



• Brittany Coop - 1st Place - Jr. Sheep & Goats. Brittany discussed the basics of L'Raising and Show-




ing Goats". She is the daughter of Curt and Lorrie Coop of Knox City and is also 9 years old.

National hotline established to report unbuckled kids

People who see unbuckled children during the week of May 22-29 are urged to call 1-800-764-5755 to report the license plate number of the vehicle they were riding in.

Vehicle owners will receive a letter from the National Safety Council reminding them that allowing a child to ride unrestrained is dangerous and illegal.

The week long campaign is part of Operation ABC Mobilization: America Buckles Up Children, which promotes zero tolerance of deadbeat drivers * adults who drive with unbuckled children.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Department of Transportation and Texas Department of Health have joined together to promote the nationwide effort to increase proper seat belt use by children and teenagers.

In 1998, 175 children under the age of 15 years were killed in Texas traffic crashes. More than half of them were unrestrained.

Texas law requires all children from birth to two years to be restrained in an approved child safety seat anywhere they sit in a vehicle. Children ages two years to four years must be in either an approved child safety seat or the vehicle's seat belt system. Children ages four years through fourteen years must be in a safety belt anywhere they sit in the vehicle.

The Texas Department of Health's Safe Riders Program has two campaigns that begin next week: a new occupant protection program aimed at convincing teenagers to buckle up has some help from Daryl "Moose" Johnston and tennis stars Serena and Venus Williams. Posters and bookmarks proclaiming the value of buckling up are available to high school and youth groups across Texas.

A new Spanish-language video on child passenger safety training has been produced and will be distributed to safety seat loaner programs. Copies are available for parents and educators on request.









The groundbreaking ceremony is being held to raise awareness of the vast number of veterans that Knox County has been home to at some point in time. Approximately 2000 veterans have already been identified, and more are expected. Anyone with information regarding a veteran is encouraged

Memorial will honor Knox County Veterans like Jack Stubbs

One of the many veterans from Knox County who will be honored by the placement of a permanent memorial in Benjamin is Jack Stubbs of Knox City, a former United States Marine who served in the South Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II.

Sent to the island of Pavavu during 1944, Jack and his unit were part of a campaign that had orders to take the island in 3 days. In the ensuing battle that saw everyone, even cooks and bakers, fighting the Japanese soldiers,

Jack remembers that the combat lasted for a brutal 30 days.

After the action on the island of Pavavu, Jack and his fellow Marines took part in the assault of another island, Peleliu.

After the battle for Peleliu, the Marines found themselves back on Pavavu, preparing for the invasion of Okinawa, which occurred on April 1, 1945. They were there when the atomic bombs were dropped on Japan, leading to the end of the war against Japanese forces.

Jack was then sent to Tientsen, China, to help repatriate the Japanese back to Japan.

Jack Stubbs is extremely proud of his service as a United States Marine, and the Knox County Veterans Memorial will honor all the proud veterans from Knox County who answered the call of their country in times of crisis.

Everyone is encouraged to participate in the groundbreaking ceremonies on Monday and stay to enjoy the hamburger meal.

ment Report for the month of April 2000.

To start the month off, the fire department responded to a fire at the

convenience center on the 4th. On the 17th, they responded to a fire in the 300 block of South Aspen. They did a controlled burn on the 10th on Southwest Third Street. On the 17th and the 26th, they did a controlled burn on the 400 block of North Central. Weather Watch was called out on the 22nd, 29th and 30th.

The Fire Department would like to remind the community of Transportation Code #545.407 and 545.408 of the Texas Motor Vehicle Handbook. Code 545.407; following or obstructing a fire apparatus or ambulance.

Unless on official business, you may not follow closer than 500 feet or drive or park a vehicle in a block where Emergency Vehicle was summoned. This can interfere with the arrival and departure of the **Emergency Vehicles.**

#545.408: An operator of a vehicle may not drive over an unprotected hose of the fire department if the hose is on the street or private driveway. This is to protect the lives of the firefighters and to help protect property. Your cooperation in both of these rules is appreciated by your fire department.






KEVINA WALTON



State University.




