School bond election - very important for the future of our schools

Saturday, May 4 is a date to mark on your calendars and cirle in red as a day that you don't want to forget! This Saturday is the very important day set for a bond election that will allow improvements on all 3 campus locations of our local school district.

If approved by the voters, the May 4 bond election will authorize the school board trustees to issue a bond in the amount of 1 million dollars for improvements to the district's facilities. The funds will be used to improve and modernize the heating and air conditioning systems, lighting, and handicap accessibility on all three school campuses.

The intended improvements to the heating and cooling systems will allow the school district to achieve compliance with current guidelines on indoor air quality. The improvements will also improve the energy efficiency of the buildings, thus providing for district wide reduction in future energy costs.

If voters approve the bond in the May 4 election, the district will apply to the Texas Education Agency's State Facilities Allotment. The program requires the state to pay approximately 71% of the bond payment. Therefore, local taxpayers would be responsible for only 29% of the debt payment. The main stipulation from the state for participation in this program is that the voters must approve the bond issue. Should the district not qualify for the State Facilities Allotment, the board will not authorize the sale of the bonds.

If approved by the voters and the bonds issued, repayment would be over a period of fifteen years. During that 15 year period, the district would levy a tax rate of approximately 6.5 cents per \$100 of property values. As an example of the increase, a home valued at \$30,000 would see an annual increase in taxes of \$9.75 - or an increase of just 81 cents a month. A home valued at \$50,000 would see an annual increase of \$22.75 - or just \$1.90 a month.

An important point to note is that homeowners who are age 65 or older will not see an increase in their taxes. For the landowner, the average ag use value for irrigated land is \$212.40 per acre, thus resulting in an increase of only 13.8 cents per acre. For non-irrigated land, the average ag use value is \$148.42 per acre, thus resulting in an increase of just 9.7 cents per acre. The property tax for business owners would increase \$65.00 per \$100,00.00 of appraised value.

It is easy to see that our community and the children who attend school here now and in the future would benefit greatly from the passage of this bond election. The taxpayers would also benefit by passing the bond election on May 4 as needed repairs to our community school facilities would only cost the taxpayers 29% of total costs because the state would pay the other 71% of the cost of improvements. Keep in mind that if the bond election were not to pass and taxpayers have to make federal or state mandated improvements in the future, the district's taxpayers would then have to pay \$100% of the cost of the mandated improvements.

Local elections ... do voters want a change ?

This Saturday, May 4, is also the date for joint elections of the Knox City-O'Brien CISD, the city council for the City of Knox City, and the Knox County Hospital District. Voters will have an opportunity to retain current officials in two of the races, or place new officials in all three local races. Because of future challenges facing all governmental entities, elected officials with strong leadership abilities and experience with finance and business matters will be an asset to the communities they serve.

School District Board of Trustees

In the election for the Knox City - O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District, incumbents Scott Lynn, Charlie Schur and Bill Stewart will be joined on the ballot by challenger Michelle Esquivel. School districts throughout the state of Texas will be facing some big challenges in the future as enrollment figures and funding decline statewide while operating costs keep rising. Voters are encouraged to take a strong look at each of the candidates and vote for those they feel have the experience necessary to make wise, and often tough decisions for the future of our schools.

City Council, City of Knox City

In the city council election, former Mayor and City Councilman Tommie (Bud) Reynolds and former City Councilman Domingo Garcia will challenge the three incumbents: Fred Ledesma, Jessie Rios and James Manning in the race for three council seats. There are a lot of issues confronting residents of Knox City these days and city leaders with eye on the future will be needed even as Knox City continues through current hard economic times. Voters are encouraged to vote for the candidates they feel can best make decisions for the future of Knox City. Small town elections have often been popularity contests in the past, but the survival of small communities like ours will require strong leadership from those able to make tough and sometimes controversial decisions.

Knox County Hospital, Board of Trustees

In the Knox County Hospital Board election, James Reid, JoAnn Albus and Mack Lowe will be running for two seats. After many years of dedicated community service, incumbents Peggy McGaughey and Don Bunton are not seeking re-election. With the Knox County Hospital so vital to the economic future of both Knox City and Knox County, voters are encouraged to study the candidates for this election carefully. As in the city and school elections, candidates with strong leadership ability will be a big asset to the management and future of our county hospital.

