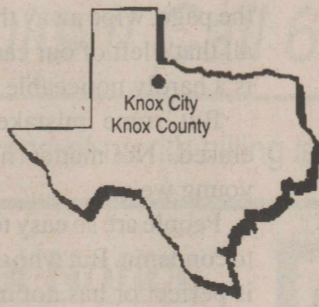

Coach Lynn Lierly's Greyhounds snarl, bite Perrin's Pirates, 20-7

Playing to a full stadium for Homecoming 2000, Mark Tucker's Knox City High School Band did a magnificent job with their routines and helped to keep the crowd pumped up throughout the game.

Homecoming game against Perrin Whitt was a big win for KC

The Knox City Greyhound Varsity Football Team played their hearts out last Friday night and won a hard fought victory to please a full stadium of Homecoming 2000 fans.

Fired up throughout the game, the Greyhound defense dominated Perrin Whitt High School, allowing the Pirates only one touchdown. Led by Senior Justin Vasquez, the defensive unit showed their aggressive side by holding Perrin to 120 yards rushing and 87 yards through the air on 22 attempts.

On the offensive side of the ball, Knox City rushed for 145 yards on 27 carries, while Sophomore Quarterback Sedrick Roberson threw for 137 yards.

Senior Jeffrey Hernandez scored the first touchdown on an 18 yard reception from Roberson. Knox City's second score came on a 65 yard pass reception and run by Sophomore Dominique Collier, with 2 points added when Junior Shawn Speck hauled in an end zone pass from Roberson on the extra point attempt. The Greyhound's final score came on a one yard run by Sophomore Gemile Roberson in the fourth quarter. Gemile was also the leading rusher for Knox City, with 85 yards on 11 carries.

Hungry for another victory, the Greyhounds travel to Spur this Friday night for the 'battle of the dogs.' Kickoff time for the Greyhounds and Bulldogs is 8:00 p.m.



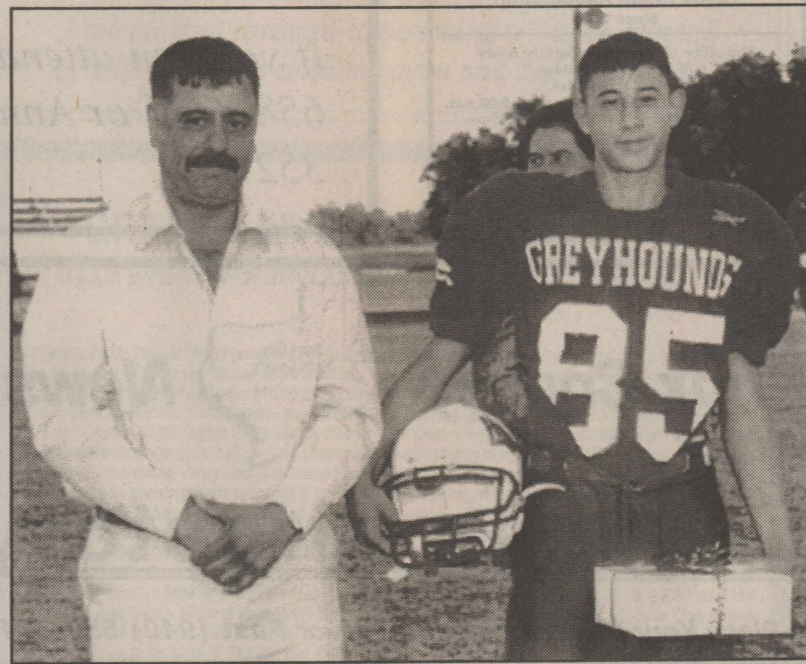

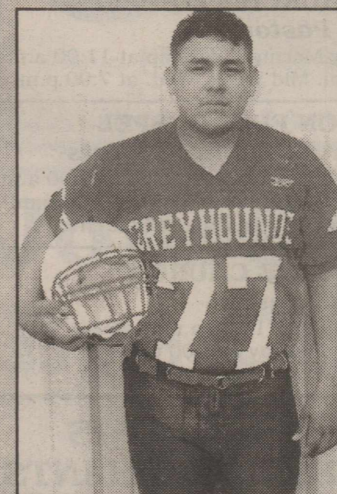

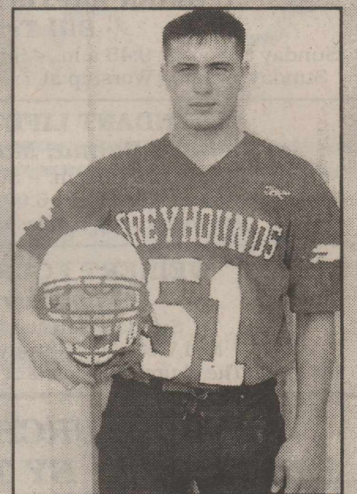

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Ryan Marion is engaged, wedding set February 3, 2001

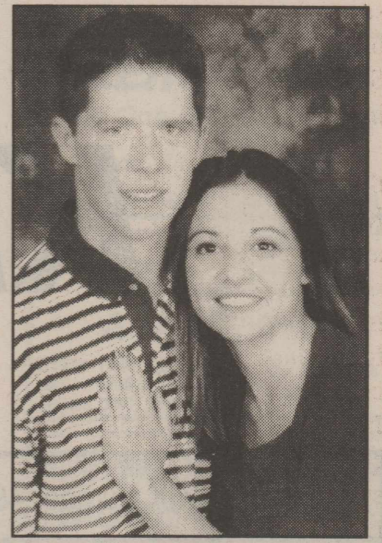



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Bike-a-thon is scheduled for Saturday at KC Elementary to benefit St. Jude's

The St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Bike-A-Thon has been scheduled in Knox City for Saturday, September 23, according to Debbie Wilde, coordinator. The event will be held around the practice field in front of the Knox City Elementary beginning at 9:00 a.m.

