
Greyhounds thrill home crowd with 14-10 win

School is well underway and with it comes the increased traffic of everyone trying to get the students transported to their respective campuses. It would do well for all of us to remember to take special care in watching out for these students who are walking or driving to school. Many of them or their parents may be in such a hurry to get where they are going that they may not be paying attention to the surrounding traffic. 



Applicants Denied 1998 Crop Loss Disaster Assistance May Now Be Eligible

If you did not previously qualify for multi-year benefits under the 1998 Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program (CLDAP), you may be eligible due to revised legislation.

Originally, in order to qualify for multi-year benefits, you had to have the required crop loss under the same social security number in at least three of the five years from 1994 - 1998. The revised eligibility requirements provide that producers who otherwise would have been eligible for the 1998 CLDAP multi-year benefit, in the absence of restructuring their farming operation, or that may have operated under multiple entities in the years 1994-1998, may now quality for program benefits.

Eligible producers include those that either previously filed an application and did not meet eligibility requirements; or producers who received a payment for single-year losses, but did not initially qualify for multi-year benefits. Additionally, producers who restructured their business or changed their farming operations from an individual to an entity, changed identification (ID) numbers, or have crop losses, but operated under different ID numbers in the years 1994-1998, and did not meet the minimum crop loss history requirement necessary to receive a multi-year benefit might qualify for CLDAP benefits as well.

Applicants will be required to provide proof of crop insurance indemnities received for each farming operation identified in the qualification process. The applicant must also provide evidence of ad hoc disaster payments and Noninsured Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) benefits received during the 1994-1998 timeframe. Payments issued under the 1998 CLDAP are not to exceed \$80,000 per "person" and are subject to a national payment factor of .849.

The deadline for applicants to submit a completed CCC-540MY, Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program Application form for multi-year benefits is September 14, 2001. No applications for benefits will be accepted after this date. Completed forms should be submitted to: USDA/Farm Service Agency, Room 3643-S, Stop 0517, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW Washington, DC 20250-0517. Envelopes with application enclosed should have "Multi-year Revised Eligibility Determination Request," legibly and boldly marked on the front. As the program deadline nears, applications can be faxed to (202) 720-4941 and must have "Multi-year Revised Eligibility Determination Request," written on the fax cover sheet.

Applications will be accepted from individual producers only. Joint Operations or entities are not eligible. Also, if you received multi-year payments during the original sign-up - you are not eligible to reapply.

We will help you get the necessary date gathered up, but you must mail or fax your own application and related documents to the above listed address in Washington, D.C. by September 14. They must have it in Washington by September 14. Therefore, it is of major importance that if you suspect that you might qualify for this program, come see us and get started on the paperwork.

USDA Offers Quality Loss Aid Package For Farmers

Sign up for the Quality Loss Program (QLP) which began August 13, 2001 continues, John Rector, County Executive Director of Knox County FSA, has announced. Signup is also ongoing for a separate quality loss program (QLP-AP) that will provide up to \$38 million for apple and potato growers. Both programs compensate farmers who suffered at least a 20 percent loss in the qualify of their crop.

The new programs help farmers who have suffered eligible losses due to weather-related disasters that caused loss of crop quality. Some specialty crops are not eligible, such as ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, aquaculture, honey, turf grass sod, maple sap and ginseng.

The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.






