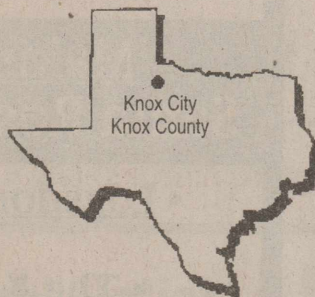

Newman of Thrall 6-0, 6-4 in the Quarter-Finals, then defeating Tony and Cole Lange of

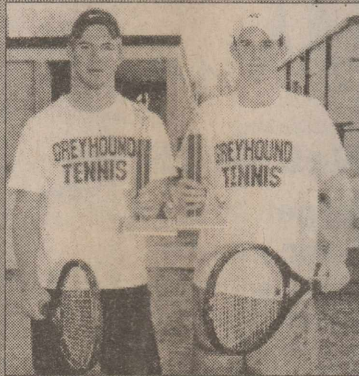

## Blood drive set for May 21

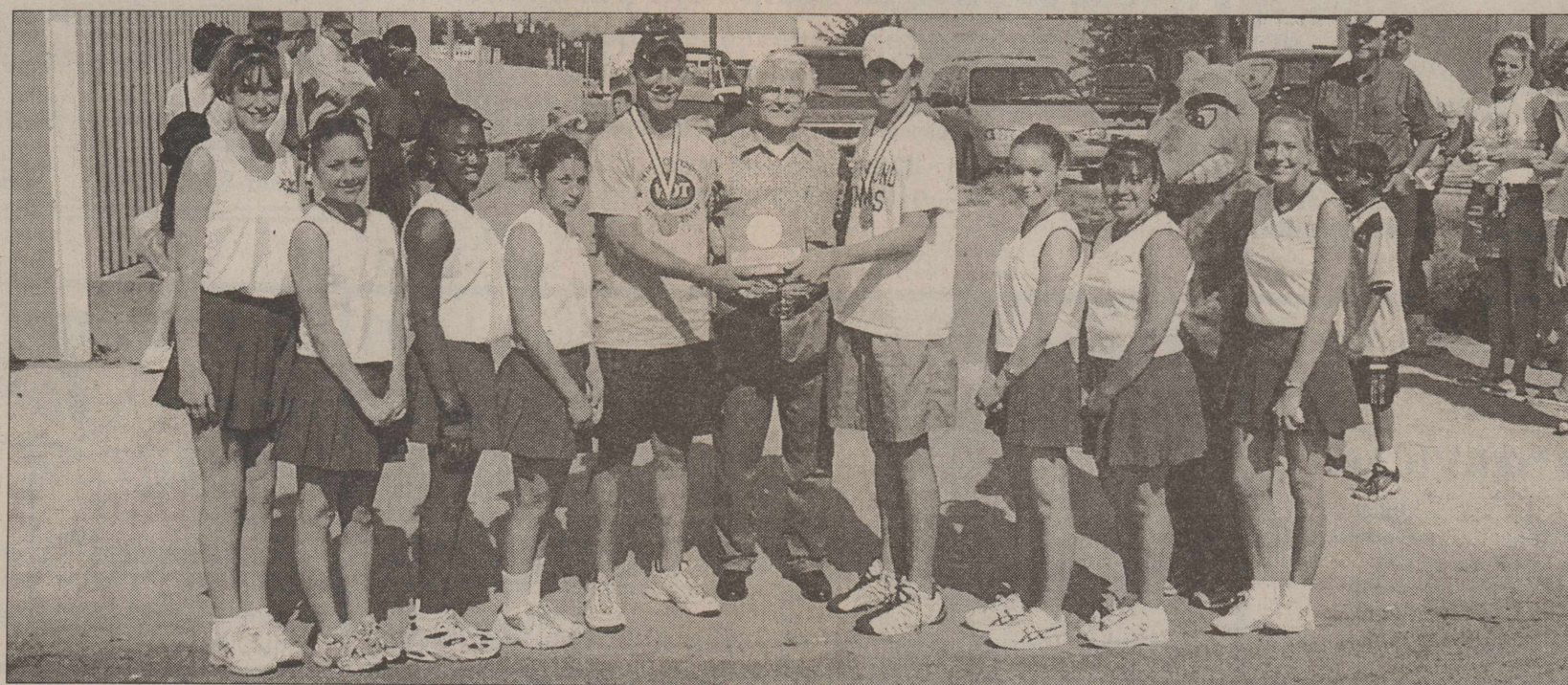

Free t-shirts for blood donors will be given and refreshments of juice and cookies will be served.

