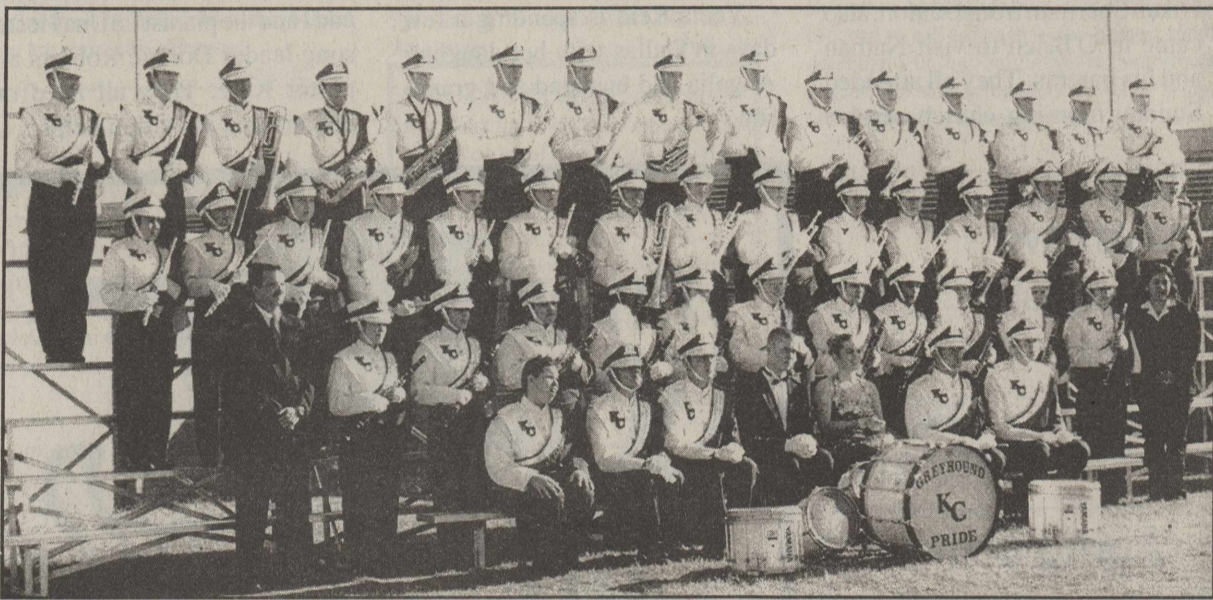

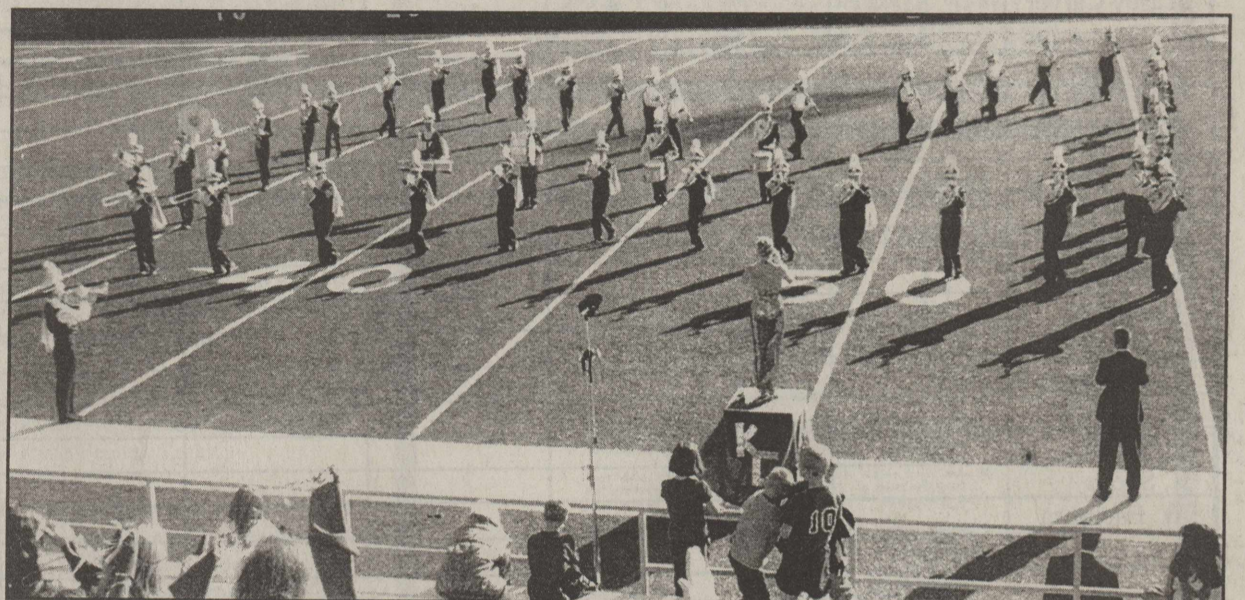

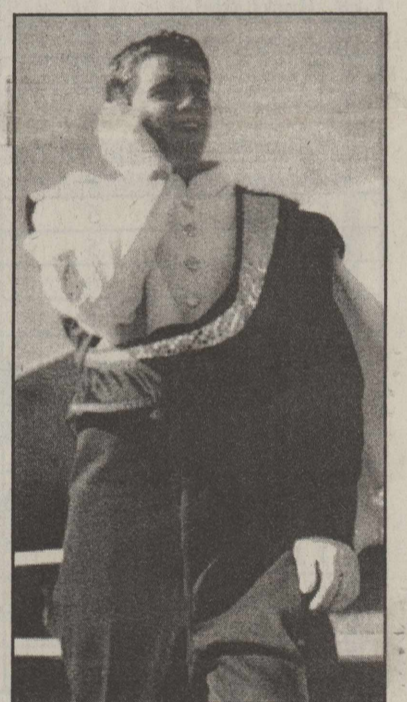
Under the direction of Mark Tucker, drum majors Angela Roberts and Ryne Burkham led the band through their award winning performance of theme music from the James Bond movies.

