Greyhounds looking for District Championship

This Friday night's game to determine who goes to the playoffs, who stays home

The Knox City Greyhounds will face their most important game of the season when they host the Paducah Dragons here on Friday night. Not only will the Greyhounds be trying to defeat the Dragons, they have to do so by at least 14 points to remain in the running for a playoff position.

In what is a very unusual way to determine who makes the playoffs, an alternate method was necessary after Aspermont dropped out of the district when they went to 6 man ball this year. The following point system was agreed to by the district coaches: Each team has a maximum of 14 points possible. In the district race, Munday defeated Knox City to give them a plus 14 points and Knox City a minus 14 points. Paducah then defeated Munday and went to a plus 14 points while dropping Munday back to 0 points. If Knox City defeats Paducah this Friday night by at least 14 points, Paducah will drop back to 0 points and Knox City will come up to 0 points. That would mean Knox City, Paducah and Munday would all be even at 0 points, with even district records of one loss each.

The next step, if Knox City defeats Paducah by 14 points or more, would be to have a coin toss by the head coaches from Knox City, Paducah and Munday after the game. Since all teams would then be at an even 0 points, the coin toss would be to determine who would be odd man out. The team losing the coin toss would be Co-District Champs, but would not advance to the playoffs. The two teams remaining after the toss would advance to the playoffs based on how they had played each other during district. For example, if the two teams left were Knox City and Paducah, Knox City would be District Champs if they beat Paducah. Paducah would be the runnersup. If Paducah and Munday were left, Paducah would be the District Champs since they beat Munday. The Moguls would then be runner-ups.

If Knox City wins the game on Friday night against Paducah, but not by at least 14 points, the Greyhound season would end

So, after trying to figure out all the ways this could play out, it is obvious that the Knox City Greyhounds will be facing their toughest game of the season. As such, the team needs your support! Everyone is urged to show up for the game and cheer on our athletes as they play this last scheduled district game that could launch them into the playoffs.

The kickoff for Friday night's game is set for 7:30 p.m., here at Greyhound Stadium.

World War II vets eligible to receive diploma

Through Texas Education Agency

Knox City - O'Brien CISD Superintendent Louis Baty has announced applications for a high school diploma for certain veterans are now available.

The diploma is for eligible World War II veterans or a person acting on behalf of an eligible deceased World War II veteran.

Under the Texas Education Code, §28.0251, an eligible veteran is one who: (a) is an honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States; (b) was scheduled to graduate from high school after 1940 and before 1951; and (c) left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.

The implementation of this pro-

gram to award high school diplomas to eligible World War II veterans acknowledges the service of those who left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.

One of the following pieces of documentation must accompany the completed form:

• DD Form 214

• Enlisted Record and Report of Separation form

• Discharge Certificate

The completed form and required documentation must be submitted to the local school district where the veteran was enrolled in high school.

If the veteran's school district no longer exists (e.g., the district was consolidated into another district), the form should be submitted to the consolidated district which will be responsible for issuing the high school diploma.

If the veteran's high school no longer exists, (e.g., the high school was closed).

The district in which the high school was formerly located is still responsible for issuing the high school diploma.

Supt. Baty will be presenting one diploma to a World War II veteran during the Saturday morning Veterans Day ceremonies to be held in Benjamin.

Forms are available at the Knox City-O'Brien CISD administrative office.

Joe M. Clonts is retiring from the United States Postal Service after 21 1/2 years of service.







The dog did attack an innocent family, walking home. He ran up to them and ran into the lady's leg. The lady and her children were twirling and twirling until help arrived. She fainted.


The Officer Lance Provost, Constable Buddy Curd helped the lady. Made sure she was okay. Even called a friend to take her home, or really to their house to care for her.

Three area ranches to compete in WRCA world championship ranch rodeo

Lyles Ranch, Pitchfork Ranch and Tongue River Ranch

AMARILLO - With all the WRCA Sanctioned Ranch Rodeos now complete, the countdown is underway for the World Championship Ranch Rodeo to be held in Amarillo on November 8 - 11.

Three area ranches, the Lyles Ranch of Benjamin, the Pitchfork Land and Cattle Co. of Guthrie and the Tongue River Ranch of Dumont, are among the 16 that qualified.

The sixth annual World Championship Ranch Rodeo will feature performances on November 8-11 at the Civic Center.

This rodeo features real cowboys and cowgirls who make their living on the back of a horse. They will compete in several rodeo events that are based on actual ranch work duties.




