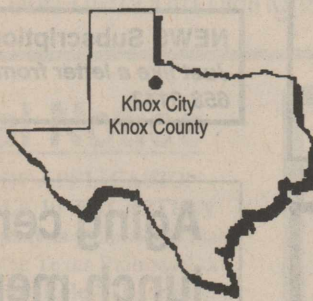

O'Brien Baptist honor 'Brother Bill' in celebrating fifty years in the ministry

Sunday, March 26, 2000, the O'Brien Baptist Church surprised their pastor, Brother Bill Trice, with a day of celebration commemorating fifty years of serving God as a minister.

The church removed Brother Bill from the pulpit for the morning service and seated him in a place of honor in the front row with his wife and the 'Trice Family', his three children and each of their spouses, eight grandchildren and three grandchildren's spouses.

The 'Trice Family' includes son John Mark Trice, wife Gena and children, Josh and Jaqi of Alvord; daughter, Renda Carlton, husband Walter and children Marti and James Gresham, Jodi and Eric Sprinkle, Casey and fiancée Marneva, and Toni of El Paso;

and daughter, Ruthie Acree, husband Bob and son Matthew of Knox City.

Many special tributes were paid to Brother Bill and his wife Evelyn. Charlene Brothers arranged fresh flowers for the pulpit and Claudia Bryant made the boutonniere and corsage for Brother Bill and Evelyn. Sheri Baty designed the church bulletin to especially honor Brother Bill. The 'Trice Family' sang one of their father's favorite hymns, "I'd Rather Have Jesus".

C.H. Underwood read scriptures selected by Matt Harrington on being entrusted with the spreading of the gospel (Ephesians 4: 11-12, I Thessalonians 2: 3-12, Proverbs 11:30).

The primary class presented a

huge card they had made for Brother Bill. The junior class read "The Lord Is My Shepherd". (Psalms 23).

Numerous testimonies were given by the church family and visiting guests.

Angela Roberts read a poem, "Little Things".

C.H. Underwood presented plaques in behalf of the church to Brother Bill and Evelyn in appreciation for their fifty years of service to God. Donnie Roberts sang "Thank You" expressing the church's gratitude to Brother Bill.

John Mark Trice, Brother Bill's son, preached the morning message entitled "Feed My Sheep".

Diane Roberts, chairman of the foods committee and her co-workers, organized one of Brother Bill's

favorite activities - "food on the grounds!!" The church ladies and a couple of churchmen prepared a great feast.

Brother Bill accepted God's call to preach in the spring of 1950. He and his wife, Evelyn, followed the Lord's call to 13 churches during the next 50 years.

He pastored at Baptist churches in Edna Hill, TX; Randlett, Oklahoma; Fritch, TX; Longmont, CO; Erie, CO; Hartley, TX; Kelton, TX; Darrouzett, TX; South Plains, TX; Lueders, TX; Hawley, TX; O'Brien, TX; Stamford, TX; and Lueders, TX.

Brother Bill was the pastor at the O'Brien Baptist Church from 1979 to 1991. God returned him to the O'Brien church in 1997.

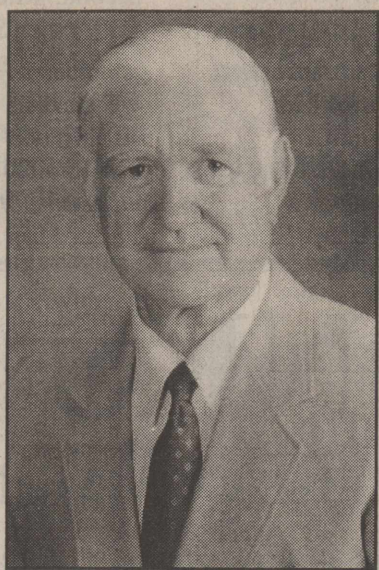
Chamber banquet is next Tuesday, Dr. A.C. Sharp to speak

A familiar Knox City face will address guests at this year's annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet to be held Tuesday, April 4, at 7:00 in the school cafeteria.