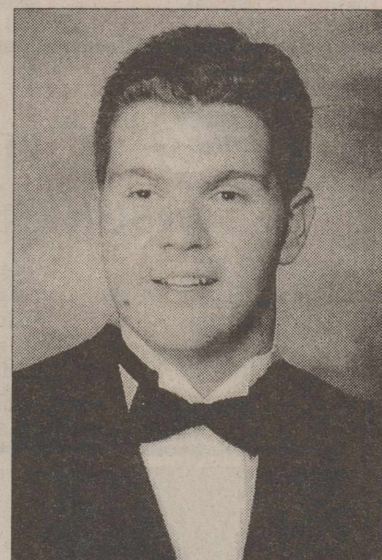
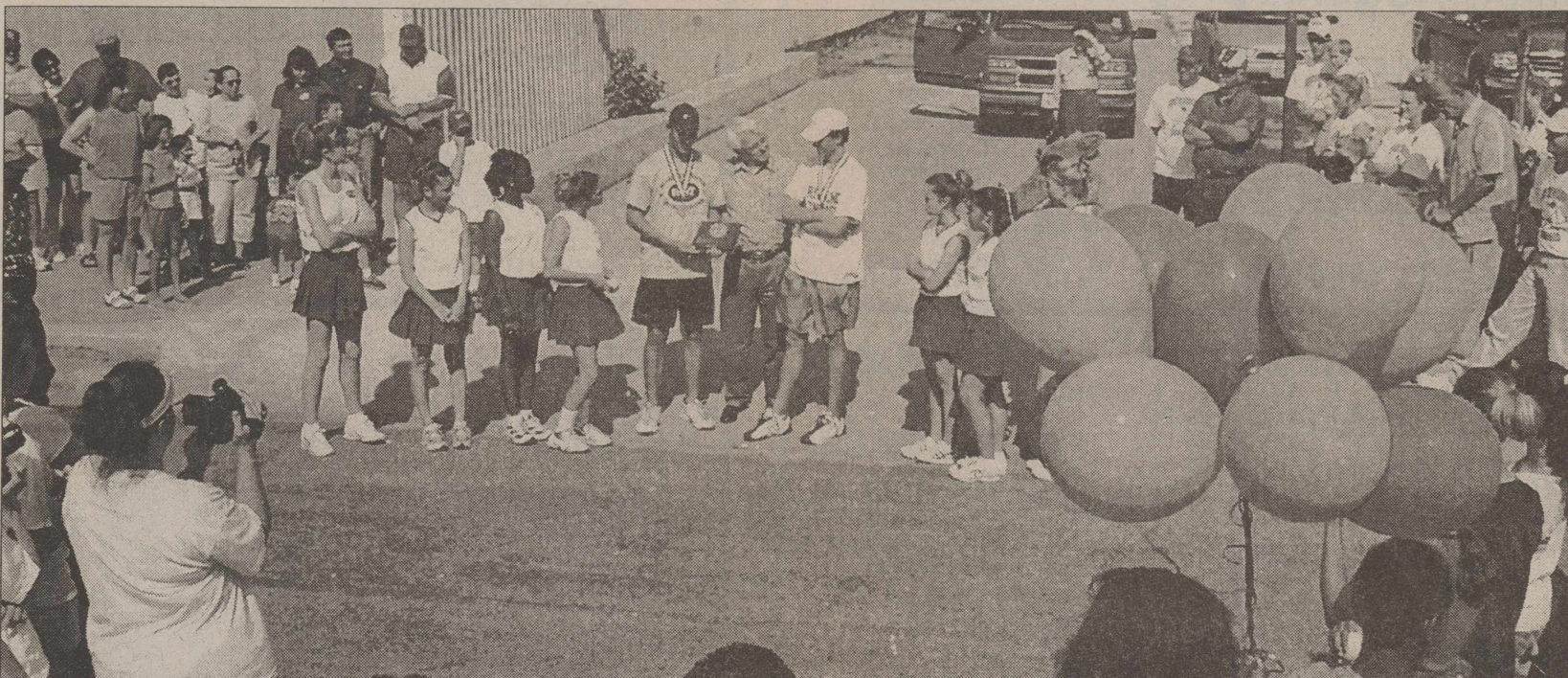
## Retired teachers to meet May 14 at First Baptist in Knox City

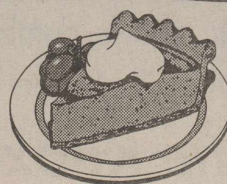

## Relay For Life is a fun-filled fundraiser benefitting everyone

Relay for Life is a community, fun-filled, and meaningful fundraiser that benefits everyone. The Relay is an overnight (at least 12 hours per national standards) and this is because the Relay is supposed to represent that a cancer patient lives with this disease 24 hours a day.

