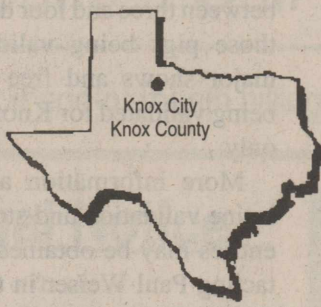

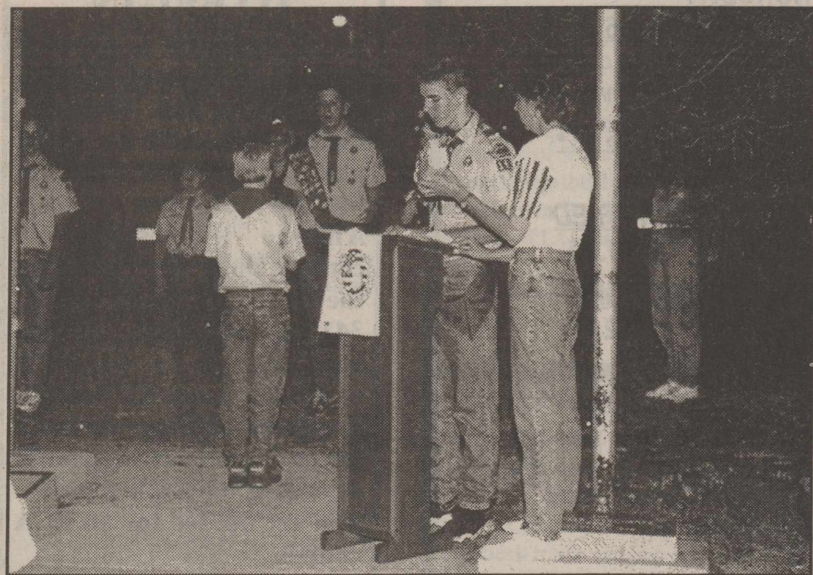

Knox County 4-H'ers asked to note stock show deadlines

 All Knox County 4-H members wishing to enter any livestock shows in January, February and March of 2000 should begin completing the entry forms and paying entry fees. Deadline for entering all major stock shows including Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston and San Angelo will be Monday, November 22. Entries for the 2000 Knox County Junior Livestock Show is Friday, December 17. Please note that these are not the dates that appear in the show catalogs. The dates are moved up in order to allow time to get all the entries together and get one check written for each stock show. This also allows for

time in the event of an error on one of the entry cards. It is vital that these entry deadlines are kept. Dates, entry information and rules are available at the Knox County Extension office in Benjamin. The 2000 Knox County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Knox City on January 20, 21 and 22. The dates of all the divisions at the major shows is too lengthy to mention. Those 4-H members with market swine should bring their animals to the Munday High School Ag Farm on Sunday, November 21, for validation. This event will begin around 8:00 a.m. This will be an excellent opportunity to complete all the entry forms. It is not known how much it will cost

for swine validation. It should be between three and four dollars for those pigs being validated for major shows and free for pigs being validated for Knox County only. More information about the swine validation and stock show entries may be obtained by contacting Paul Weiser in the Knox County Extension office in Benjamin, 940-454-2651. If you plan to enter these stock shows through FFA, be sure to contact your Ag Science Instructor. Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age or national origin. Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in a meeting or program are encouraged to contact the Knox County Extension office.

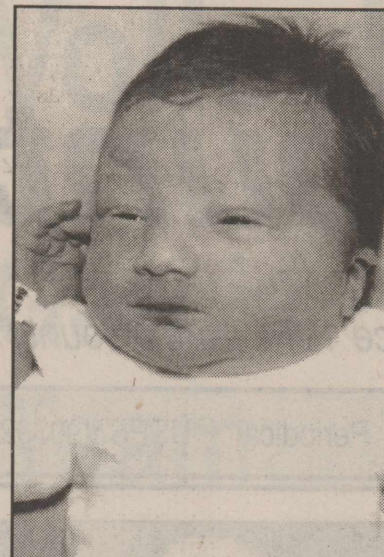

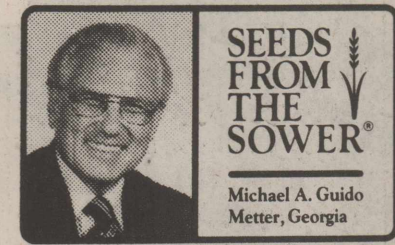


Ross Logan Gonzales

Roy Lee Franklin of Abilene, father of Vicky Campbell of Knox City, died Tuesday, November 9, in an Abilene hospital following a battle with multiple myeloma.

Mr. Franklin, 52, was a firefighter with the Abilene Fire Department for 28 years before retiring as a battalion chief in May 1999 due to ill health.

Services were Friday, November 12, at 2:00 p.m. in Brookhollow Christian Church in Abilene with Dr. Steven G. Williams officiating. Burial was in Elliott-Hamil Garden of Memories.

