Important school bond election set for May 4

Your schools, your children need your vote!

Saturday, May 4 is a date to mark on your calendars and cirle in red as a say that you don't want to forget! The first Saturday of next month is the very important day set for a bond election that will allow improvements on all 3 campus locations of our local school district.

If approved by the voters, the May 4 bond election will authorize the school board trustees to issue a bond in the amount of 1 million dollars for improvements to the district's facilities. The funds will be used to improve and modernize the heating and air conditioning systems, lighting, and handicap accessibility on all three school cam-

sibility on all three school cam-

The intended improvements to the heating and cooling systems will allow the school district to achieve compliance with current guidelines on indoor air quality. The improvements will also improve the energy efficiency of the buildings, thus providing for district wide reduction in future energy costs.

If voters approve the bond in the May 4 election, the district will apply to the Texas Education Agency's State Facilities Allotment. The program requires the state to pay approximately 71% of the bond

payment. Therefore, local taxpayers would be responsible for only 29% of the debt payment. The main stipulation from the state for participation in this program is that the voters must approve the bond

Should the district not qualify for the State Facilities Allotment, the board will not authorize the sale of the bonds.

If approved by the voters and the bonds issued, repayment would be over a period of fifteen years. During that 15 year period, the district would levy a tax rate of approximately 6.5 cents per \$100 of property values. As an example of the increase, a home valued at \$30,000 would see an annual increase in taxes of \$9.75 - or an increase of just 81 cents a month. A home valued at \$50,000 would see

an annual increase of \$22.75 - or just \$1.90 a month.

An important point to note is that homeowners who are age 65 or older will not see an increase in their taxes.

For the landowner, the average ag use value for irrigated land is \$212.40 per acre, thus resulting in an increase of only 13.8 cents per acre. For non-irrigated land, the average ag use value is \$148.42 per acre, thus resulting in an increase of just 9.7 cents per acre.

The property tax for business owners would increase \$65.00 per \$100,00.00 of appraised value.

It is easy to see that our community and the children who attend school here now and in the future would benefit greatly from the passage of this bond election. The taxpayers would also benefit by passing the bond election on May 4 as needed repairs to our community school facilities would only cost the taxpayers 29% of total costs because the state would pay the other 71% of the cost of improvements. Keep in mind that if the bond election were not to pass and taxpayers have to make federal or state mandated improvements in the future, the district's taxpayers would then have to pay \$100% of

the cost of the mandated improvements.

The decision that taxpayers will need to make for the bond election is really quite simple: Voters can approve the bond issue now and the State of Texas will pay 71% of improvements to our school campuses. If voters don't approve the bond issue on may 4, taxpayers will have to pay 100% of the costs later. And make no mistake about it, these improvements are needed to allow our school district to comply with federal and state mandates on indoor air quality and handicap accessibility on our three campuses. Anyone who deals with government regulations knows that you can either comply voluntarily, or be forced to comply. If school district voters approve the bond election on May 4 and comply now, each taxpayer within the district saves 71% of the cost.

Many customers of Valor have voiced their unhappiness with the quality of local service, including long hold times to reach anyone in customer service.

The arrival of SRTC in Knox City follows many months of hard work and miles and miles of underground cables. In addition, the company will also provide internet access at a reduced monthly rate for customers who also have their telephone service with SRTC.

Representatives from SRTC will be in their office at 207 North 2nd Street (east) on Friday of this week and Monday of next week (April 26 and 29) from 9:00 a.m.

Former KC coach's son signs with Kansas City

Hardin-Simmons University's Kirk Rogers, son of former Greyhound coach Jimmy Rogers and wife Kay, who now reside in Olney, signed a free-agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs soon after the National Football League's annual draft ended Sunday.

All Kirk Rogers ever wanted prior to the National Football League's annual draft over the weekend was a chance.

For seven rounds that didn't happen. The draft ended, and Rogers was left to wonder "what if" - like so many other talented college players. Then the phone rang.

"My agent called and told me that the Chiefs were the only people that were interested, and I said, 'well let's go ahead and sign with them,' " said the former Hardin-Simmons University standout receiver, who signed a free-agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs soon after the draft ended Sunday.

"I talked to them (Chiefs) earlier, and they kind of sounded interested at first," Rogers said by phone Sunday evening. "Then we kind of lost contact. I really didn't expect them to call."

The numbers Rogers, listed at 5-11 and 176 pounds, put up at HSU were too good to ignore.

During his four years as a Cowboy, Rogers caught 199 passes, while setting school and American Southwest Conference records in career receiving years (4,117), touchdown receptions (50) and yards per catch (20.7).

Rogers, who runs the 40-yard dash in 4.46, was a three-time, all-ASC player, earning first-team, all-conference honors as a junior and a senior. He also was invited to play in the Aztec Bowl, a Division III all-star football game sponsored by the American Football Coaches Association, where he caught two touchdown passes.

The Hepatitis B immunization was required for Kindergarten entry this year and was required for 12 years old on August 1,

Parental notification of the chickenpox disease or proof of the varicella immunization will also be required as of August 1, 2000 for all 12 year olds, kindergarteners, or any child over the age of 12 months in preschool, daycare or registered homes. Parents are asked to check their child's records and take appropriate action. For those children in need of this immunization, parents are asked to call to reserve a dose as only the proper amount will be reserved.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records and social security numbers. A parent, adult, family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.



