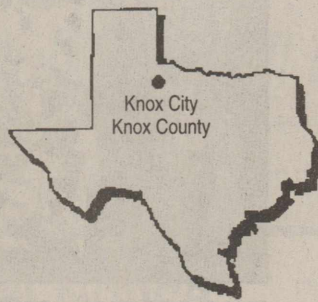

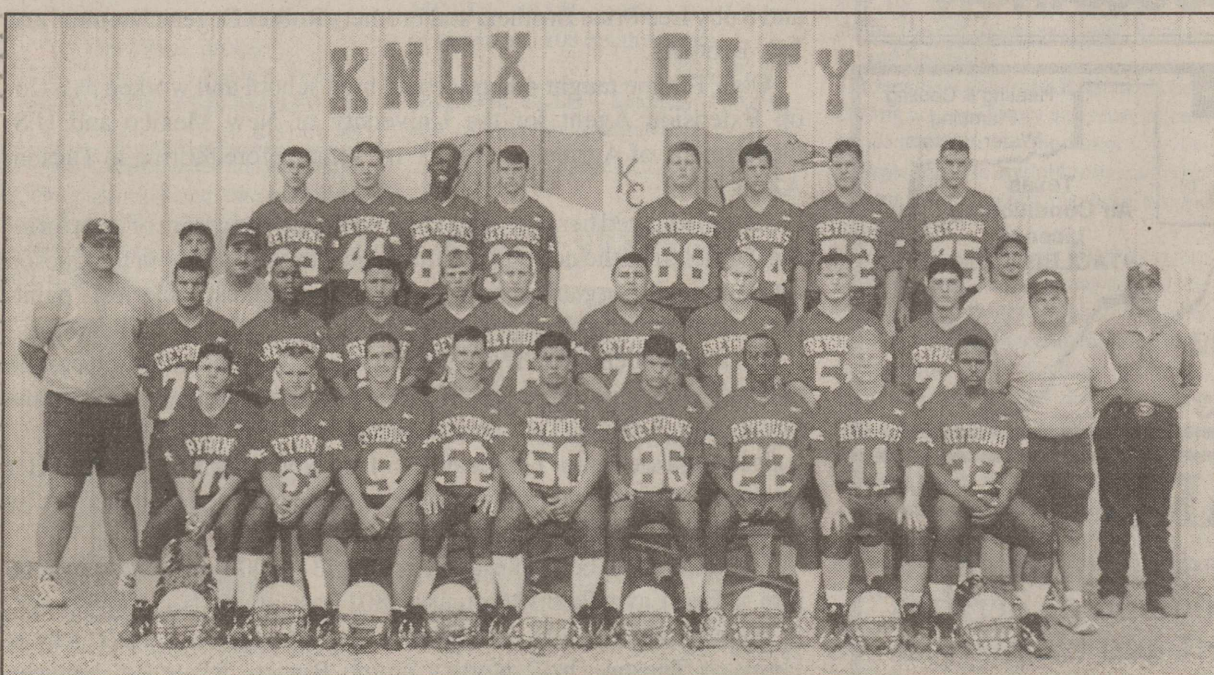

Last Friday night's game leaves Munday's team and fans stunned as 'Hounds dominate the game from start to finish

The hard fighting Knox City Greyhounds made a lot of Munday folks unhappy last Friday night when the 'Hounds ended a six year losing streak to the Moguls with a resounding 22-7 win over their arch-county rivals.

Dominating the game from start to finish, Knox City jumped out to an early lead with a first quarter touchdown when Senior Jeffery Hernandez caught a 37 yard pass from Sophomore quarterback Sederick Roberson for a 37 yard touchdown.

That touchdown was followed in the second quarter with another Greyhound play into the end zone when Sophomore running back Gemile Roberson scored on a 1 yard run. Then, to delight the home crowd even more, the Greyhounds scored again when Sederick Roberson threw another touchdown pass to Jeffery Hernandez, this one for 10 yards.