The most important aspect of relay as a fundraiser is having teams. Each team is made up of 8 or more people who can be families, co-workers, youth groups, friends, clubs, organizations, etc. Each team member pays a registration fee to participate in the event, and then each team member is challenged with raising \$50 per person (or whatever fund-raising amount is set). They can raise money collectively as a team by having a garage sale, car wash, etc. or they can raise the money individually. Many teams do their walk as a dedication to someone they know who has cancer or had died of cancer. The event also encourages teams to do onsite fund raising by selling food or having games or other activities. Each team brings tents, chairs and decorations to make their campsite stand out - you can even have an award at the end of the event for the best campsite. It is a relay because each team member will walk for the duration of the event for 30 minutes each.

The Relay event also includes a cancer survivor's celebration and survivors lap. Survivors in the community would be invited to come and participate in the first lap of the Relay. The purpose of this is to honor them. Another special part of the Relay is the luminary ceremony, which happens just after dark. Luminaries are sold usually for \$5 each and

recognize someone special. A luminary is a white sack filled with sand and a candle and they are bought in honor or in memory. You can write on the sack who it is for, from whom, and a message if you like. At the ceremony, the luminaries are put around the track and lit and then there is a ceremony where all the names will be read and other meaningful ceremonies can be held.

The Relay has a lot of things like music, games and food during the event and you conclude the Relay with final lap in which everyone participates. This is a fun and wonderful event for the community which helps educate people on the importance of early detection and prevention of cancer.

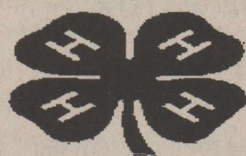

### Farm Bill Interpretation program scheduled

The long-awaited farm bill has cleared the House and Senate conference committee and passed the House of Representatives.

Now specific details can be examined. Texas Cooperative Extension has scheduled a "Farm Bill Interpretation Program" at 8:30 a.m. May 15 at the Haskell National Bank meeting room in Haskell.

This meeting is to help producers and ag lenders of Knox and Haskell Counties better understand the ramifications of the new farm bill.

"We have known for some time now that the respective House and Senate bills have looked like, but we have been speculating on what compromise the conference committee would produce, and what the changes would mean to producers," said Stan Bevers, District 3 Extension Economist.

"Now we have the details of the bill in place. We've designed this program specifically to help producers and lenders understand the effects of the farm bill on the agricultural economic climate of the Rolling Plains and what specific actions producers need to take in order to take full advantage of the farm policy provisions."

Bevers and Brandon Anderson will conduct the program. Ander-

son is the County Extension Agent for Agriculture in Haskell.

The meeting is being sponsored by The Texas Cooperative Extension of Haskell and Knox County and the Haskell County Agricultural Committee.

Coffee and donuts will be provided.

The program will start with a general overview of the farm bill and its program and crop commodity changes.

The overview will be followed by an explanation of the target prices, loan rates, fixed payment rates, counter-cyclical program, base and yield updating and payment limits.

"We'll also talk about the farm bill's considerable conservation-related program changes and what producers need to do regarding the processes associated with these changes," said Bevers.

### Foreign Body in the Eye

**DO** have patient pull upper lid over lower lid.

**DO** flush eye with plain water.

**DO** cover the eye loosely with a gauze dressing and seek medical attention immediately if the object doesn't flush out.

**DON'T** attempt to locate the foreign body if not readily visible.

**DON'T** rub eye, at all. Keep hands off of eye!

### Eye wounds

**DO** apply loose sterile dressing over the eye.

**DO** seek medical attention immediately.

**DO** apply cold compress or ice pack to relieve pain and reduce swelling.

**DON'T** try to remove any embedded object.

**DON'T** apply pressure to the eye.
