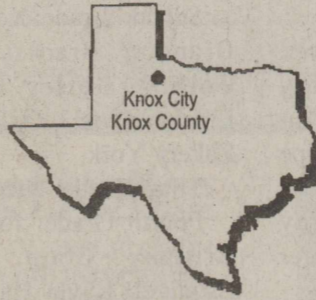

County show this weekend in Munday barn

This year's Knox County Junior Livestock Show will get underway Thursday, January 18 and continue through Saturday, January 20, at the Brazos Valley Young Farmers Barn in Munday.

Events for the three-day show include:

Thursday, January 18 - 5:00 p.m. - Begin weighing rabbits, 6:00 p.m. - Begin weighing sheep and goats, 6:00 - Market broiler show followed by rabbit show; Friday, January 19 - 8:00 a.m. - Begin weighing market swine; 10:00 a.m. - Market lamb show followed by market goat show; Noon - 2:00 p.m. - Steer weigh-in; Saturday, January 20 - 8:00 a.m. - Market swine show; 12:00 p.m. - Heifer show followed by steer show; 3:00 p.m. - Premium auction.

Judges for this year's show are Ed Blankenship, rabbits and poultry; Andy Laughlin, sheep and goats; John Chumbley, swine; and Jake Fite, beef.

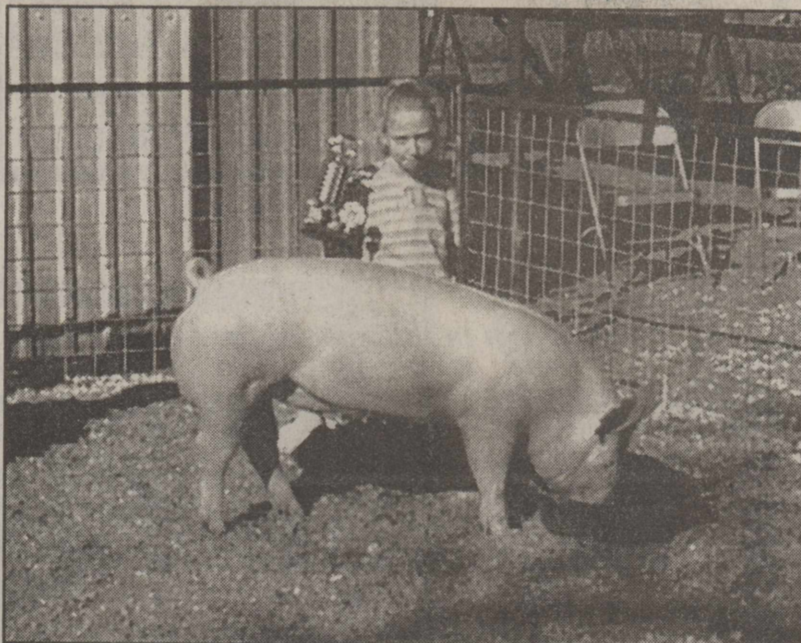