State spends \$2,824,135 in county welfare

The state spent a total of \$2,824,135 last year for major welfare programs in Knox County, according to Barbara Evans, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$425,354 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$82,599. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of potential clients and nonclients and issues the Lone Star

The state and federal governments share in the cost of TANF to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$1,876,142 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$377,072 for Medicaid related services and \$62,968 for non-Medicaid related services," Ms. Evans said.





Commissioner's Court receives audit report

Be it remembered on the 11th day of March, 2001, there was conducted a REGULAR Meeting of the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas, at the Courthouse thereof, in the City of Benjamin, Texas, for the purpose of transacting any and all business that may lawfully be brought before the same.

Knox County Judge David N. Perdue called Commissioners' Court to order at 1:30 P.M. in the Courthouse at Benjamin, Texas. Also present were Commissioners Weldon Skiles, Jerry Parker, Johnny Birkenfeld, and Jimmy Urbanczyk, Treasurer Penny Goodwin, Sheriff Dean Homstad, Chief Appraiser/Tax Assessor-Collector Stanton Brown, and Clerk Ronnie Verhalen. Also meeting with the Court were Cotton Smith of Munday and Debbie Piper of the accounting firm Stovall, Grandey, and Whatley.

The Court considered the following matters as posted and filed for Record in the office of the County Clerk on March 7, 2002 at 2:45 P.M. Upon motion by Commissioner Birkenfeld and seconded by Commissioner Parker, the Court voted unanimously to approve the Minutes of the Regular meeting of February 11, 2002.

Commissioner Skiles moved to recess to the first floor Assembly Room to accommodate A.L. "Cotton" Smith who wanted to address the Court, then to reassemble in the courtroom. Commis sioner Parker seconded, and all approved. In the Assembly Room, Mr. Smith talked to the Court about a county road southwest of Benjamin that has become more of a waterway; he wanted to know if it could be officially closed and turned into one. After much discussion, the judge and commissioners decided that they would have to find out what criteria would have to be met, that permission would have to be secured from adjacent landowners, public notices would have to be posted, and that the Soil Conservation representatives would have to be consulted, before such action could be taken. All commissioners would also have to take a look at the approximately 1 and one-half mile stretch of land so as to make a more informed decision about it. Information only.

Members of the Court returned upstairs. Debbie Piper of Stovall, Grandey, and Whatley gave a Knox County audit report for the Fiscal Year ended September 30. 2001. In general, she said, it was a good, clean audit report, with no major problems. She went over the 56-page report (and an accompanying booklet with the same information in graphs and illustrations) with the members of the Court. The biggest problem, she informed the Court, is one of budgeting - that the County and the commissioners should be careful not to spend anything not budgeted unless it was absolutely necessary, "only in a case of grave public necessity to meet an unusual and unforeseen condition that could not have been in-

cluded in the original budget through the use of reasonable diligent thought and attention." (C.C. Minutes, 3-11-02, #1) The main worry is that last year at this time Knox County had 5.9 months of operating expense in savings; this year the reserve is down to 2.8 months' worth of operating expense. After some questioning and the exchange of other information, Commissioner Parker moved to accept the audit, Commissioner Birkenfeld seconded, and all approved. Treasurer Penny Goodwin presented the Treasurer's Report for the period ending February 28, 2002 (C.C. Minutes, 3-11-02, #2). The Court reviewed monthly bills presented by Ms. Goodwin. After examination, upon motion by Commissioner Parker and second by Commissioner Skiles, the Court unanimously approved all the bills for the month. Tax Assessor-Collector Stanton Brown presented to the Court the tax collection statement from his office for February and for the year to date, for both general and special taxes. (C.C. Minutes, 3-11-2002, #3) Information only. Judge Perdue informed the Court that the bid on Lot 8 and the west half of Lot 9, Block 24, Davis Addition in Knox City, previously approved by the County, was rejected by the city of Knox City entity, thereby rejecting the bid. Information only.

Judge Perdue also informed the Court that TxDOT had approved a grant for an eight-feet wide allweather walking track around the golf course in Knox City and, with an irrigation system installed, which will also beautify part of Highway 6 adjoining. The grant is for \$108,560, with 20% matching funds to come from the City of Knox City, and is part of the Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program. Information only. The Court next considered the location of the Knox County Museum. The Knox County Historical Commission had voted to build it on the site of the old Ernest Tubb house, just over one block

east of the Courthouse on Highway 82. Judge Perdue had presented to the Historical Commission a letter explaining why, in his view, that site was inferior to one either east or southwest across the street from the Courthouse. Those reasons involved insurance liability, parking, neighborhood concerns, upkeep, convenience, and other concerns. Upon motion by Commissioner Urbanczyk and second by Commissioner Skiles, the Court voted unanimously in support of the letter to the Commission, concurring with the judge's objections and rescinding approval of the Ernest Tubb site because of the stated concerns. Clerk Ronnle Verhalen gave an update on the quest for a new copier in the Clerks' office. He has written a list of specifications and is in the process of sending out for bids. Information only.

The Court considered a resolution to participate in the County Information Resources Agency sponsored by the Texas Association of Counties, at no cost to the county. Commissioner Skiles moved to do so, Commissioner Birkenfeld seconded, and all agreed. (C.C. Minutes, 3-11-2002, #4).

Commissioner Skiles moved to utilize an inspection service from the Texas Association of Counties to check insurance coverages, also at no cost to the County. Commissioner Birkenfeld seconded, and all voted in favor.

There being no further business to come before the Court at this time, upon motion by Commissioner Urbanczyk, seconded by Commissioner Birkenfeld, and carried unanimously, the meeting of the Court was ADJOURNED.



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
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
