More than five decades after service in World War II, John Gillispie receives coveted high school diploma

All smiles these days, Knox City resident John Gillispie is the proud recipient of a high school diploma, issued more than five decades after he left high school to join the United States Navy for service in World War II.

Even though John became a licensed minister after the war and has very impressive credentials in that field, he always regretted not having a high school diploma.

Thanks to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature, John's high school diploma is now a reality that he is able to hang on the wall and look at. During the 77th session of the Texas Legislature, Senate Bill 387 authorized the granting of high school diplomas to certain veterans who left school for military service. Those veterans who were scheduled to graduate after 1940 and before 1951 are eligible to receive diplomas from the school they attended prior to leaving for

the military. The diploma from Klondike High School was accompanied by the following letter from Jack Gaskins, Superintendent for the Klondike Independent School District:

Cities of Knox City and Benjamin accept Favored Nations Settlement Offer by Oncor

Of Pending Rate Case Filed on June 28, 2001

Effective January 14, 2002, Oncor (TXU Gas) and the 77 surrounding cities in the Western Regional Distribution System Rate Case have settled the pending rate case that was filed on June 28, 2001. The Cities of Knox City and Benjamin accepted the Favored Nations Settlement Offer i July 2001. The offer stated that Oncor (TXU Gas) would give the Cities of Knox City and Benjamin the most favorable rate treatment that is negotiated with any other city in the Western Regional Distribution System without incurring any rate case expended from hired consultants.

The final settlement affected the City of Knox City rates by reducing the requested amount from \$12, 140 or 4.10% increase, to a \$7.00 decrease for the City of Knox City. The final settlement affected the City of Benjamin rated by reducing the requested amount from (\$1,598), or -3.03%, to (\$3,409), or a -6.47 decrease. Per the settlement, a residential customer using 5 MCF per month will realize a decrease of approximately \$0.54 per month in Knox City and \$5.94 per month decrease for Benjamin. Per the settlement, a commercial customer using 30 MCF will realize an increase of approximately \$20.94 per month in Knox City and \$13.95 increase per month in Benjamin. Knox City has a total of 465 residential customers and 86 commercial customers inside the City limits of Knox City. Benjamin has a total of 77 residential customers and

16 commercial customers inside the city limits of Benjamin.

Randy West, Oncor Area Manager (formerly TXU Gas) stated that the City Councils of Knox City and Benjamin reached a good settlement by accepting the Favored Nations offer from Oncor (TXU Gas). The citizens of Knox City and Benjamin benefited from the rate case settlement from not having to pay any rate case expense associated with the negotiation of the settlement. The customers in the seven cities that suspended action on the rate case will be expensed the consultants fees through a surcharge. 






Knox County 4-H Teams Are Busy With Contests


The Knox City 4-H Junior Range Science Team finished third with a score of 524 out of 1200. Vanessa Solis received third