By participating in or attending the event, funds will be raised for the internationally recognized center. These funds will help St. Jude in its ongoing fight against childhood catastrophic diseases such as cancer, leukemia, pediatric AIDS, sickle-cell anemia and other life threatening diseases.

The goal in holding this event is to help the children of the world who are stricken with these type diseases. Burn ban remains in effect for Knox County

Judge Perdue reminds residents

Knox County remains in a burn ban which prohibits outdoor burning according to David N. Perdue, Knox County Judge.

The Forestry Service has issued a Fire Safety Alert for this area of Texas which state that conditions are extremely dangerous at this time. Since drought conditions continue to exist and worsen, it is necessary to continue the county wide ban.

Knox County citizens have done a really good job with outside burning as we have had a minimal amount of fires compared to many other counties in the State, the Judge stated. He asked county citizens to continue as fires are expensive for the voluntary fire departments and the destruction of property and lives are critical.

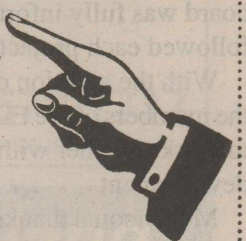

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Dedication for memorial is drawing near

Countdown and tax free contributions!! These two C's focus the Historical Commission's efforts barely more than six weeks before the Knox County Veterans Memorial November 11 dedication.

Adding 400 more young veterans names than could be anticipated is calling for ten columns instead of eight. A historically aware county recognizes honoring youth engaged in wars covering a range of 136 years, counting the 70 youth from the Civil War. Their deaths are not theirs. They are ours. That is why the American flag will fly over the monument.

Water lines and electrical wiring are being installed. Concrete foundation will be completed within the next few weeks. All this is being done by volunteers so inspiring that a poet is needed to name their efforts. Willis Monument Co., will lay the monument the last week in October.

From their preparation, the name of a Goree youth, World War I Private Louise Cartwright, age 18, of Co. B 360 Infantry, American Expeditionary Forces will be among those 2400 looking out on the dedication crowd on November 11.

As WWI was winding down, how different his following observations compare with a Civil War, WWII or a Vietnam younger soldier's letters home.

What a change from the May 1917 battle of Passchendaele, France, when another 300,000 dead and wounded was the price to pay for five miles of mud.

In a letter to his sister on 9-29-1918, from somewhere in France, as WWI wound down, he struck a light and cheerful note.

"Your letters of 8-18 and 25 reached me and I've read them over and over. I'll give the cards to some of the kids if I have a chance. Most of the children I've seen have been teased and pranked with by the soldiers until they are not what one would expect. They all know how to "cuss" in "American". It is rather an odd experience to have a little fellow five or six years old run playfully up to you, ask for sweets and swing on your arm and call you the most foul and insulting names that we ever hear in the army or anywhere else, thinking they are lovingly addressing you. Like them we are having the same experience with the French language.

I have been at the front about 30 days. Have been over the top twice. Have not receive so much as a scratch yet. But it is no child's play up here, and when Fritz begins dropping those big shells all around a man, it makes him feel kind of "homesick".

Myself and another boy are camped out on the side of a road as relay runners. Our duty is to carry messages back and forth. We have a "dog tent" stretched under a big beach tree, a bivouac, that looks like drift wood. Other than on duty, we leave it to gather grapes in a nearby orchard." - Censored by Joe C. Erica has also been based in Little Rock, Arkansas, as a regional agriculture reporter for Clean Channel Ag Networks.

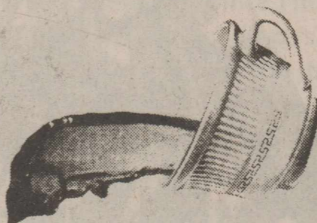

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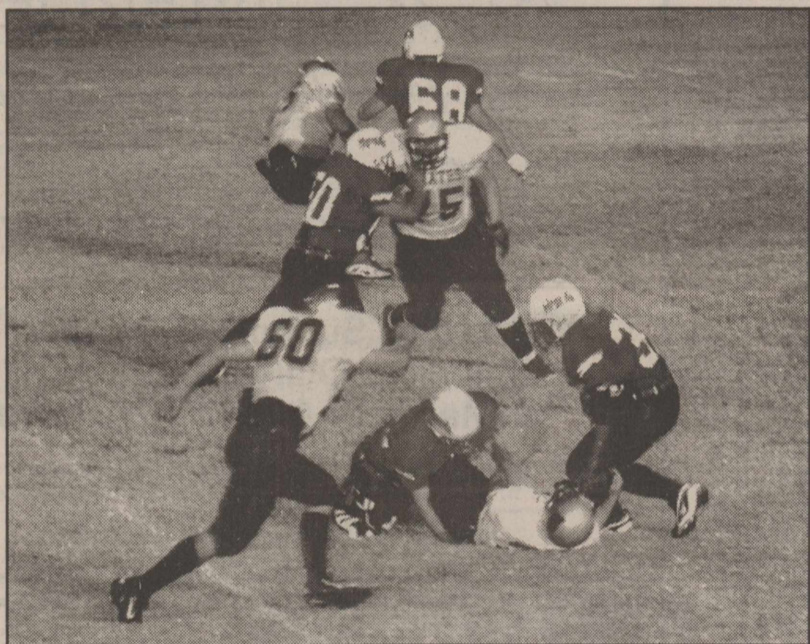