Where to vote

On Saturday, May 4, local residents voting in the City Council election, the Knox County Hospital Board election, and residents of the school district who reside in Knox County will vote from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the Knox City Aging Services building located at 601 North Avenue E in Knox City.

Residents of the Knox City - O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District who reside in Haskell County will vote from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 4, at the O'Brien City Hall located at 1000 Grand Central Avenue in O'Brien.

There has been talk around town that the school has a large surplus of funds in reserve and some seem to think that those funds should pay for these improvements, rather than the proposed bond. Any person is more than welcome to go by the school administrative office and ask for a copy of the school financial record. The record is public record and open to the general public. For those who have ignored rumor and gossip and taken the time to check this information out, they have found out that the school district has 1.7 million dollars in reserve. While that seems like a large sum of money, in reality it is not that great of an amount when compared to the total budget of the district. Voters also need to keep in mind that the 1.7 million dollars in reserve is there to be drawn on in the event of an emergency. In addition, the State of Texas will not allow the use of those funds for the proposed improvements that this bond election is being held for. The state legislators very clearly indicated that the state funds covering 71% of the improvements will only be available if the citizens pass a bond election.

The decision that taxpayers will need to make for the bond election is really quite simple: We can approve the bond issue now and the State of Texas will pay 71% of improvements to our school campuses. If we don't approve the bond issue on may 4, we'll all have to pay 100% of the costs later. And make no mistake about it, these improvements are needed to allow our school district to comply with federal and state mandates on indoor air quality and handicap accessibility on our three campuses. Anyone who deals with government regulations knows that you can either comply voluntarily, or be forced to comply. If we approve the bond election on May 4 and comply now, each taxpayer saves 71% of the cost.

By passing this bond election, taxpayers will be saying loud and clear that they care about the environment and the facilities where our local children receive a quality education. This bond election is very important and a larger than normal turnout at the polls is expected.

organized.







THE KNOX CITY POLICE DEPT. is informing Knox City residents of the Knox City Code of Ordinances, **ARTICLE 2.100**

ANIMAL CONTROL. The Knox City Police Dept. will be enforcing the following: Sec. 2.101 Definitions

Fowl. Any chickens, turkeys, geese, guineas, ducks, pigeons, pheasants, or similar classified fowl allowed to be kept through the means of an authorized fowl permit within the city limits of Knox City.

Livestock. Any horse, mule jack, jenny, cow, cattle, sheep, goat, hog or similar animal allowed to be kept through the means of an authorized livestock permit within the city limits of Knox City.

Livestock, Fowl and Animal Permits. Permits allowed for the keeping of livestock, fowl and animals within the city limits of Knox City authorized only by the city council of the City of Knox City, in accordance with the regulations and procedures of this article.

Sec. 2.102 Unlawful Keeping of Livestock, Fowl and Animals

(1) To feed, breed, stable, pasture, or keep any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other livestock of like species in or on any lot, pen building, parcel of land, stable, or other enclosure in the city, any part of which lots, pen, building, stable, parcel of land or other enclosure, is nearer than one hundred (100) feet to ay building occupied by any person any part of the day or

(2) To feed, breed, corral, cage, or keep any fowl or animals, as defined respectively in this ordinance, on or in any lot pen, building, parcel of land, stable or other enclosure in the city, any part of which lot, pen, building, stable, parcel of land or other enclosure, nearer than one hundred (100) feet to any building occupied by any person any part of the day or

(3) An exception will be made to subsections (1) and (2) when the owner and/or resident, that owns a building closer than 100 feet to the place where livestock, fowl and animals are to be placed, signs and affidavit consenting to the placement of the livestock, fowl, and animals, Sec. 2, 106 Permit Procedure

Sec. 2, 107 Approval or Rejection (a) The city council shall approve or reject any livestock, fowl, or animal permit as the city council deems to be the best interest, health and general welfare of the citizens of the City of Knox City, Texas; no permit shall be issued which in injurious to the health, well-being and general welfare of said citizens of the City of Knox City, Texas; nor shall such livestock, fowl or animal permit be issued to any person who permits obnoxious odors, livestock, fowl or animals are

(b) The city council shall have the power and authority at any time to revoke and cancel any permit previously issued, provided, however, any person who has had their permit revoked or canceled, shall have the right of appeal to the city council of the City of Knox City, Texas, by filing the appeal with the city council within ten (10) days from the date of mailing of notice or revocation or cancellation to the holder of the permit at the address shown on the application.


