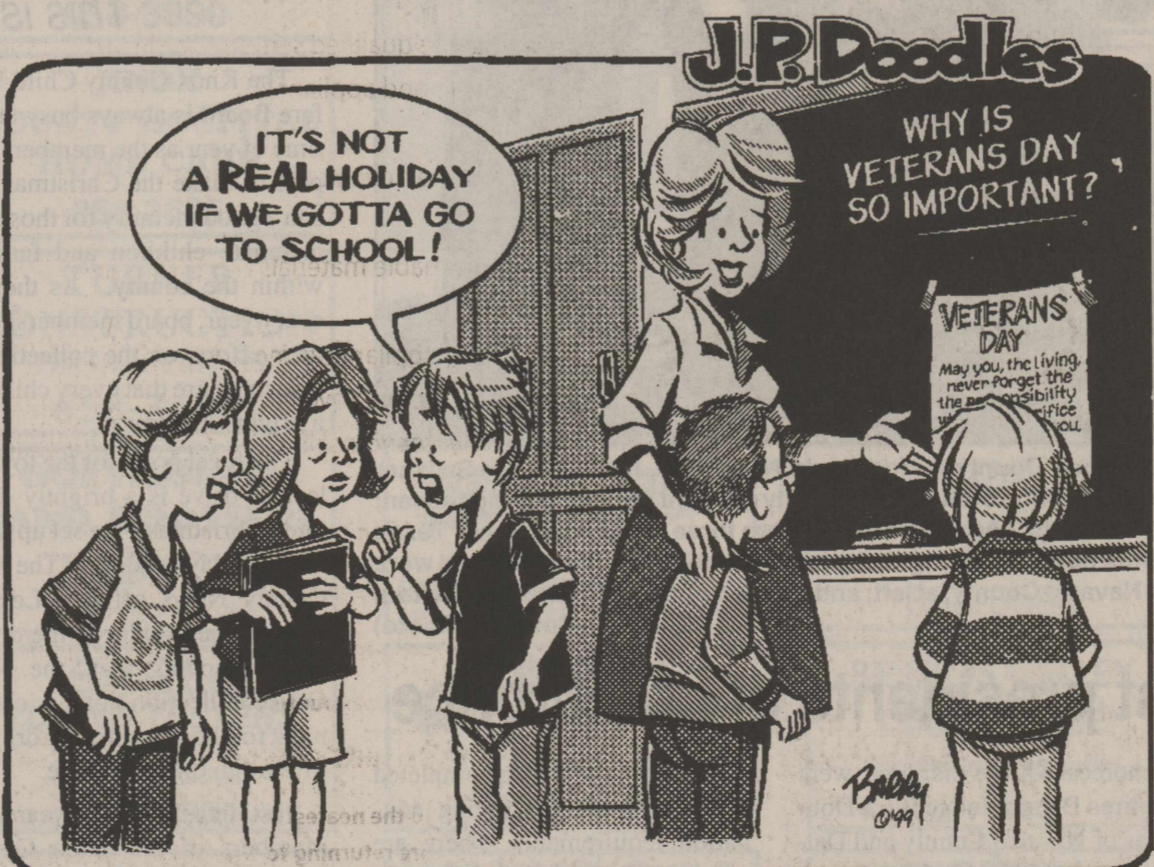

Stock show entries due for Knox County 4-H'ers

 All Knox County 4-H members wishing to enter any livestock shows in January, February and March of 2000 should begin completing the entry forms and paying entry fees. Deadline for entering all major stock shows including Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston and San Angelo will be Monday, November 22. Entries for the 2000 Knox County Junior Livestock Show is Friday, December 17. Please note that these are not the dates that appear in the show catalogs. The dates are moved up in order to allow time to get all the entries together and get one check written for each stock show. This also allows for time in the event of an error on one of the entry cards. It is vital that these entry deadlines are kept. Dates, entry information and rules are available at the Knox County Extension office in Benjamin. The 2000 Knox County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Knox City on January 20, 21 and 22. The dates of all the divisions at the major shows is too lengthy to mention.

Those 4-H members with market swine should bring their animals to the Munday High School Ag Farm on Sunday, November 21, for validation. This event will begin around 8:00 a.m. This will be an excellent opportunity to complete all the entry forms. It is not known how much it will cost for swine validation. It should be between three and four dollars for those pigs being validated for major shows and free for pigs being validated for Knox County only.

More information about the swine validation and stock show entries may be obtained by contacting Paul Weiser in the Knox County Extension office in Benjamin, 940-454-2651. If you plan to enter these stock shows through FFA, be sure to contact your Ag Science Instructor.

Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age or national origin. Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in a meeting or

program are encouraged to contact the Knox County Extension office.

FIFTH GRADE NEWS

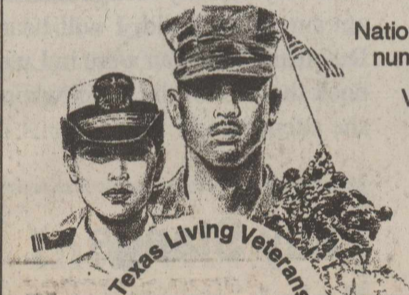
