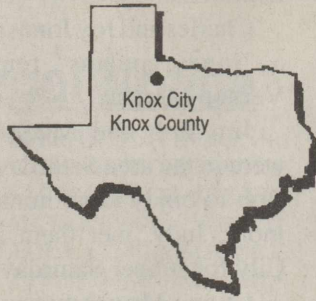

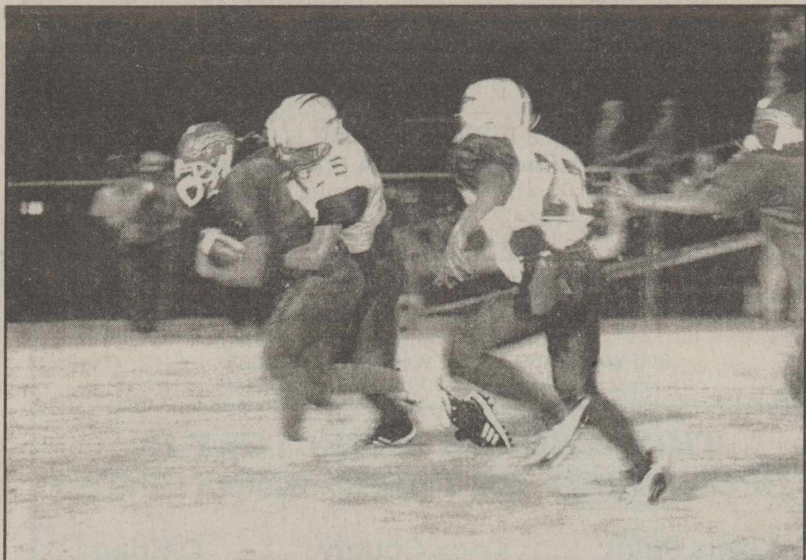
Hutch's Hounds dominate Rotan, 32-0

Greyhounds hold Rotan to 42 total yards

The Knox City Greyhound offense took a little time to get started last Friday night in Rotan against the Yellowhammers, but a big game by the defense held the game in check until the offense finally took off late in the second quarter.

With the 'Hounds playing good, solid hard hitting football, they appeared to totally dominate the game as they shut out Rotan for a victory in the season opener.

Coach Wayne Hutchinson was suitably impressed with his players, stating "The Hounds did a good job Friday night at Rotan. They kept their composure when things weren't going our way." The new head coach went on to say "The defense stepped up when they had to, showing lots of determination and character to win. Not only did they produce a shut-out, they held Rotan to only 42 yards total on offense. It is unusual to win a game where we lost 5 fumbles. We hope to keep improving each week and when district rolls around, to be playing error free football."

Scoring points for the Greyhounds were junior Kendrick Green with a 35 yard punt return and a 21 yard touchdown reception, a 2 yard run by junior Sedrick Roberson, a 5 yard touchdown run by junior Gemile Roberson, a 2 yard touchdown run by junior Brad Johnson, and junior Ryne Burkham with a 2 yard conversion reception from Brad Johnson.

Sedrick Roberson and Gemile Roberson also had one interception each, and senior Will Grimsley recovered a Rotan fumble.

The Greyhounds will host the 2-A Anson Tigers here on Friday night, with the kickoff set for 8:00 p.m.

Knox City - O'Brien CISD to hold public meeting September 11 for grant input

Concerning application for school improvement & renovation

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD will hold a public meeting at the Knox City Cafeteria on Tuesday, September 11, at 7:00 p.m. to obtain input concerning the application of a Federal Grant administered by the Texas Education Agency for School Improvement and Renovation.

The funds for this grant may be used to repair or renovate school buildings only, for example buildings that students and staff occupy.

School repair and renovation for public schools must be limited to one or more of the following:

1) Emergency repairs or renovation to public school facilities

only to ensure the health and safety of student and staff including repairing, replacing, or installing roofs, electrical wiring, plumbing systems or sewage systems; repairing, replacing or installing heating, ventilation, or air conditioning systems (including insulation); and bring public schools in compliance with fire safety codes;

2) School facilities modifications necessary to render public school facilities accessible in order to comply with the American with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq);

3) School facilities modifications necessary to render public school facilities accessible in order to comply with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794)

4) Asbestos abatement or removal from public school facilities.

A record of the comments received will be available for review at the Central Administration Office starting September 13, 2001.

Knox City Police Report

July 2001 - The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during July 2001, receiving a total of 599 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 12 actual criminal offenses, of which 8 were cleared or otherwise handled. Eight charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, with none of the offenses involving juveniles as offender.

Offenses reported include: Driving while intoxicated - 2, Prohibited Weapon - 1, Theft - 2, Assault - 1, Assault (Domestic Relates) - 1, Criminal Mischief - 2, Driving under influence - 1, Failed to I.D. - 1, Resisting Arrest - 1, Traffic Charges Filed - 13, Warnings Issued - 20, Accidents - 1.

Other items reported to the Knox City Police Department during July are classified as incidents. These incidents were not able to be considered as a criminal offense, however, they must be handled in a responsible and proper manner.

Incidents reported include: Prowler - 6, Suspicious Vehicle - 2, Assist EMS - 4, Welfare concern - 2, Open door - 5, Dog call - 3, Helicopter L-Z - 1, Civil stand-by - 3, Drug overdose - 2, Attempted suicide - 1.