Dr. A.C. Sharp Jr., retired McMurry University professor, will be this year's guest speaker. Sharp is married to the former Mary Beth Waldrip, daughter of Aleene and the late Lloyd Waldrip of Knox City.

Presently enjoying his retirement from McM, Dr. Sharp was a professor of physics at McMurry for 34 years. He graduated from Spur High School in 1949 and attended McMurry College from 1949-1952 and in the spring of 1955 before receiving his BS degree in 1957 and his MS in 1958 from Texas A&I, now Texas A&M at Kingsville. He received his PhD in physics from Texas A&M in 1965. He also served two years in the United States Army.

Numerous accomplishments include serving on various McM committees for 34 years, was faculty athletic representative for 30 years, was president of the Lone Star Conference, has been the McM football timer for 32 years at all home football games, has been the official timer for all home basketball games for 25 years, was a football official and a member of the local chapter of SFOA for 27 years, and served as

interim athletic director for one semester.

Dr. Sharp received the first Faculty Appreciation Award chosen by the graduating seniors in 1981. He was chosen Faculty Member of the Year in 1997 at McMurry

and was a sponsor of the Makona McM men's social club.

He is a retired major of the Texas State Guard, is a member of the Abilene Founder Lions Club, is a Melvin Jone Fellow, is a Jack Weich Fellow and has been instrumental in initiating three major annual fundraisers for the Abilene Founder Lions Club including the old fashioned bean supper, the Lions charity football game and the football concession stand. He was elected Lions Camp Director for the Texas Lions Camp for four years, was district governor of 2E-1 in 1995 and was the proud recipient of the "Builders Award" in 1998 given by Masons to non-Masons for their involvement in the local community. He has been a volunteer for 20 years helping with the Rehab telethon and is an active member of St. James United Methodist Church.

He and his wife Mary Beth of 45 years have three children, Trendy, Mark and Susie. All three children and both sons-in-law graduated from McMurry. They have six grandchildren.

Highlight of the banquet will be the presentation of the E. Hob Smith 'Most Appreciated Citizen' Award. New officers and directors will also be installed.

DHS announces new community partnership initiative

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Human Services (DHS) announced plans to seek proposals from community organizations to help low-income Texans. The ultimate goal of the initiative is to increase the quality of life among welfare recipients, and those who are at risk of becoming welfare recipients. DHS will fund community groups with up to \$250,000 each.

Community organizations may provide services directly, or through contracts and arrangements with public entities, schools, non profit organizations, faith-based organizations or other community organizations. Services can include assistance with housing, utilities, clothing, vehicle repairs, educational assistance for youth, adult literacy and English as a Second Language.

Funding for this initiative comes from \$7 million in funds earmarked for these projects in House Bill 1, which was passed by the Legislature, and signed by the Governor, last year. In 1999, DHS funded 16 community projects. This year, DHS will award approximately \$2,870,000 to community organizations.



A New Coin For A New Millennium

The first coin to be released in the new millennium outshines money issued in past years.

The new Golden Dollar coin is as distinct as it is practical. Its most prominent feature is its easily recognizable gold color. The coin bares a delicate image of Sacagawea, the Shoshone woman who acted as an interpreter for the Lewis and Clark expedition, and her infant son shown bound to her back. On the other side is a soaring eagle surrounded by 17 stars, each star representing a state at the time of Lewis and Clark's journey.

The introduction of the new Golden Dollar is just in time, with the stock of Susan B. Anthony coins just enough to make a smooth transition to an updated currency. Because the new coin will be accepted without delay, the Mint is prepared to meet its popular demand.

To get coins in the hands of Americans, the Mint teamed up with several known companies to aid in distribution. Cheerios, for example will include a Golden Dollar in every 2000th box of cereal. Of course, the new coins will be available through local financial institutions.

Once in the public's pocket, the Golden Dollar will offer a durable and appropriate substitute to paper money in the new millennium.

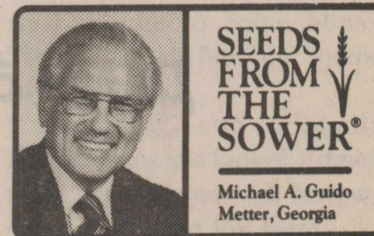
