# Sharing his story . . .

The following story has a strange twist, both good and bad of what can happen to anyone, just as it happened to me. Hopefully, those of you reading this will take notice of my story and not have to experience the shock that I have.

During the last week in May, I noticed a small spot on my upper lip, which appeared to be a bite of some kind. After a week it had not gone away, so I had a doctor check it out. After attempting to drain it, he agreed it looked like a bite and treated it as such.

A week later, I went to a dermatologist, who extracted the spot, had it tested and advised it was a benign tumor - what a relief. But, within a week, the spot appeared again, this time much larger and growing rapidly. The dermatologist recommended an Ear, Nose and Throat Doctor, who recommended removal, and the surgery was scheduled for August 1st. This all happened the first week in July.

One of the many blessings in my life is that I have a brother-in-law who is a Oncologist. One phone call to him with an update on what was happening, and he had a consultation scheduled for the next day, with surgery scheduled immediately, if necessary. I had surgery to remove the lesion on my lip, but a follow up CT scan the next week indicated a problem in my kidney... cancer. I was given a choice of three places to go for treatment M.D. Anderson in Houston, Washington, D.C. and San Antonio.

On July 22nd, we traveled to San Antonio to have more scans and consultations. I started chemotherapy (two medications: Interfuron and Prolueken) immediately. After four weeks of injections, the small lesion had shrunk by 50% and my doctor advised removing the kidney. One week later, the cancerous kidney was removed by laproscopic surgery - no stitches, no bandages - - just glue! Isn't that amazing?! Then another four weeks of chemotherapy followed.

Fortunately for me I was able to take the injections at the Knox City Clinic. The injections drained my energy, gave me flu like symptoms and I lost my appetite. So most of my county duties have been done at home. Thank goodness for telephones, fax machines and computers!

I am not out of the woods yet, and I returned to San Antonio on November 15th for more tests. My purpose in sharing this with you is to caution everyone to pay attention to your bodies, and if you see anything new or different, see a doctor. It just might save your life.





### **Greyhounds finish season**

Knox City's Greyhounds finished their 2001 football season last Friday night when the team suffered a hard fought 14-7 loss in the rain and mud to Petersburg for the Bi-District Championship.

Playing at Matador, Knox City scored first against the Buffalos before going into the locker room at half time tied 7-7. The score remained deadlocked until the fourth quarter when Petersburg went ahead by a touchdown and stayed ahead until the final buzzer.

Knox City players on the field were supported by one of the largest crowds of the season as fans cheered wildly throughout persistent rain and cool temperatures. The tremendous number of fans making the 90 mile drive to Matador was a reflection on how the school and community came together this season to support the Greyhounds through a very exciting season under first year head coach Wayne Hutchinson.

Finishing the season with a record of 8 wins and 3 losses, the 'Hounds had a total of 13 players recognized with post season All District Honors. Coach Hutchinson was also named as Coach of the Year for the

On the offensive side of the line, fullback Scooter Thompson (a junior) completed the regular season as the team's leading rusher with 467 yards on 73 carries. Other leading rushers were running back Riley Spells (a freshman) with 454 yards on 49 carries, quarterback Sedrick Roberson (a junior) with 390 yards on 73 carries, running back Gemile Roberson (a junior) with 386 yards on 63 carries, and fullback Dominique Collier (a junior) with 327 yards on 46 carries. Quarterback Sedrick Roberson completed 29 of 48 passes for 591 yards with 6 interceptions, and quarterback Brad Johnson (a junior) completed 19 of 32 passes for 166 yards with 2 interceptions. The Greyhound offense gained 2092 yards on the ground and 840 through the air during the regular season.

On the defense, linebacker Will Grimsley (a senior) led the team with 108 tackles and 16 quarterback sacks, linebacker Scooter Thompson had 106 tackles and 11 sacks, and lineman Casey Carver (a senior) had 80 tackles with 22 sacks. The tough Greyhound defense only allowed an average of 10.7 points per game for the season.

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Perry Patton Community Center in Munday, Thursday, December 6, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 to 3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations.

The Hepatitis B series was re-

quired for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1, 2000. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is available to anyone age 1 thru adulthood that has not had the chickenpox. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay.