Immunization clinic to visit KC on Thursday

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center/Housing Authority Bldg. in Knox City on Thursday, September 6, from 10:00-11:30 and 1:30-3:00.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in 10 years.

The Hepatitis series was required for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 thru adulthood that has not had the chickenpox. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social

security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are

provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. For more information on the immunization clinic, call 940-552-8770.

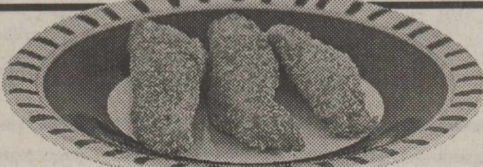

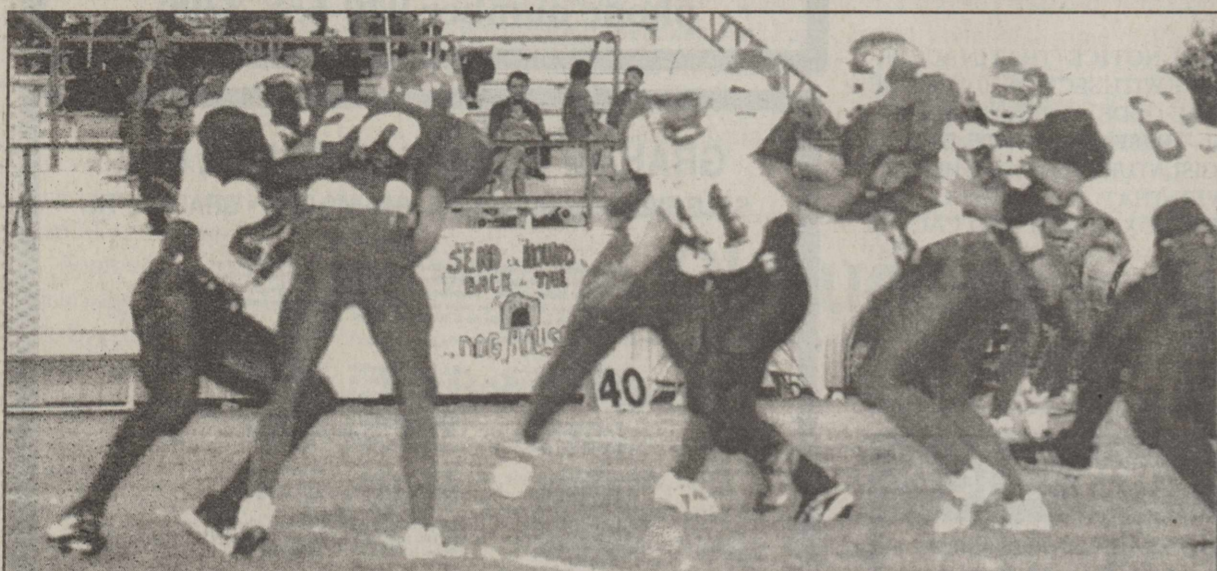

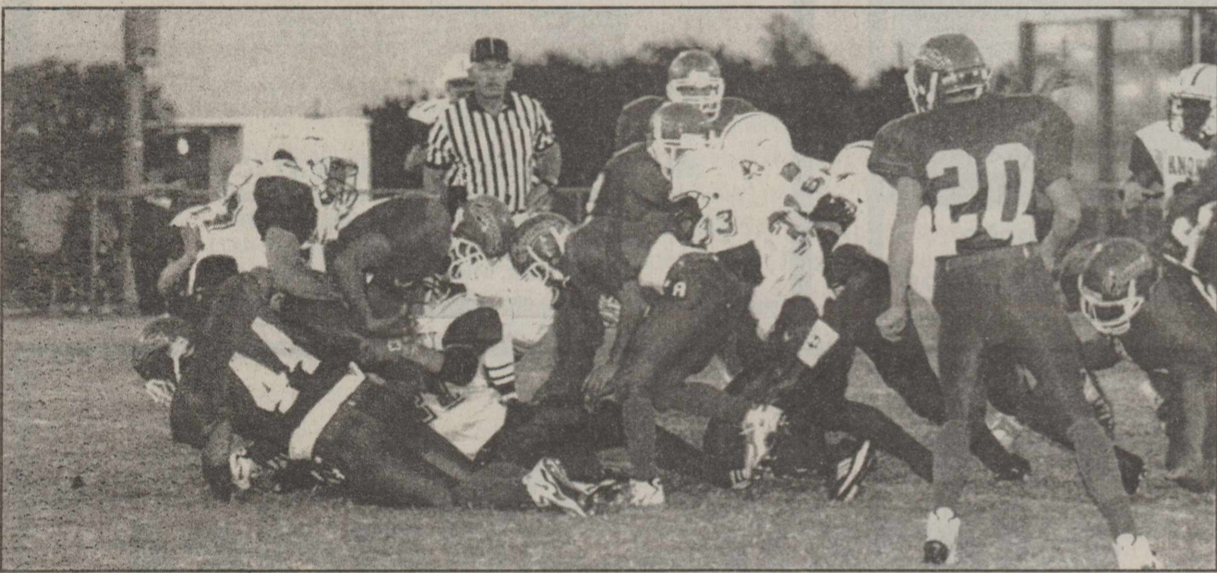