The band will be traveling on a chartered bus provided by gener-

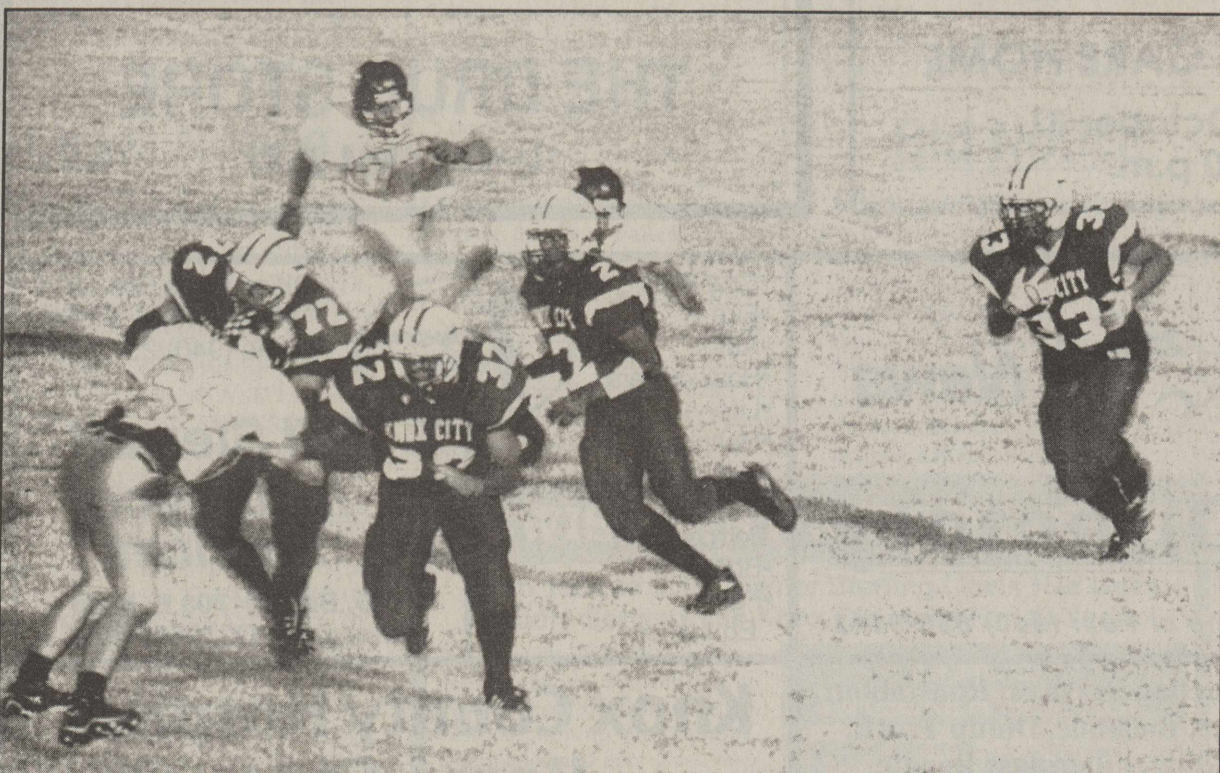

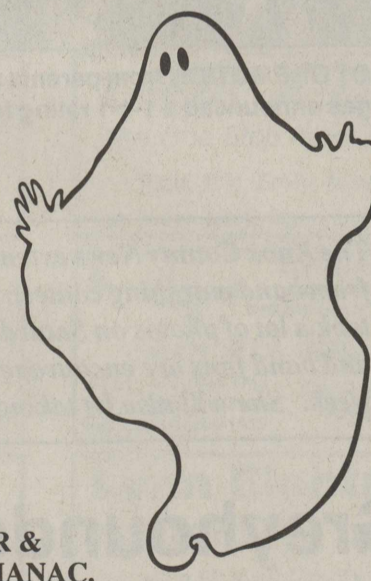

Immunization clinic to visit in Knox City November 1

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center, Housing Authority in Knox City, Thursday, November 1, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 to 3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations.

The Hepatitis B series was re-

quired for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 thru adulthood that has not had the chickenpox. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay.

Historical commission meets, plans continue for November 10

The Knox County Historical Commission met Tuesday, October 9, at the courthouse in Benjamin to continue planning for a November 10 veterans program and a Knox County Museum.

The Saturday, November 10, event will open at 9:00 a.m. with a U.S. military related exhibit in the assembly room on the first floor of the Knox County Courthouse at Benjamin. One part of the exhibit will feature pictures of Knox County Veterans, in or out of uniform. Pictures may be brought Friday, November 9, or on November 10. Pictures should be picked up when the exhibit closes at 2:00 p.m. that day. The exhibit will take time out for the memorial service at 11:00 a.m., November 10.

At 11:00 a.m., there will be a memorial service at the site of the Knox County Veterans Memorial honoring all current Knox County veterans listed in addition to then newly added 86 names.

Charles Baker of Munday will be the master of ceremonies and John Gillispie of Knox City will be speaker for the program which will also include a color guard, pledge of allegiance, placing of a memorial wreath, and patriotic songs.

Following the memorial service a hamburger meal will be

served at the Benjamin Ex-Students Memorial Building by the Knox County Historical Commission. The \$5.00 meal will include hamburgers with trimmings, chips, cake and coffee or tea.

Anyone who brought photos, newspapers, medals, war souvenirs, or books to the dedication of the Veterans Memorial is invited to exhibit them again. It is hoped this exhibit will be equal to the one at the dedication, which one history teacher wished he had urged his pupils to attend. Persons with family souvenirs of the Civil War, Spanish-American War, etc. are invited to share them in this exhibit.