He was a lifelong Abilene resident and attended school in Abilene and graduated from Cisco Junior College with an associate degree. He worked for the City of Abilene for 32 years including the first four in the water department. He was promoted to fire department district chief in 1986 and was a battalion chief on C shift since 1987.

Mr. Franklin was named Employee of the Month in September 1991 by the Abilene Fire Department and Fire Department officer of the Year in 1993 by Clayton M. Leach Veterans of Foreign Wars Pose 2012 Ladies Auxiliary.

He married his wife 16 years ago. He was a former volunteer for Meals on Wheels, Toys for Tots and Big Brothers / Big Sisters.

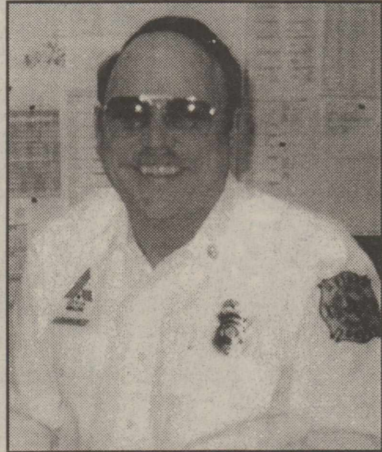
Retired school personnel to meet Tuesday, Nov. 23

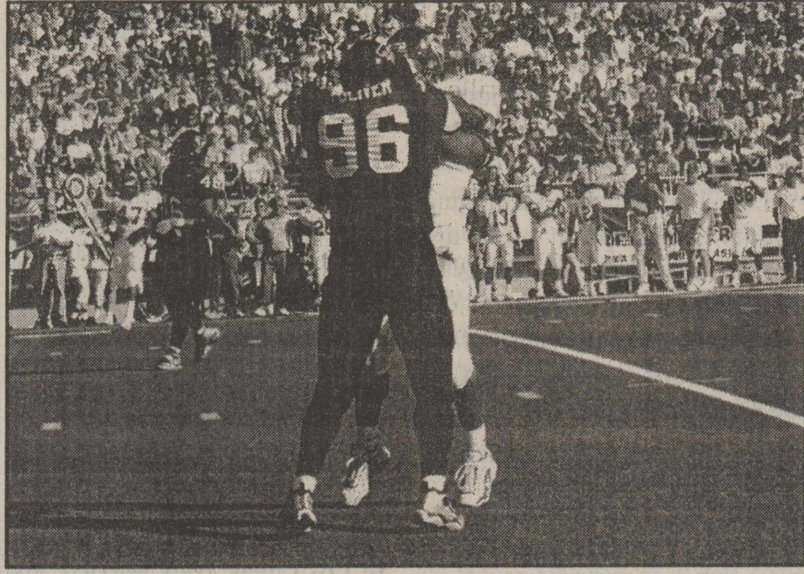

Knox County farmers eligible for \$3.2 million

In market loss assistance

WASHINGTON, D.C. - United States Representative Mac Thornberry (TX-13) is advising area farmers and ranchers that the 13th Congressional District is eligible for over \$112 million in Market Loss Assistance payments as a result of the FY 2000 Agriculture Appropriations bill that has been enacted.

Knox County farmers and ranchers are eligible for approximately \$3.2 million, Rep. Thornberry's office said.

The Market Loss Assistance Payments will be equivalent to the FY 1999 Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) payments that producers received earlier this year. These are annual payments made to producers who have entered into a Production Flexibility Contract with the Commodity Credit Corporation for crop years 1996-2002.

Area counties and approximate amounts are Baylor, \$1.9 million, Cottle, \$1.4 million; Foard, \$1.3 million; King, \$420,000; and Dickens, \$1.2 million.

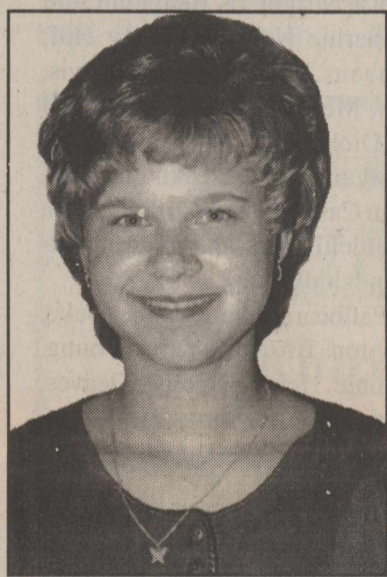

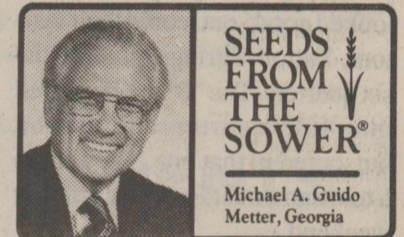

Dead Grass

A sign you're in danger or just a bad gardener?



If you find dead or dying vegetation near a green, growing area, it could signal more than the absence of a green thumb. It's also one of the warning signs of a natural gas leak. Other signs include a distinctive odor like rotten eggs, or a hissing or roaring sound.