Knox City continued to play an awesome defensive game, but the Moguls gave their fans a glimmer of hope when they scored just before the half on a 50 yard touchdown pass from quarterback

Chance Myers to Brandon Urbanczyk.

During a spectacular halftime show, the Munday Mogul 'Purple Cloud' band and the Knox City 'Greyhound Pride' band showed why they had both earned a superior rating at UIL Marching Contest this year.

The second half was a defensive battle on the part of both teams as scoring during the remainder of the game was limited to a 28 field goal kicked by Junior Shawn Speck in the fourth quarter.

Greyhound Gemile Roberson was the game's leading rusher with 25 carries for 126 yards and 1 touchdown. Quarterback Chance Myers of Munday had 90 yards on 18 carries for Munday, and Sophomore Scooter Thompson picked up 65 yards on 12 carries for Knox City. Jeffery Hernandez had 47 yards receiving with 2 touchdowns and Sederick Roberson added another 14 yards to the rushing total on 5 carries. Roberson also threw for 47 yards, completing 3 of 4 passes for 47 yards and the 2 touchdowns to Hernandez. Shawn

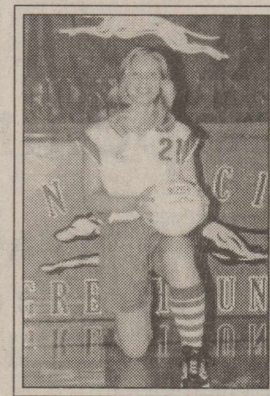
Speck added 4 points to the final total on the scoreboard with 1 field goal and 1 point after touchdown kick.

The Knox City Greyhounds will play at home again this Friday night when they host the Matadors from Motley County. The Matadors have 1 win and 2 losses in district 6-A action, while Knox City's win over Munday last Friday night moved the Greyhounds to a district record of 3 wins and no losses. Knox City is tied in district with the Paducah Dragons, who also have a district 3-0 record. Munday dropped to a 2-1 record, while Crowell and Aspermont are both 0-3 in district rankings.

Munday will host Paducah this week and Knox City travels to Paducah next week to take on the Dragons for the final game of regular season action.

With a victory this Friday night over Motley County, the Greyhounds would move into the post-season playoffs. The kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Seniors and their parents will be recognized at 7:00 p.m.

Volleyball Team headed for playoffs

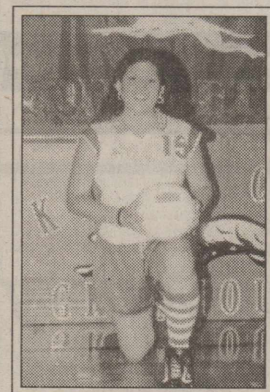

If love alone could have saved you, You never would have died.

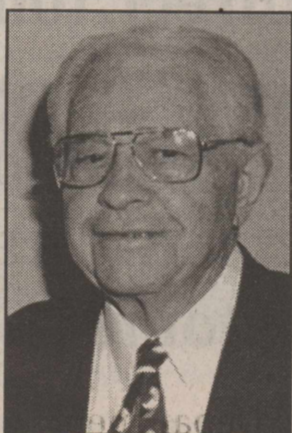
In life I loved you dearly, In death I love you still;