Following planning for the Veterans Memorial Service, KCHC members submitted and discussed floor plans for a proposed Knox County Museum. These are preliminary to the adoption of a floor plan. The KCHC has hopes to pour a concrete floor for a building in 2002, but must determine a floor plan before that can be done.

Classes will start Monday, November 13, at Sheppard Learning Center, Century City Center, and the Skills Training Center. Final exams will be given February 12-13, 2002.

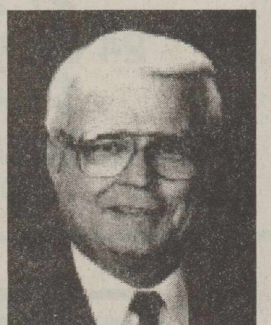

Three-year old Briley White's pet dog was shot and killed by officer Lance Provost with Constable Buddy Curd present on October 4, 2001. The shooting took place in her front yard a few feet from the front door of her home.

After investigation, her pet dog did not bite anyone or even scratch anyone on that day. The dog has never bit anyone; it was just a little girl's pet dog.

I attended the City Council meeting on October 11, 2001 to observe the conduct of the owner of the dog, the officers who responded to the call and the city councilmen. Mr. White's story of the truth was presented well. He did not say, do anything or use any body language that was inappropriate. During his presentation, the two policeman's body language was unsuitable to the office, they represent. They looked at each other with a grin on their face and shaking their heads as if what Mr. White was saying was not the truth. Briley's father continued his story repeating - "Daddy if I go out to play, the policeman won't shoot me, will he?" One of the city councilmen, Mr. Fred Ledesma, also thought that was funny. The rest of the councilmen listened with proper respect. Some of the councilmen looked into the investigation, on their own, before the council meeting, which was very appropriate.

How could two grown men with criminal justice training, make such a poor judgment call? Were they not concerned about the lady passed out in the street before they shot and killed the dog? I wonder what will happen next time?

One eyewitness begged the policeman not to shoot the dog because the dog had not bitten or touched anyone. Buddy Curd, Constable, told Lance to "DROP HIM"; then a second time, "DROP HIM AGAIN!"

How said it was that Briley's pet died uselessly that day sitting on her front porch. This was a very senseless and uncompassionate act. I encourage each city councilmen to talk to the neighbors who witnessed this incident before a decision is reached.