If you suspect a natural gas leak, take the following steps:

- Leave the area immediately on foot.
- Avoid creating sparks that could ignite the gas.
- Do not light a match, start an engine, or turn on/off electrical equipment.
- Call 911 or the local fire and police department.
- Immediately call the pipeline operator.
For TXU Fuel, call (214) 969-7221 collect.
For TXU Lone Star Pipeline, call (214) 741-1671 collect.

Remember, if you suspect a natural gas leak, your first concern should be your safety and the safety of the people around you.

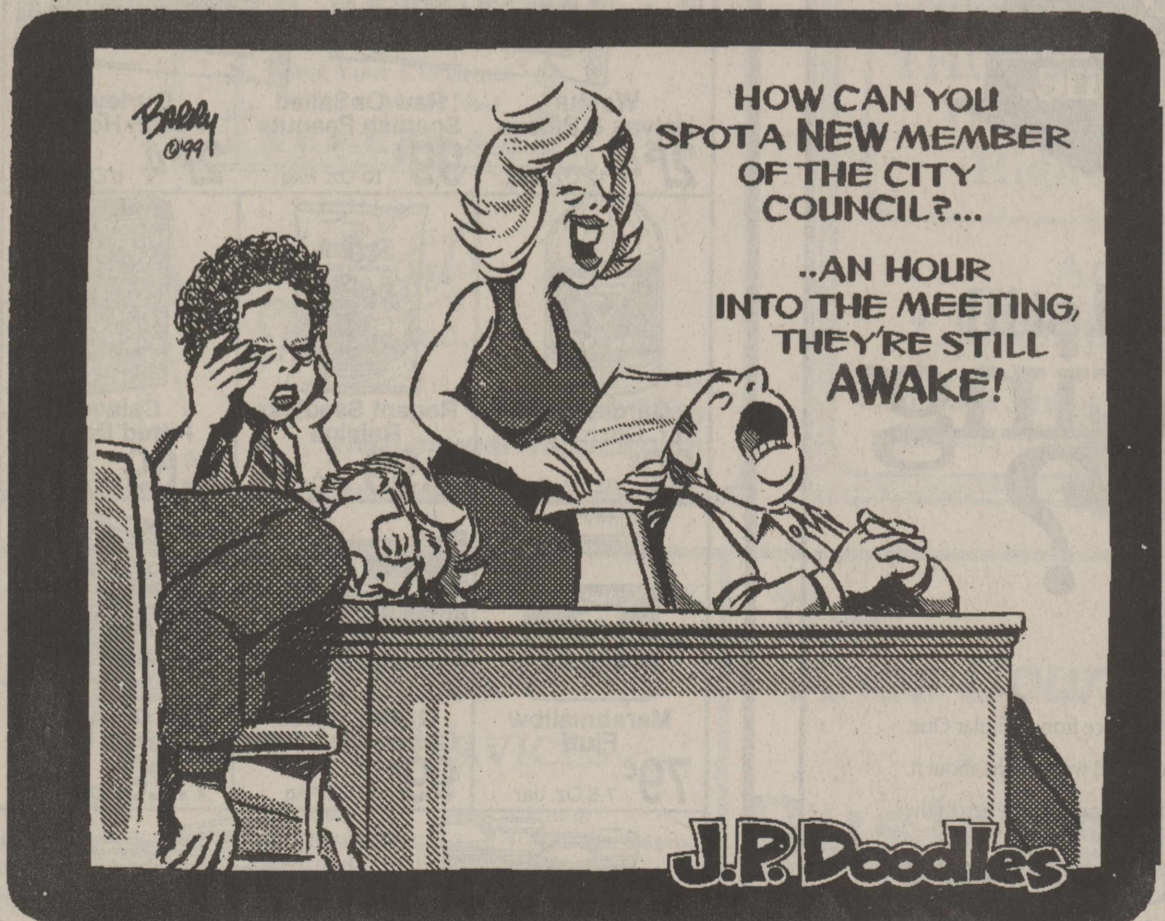

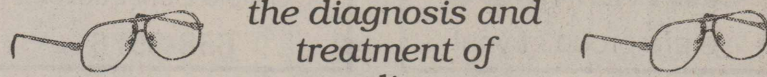

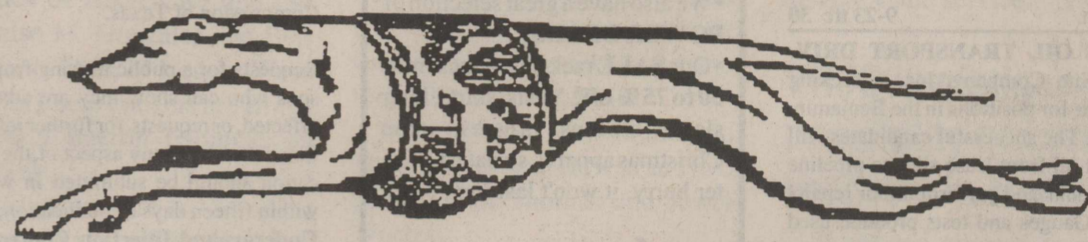
