The Knox City Greyhound offense took a little time to get started last Friday night in Rotan against the Yellowhammers, but a big game by the defense held the game in check until the offense finally took off late in the second quarter.

With the 'Hounds playing good, solid hard hitting football, they appeared to totally dominate the game as they shut out Rotan for a victory in the season opener.

Coach Wayne Hutchinson was suitably impressed with his players, stating "The Hounds did a good job Friday night at Rotan. They kept their composure when things weren't going our way." The new head coach went on to say "The defense stepped up when they had to, showing lots of determination and character to win. Not only did they produce a shutout, they held Rotan to only 42 yards total on offense. It is unusual to win a game where we lost 5 fumbles. We hope to keep improving each week and when district rolls around, to be playing error free football."

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

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
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
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Knox City Police Report

Immunization clinic to visit KC on Thursday

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center/Housing Authority Bldg. in Knox City on Thursday, September 6, from 10:00-11:30 and 1:30-3:00.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in 10 years.

The Hepatitis series was required for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 thru adulthood that has not had the chickenpox. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social

security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are

provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. For more information on the immunization clinic, call 940-552-8770.



District Warned: No More Meat Scraps for Swine - Among its bills this past session, the Texas legislature passed a new law banning the use of wastefood for feeding swine if the wastefood contains meat or meat scraps. This prohibition is due to the global spread of foot-andmouth disease - a virus that affects pigs, sheep and cattle, but is harmless to humans. According to published reports, the virus is most often introduced into a country by imported infected animals or in uncooked meat products. Historically, many schools have disposed of food scraps by allowing them to be picked up by swine farmers for wastefood feeding. Districts doing so are cautioned that after Saturday, September 1, the wastefood may not include any meat or meat scraps - only fruits, vegetables, dairy products, and bakery goods will be allowed.

BACTERIAL MENINGITIS What is meningitis?

Meningitis is an inflammation of the covering of the brain and spinal cord - - also called the meninges. It can be caused by viruses, parasites, fungi, and bacteria. Viral (aseptic) meningitis is common; most people recover fully. Medical management of viral meningitis consists of supportive treatment and there is usually no indication for the use of antibiotics. Parasitic and fungal meningitis are very rare. Bacterial meningitis is very serious and may involve complicated medical, surgical, pharaceutical, and life support management.

There are two common types of bacteria that cause meningitis:

• Strep pneumoniae causes pneumococcal meningitis; there are over 80 subtypes that cause illness

• Neisseria meningitidis - meningococcal meningitis; there are 5 subtypes that cause serious illness - A, B, C, Y, W-135

What are the symptoms?
Someone with meningitis will become very ill. The illness may develop over one or two days, but it can also rapidly progress in a matter of hours. Not everyone with meningitis will have the same symptoms. Children (over 1 year old) and adults with meningitis may have:

Severe headacheHigh temperature

• Vomiting

• Sensitivity to bright lights
• Nack stiffness, joint pains

Neck stiffness, joint painsDrowsiness or confusion

• In both children and adults, there may be a rash of tiny, red-purple spots or bruises caused from bleeding under the skin. These can occur anywhere on the body. They are a sign of blood poisoning (septicemia), which sometimes happens with meningitis, particularly the meningococcal strain.

gococcal strain.

How serious is bacterial meningitis?

If it is diagnosed early and treated promptly, the majority of people make a complete recovery. In some cases it can be fatal or a person may be left with a permanent disability, such as deafness, blindness, amputations or brain damage (resulting in mental retardation or paraly-

sis) even with prompt treatment.

How is bacterial meningitis spread? Fortunately, none of the bacteria that cause meningitis are as contagious as diseases like the common cold or the flu, and they are not spread by casual contact or by simply breathing the air where a person with meningitis has been. The germs live naturally in the back of our noses and throats, but they do not live for long outside the body. They are spread when people exchange saliva (such as by kissing, sharing drinking containers, utensils, or cigarettes).

The germ does not cause meningitis in most people. Instead, most people become carriers of the germ for days, weeks or even months. Being a carrier helps to stimulate your body's natural defense system.

The bacteria rarely overcomes the body's immmune system and causes meningitis or another serious illness.

What is the risk of getting bacterial

What is the risk of getting bacterial neningitis?

The risk of getting bacterial meningitis in all age groups is about 2.4 cases per 100,000 population per year. However, the highest risk group for the most serious form of the disease, meningococcal meningitis, is highest among children 2 to 18 years old.

How is bacterial meningitis diagnosed? The diagnosis is usually based on a combination of clinical symptoms and laboratory results from spinal fluid and blood. Spinal fluid is obtained by a lumbar puncture (spinal tap).

How can bacterial meningitis be prevented?

Do not share food, drinks, utensils, toothbrushes, or cigarettes. Limit the number of persons you kiss.

Vaccines against pneumococcal disease are recommended both for young children and adults over 64. A vaccine against four meningococcal serogroups (A, C, Y, W-135) is available. These four groups cause the majority of meningococcal cases in the United States. This vaccine is

recommended by some groups for college students, particularly freshmen living in dorms or residence halls. The vaccine is safe and effective (85-90%). It can cause mild side effects, such as redness and pain at the injection site lasting up to two days. Immunity develops within 7 to 10 days after the vaccine is given and lasts for up to 5 years.

What you should do if you think you or a friend might have bacterial meningitis?

Seek prompt medical attention. For more information

Your school nurse, family doctor, and the staff at your local or regional health department office are excellent sources for information on all communicable diseases. You may also call your local health department or Regional Texas Department of Health office to ask about meningococcal vaccine.