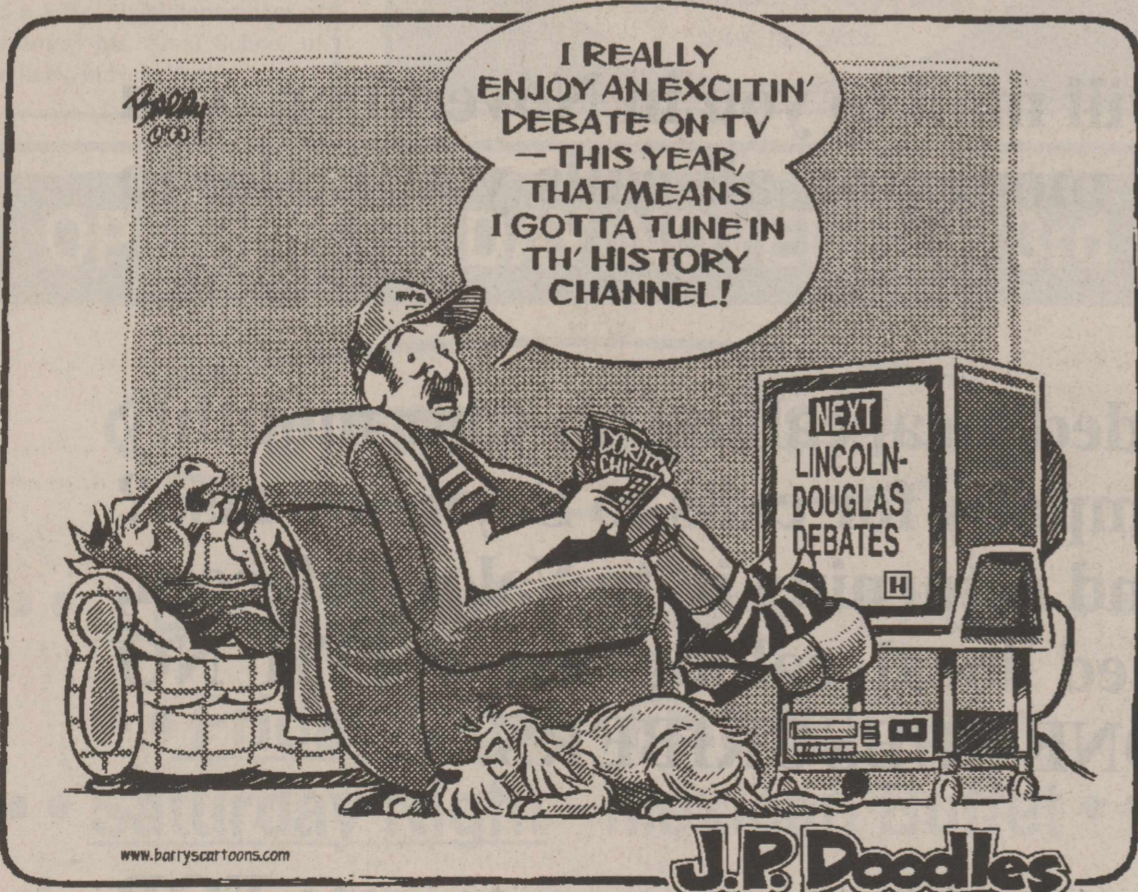

The 4A Board of the Knox City Economic Development Corporation (EDC) has filed a request with the Public Utilities Commission to allow the community of Seymour to be included on our expanded local calling list.

During the month of November, all local telephone subscribers will receive a ballot in the mail from Valor Telecom, the telephone company that took the place of GTE for this area that includes all 658 prefix numbers. Before filling out the ballot, please read the following information very carefully:

Our current expanded calling list includes direct, toll-free calling to the four (4) communities of Benjamin, Haskell, Munday-Goree and Rochester. All residential customers are currently paying \$3.50 and business customers are currently paying \$7.00 for this expanded local calling list that was previously approved by local telephone customers.

State law allows a total of five (5) communities in the expanded local calling list for the same fees stated above. Since Knox City only has four (4) cities currently on the list, the community of Seymour can be added to our expanded calling list **WITH NO INCREASED CHARGE TO TELEPHONE SUBSCRIBERS.**

If approved by you, the telephone subscriber, the addition of Seymour to our expanded calling list will allow local residents and business owners to make direct, toll-free calls to Seymour, as well as allowing customers of the Seymour telephone exchange to call Knox City direct and toll-free.

By voting YES on the ballot that Valor will mail to you in November, you will be voting to save your hard earned money on all calls you make to Seymour in the future.

You are already paying the fee for expanded local calling on your monthly telephone bills, so why pay the phone company for calls to Seymour also?
