#### **Knox City Police Report**

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during October 2000, receiving a total of 799 calls and tasks which required attention. 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

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
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
#### Football season ends for Greyhounds with 41-0 loss to Petersburg in playoffs





The Continuing Education Division of Vernon Regional Junior College has scheduled the VRJC Law Enforcement Academy this

The academy is scheduled to meet Monday through Friday evenings from 6 to 10 p.m. and various Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. beginning February 12 for a total of 575 hours of training. The academy ill be held at VRJC at Wichita Falls, Century City Center, 4105 Maplewood Avenue. The fee is \$675 and the coordinator is Joseph Foley.

Persons interested should contact VRJC to obtain a packet of information concerning registration procedures. Packets are available at Vernon and Wichita Falls Continuing Education Offices. Students successfully completing the course are eligible to take the TCLEOSE exam to become certifiable peace officers in Texas.

A pre-screening entrance examination will be given on Monday, December 4 at 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. Another will be given on Monday, January 8 at 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. These will take place at Century City, library (room 401) in Wichita Falls.

The Keep Knox City Beautiful Program is the driving force behind many of these efforts. Under the direction of the City Council, projects are being implemented


