



City Council has lively exchange of differing opinions

In last Thursday night's regular scheduled meeting of the City Council, several topics of conversation brought about lively discussions as members of the council differed from one another in their approach to different matters, including the Police Department and the outside Maintenance Department.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Charles Lankford, City Councilmen Leon Watson, Fred Ledesma, outgoing City Councilmen James Manning and Jessie Rios, and City Secretary Barbara Rector. Incoming Councilmen Bud Reynolds and Domingo Garcia were also present for the meeting, but were not sworn into their newly elected seats on the council until the end of the meeting. City Councilman J.M. Emerson was not present for the meeting.

• In the time period set aside for public comments, a local couple discussed a citation they had received for violating the city's new ordinance concerning animals within the city limits. They advised the council that they would abide by the law with regard to their chickens and roosters, as long as the law was administered the same to everyone. Mayor Lankford assured them the citations were being issued fairly and thanked them for bringing their concern to the council.

• An engineer reported to the council on improvements that need to be made to the city sewer facilities, and also informed the See City Councilmen, Page 3

council that Knox City's sewage and water plants would be inspected this week by representatives from the TNRCC. Several areas are currently in a state of noncompliance, and the engineer expected state inspectors to cite the city for the violations. The sewage pumping facility on the northeast side of Knox City is down from two pumps to one, and that pump is also in need of repair. If the remaining pump goes out, it could affect that whole side of town. All areas of noncompliance with state standards are currently being addressed by the city council and city maintenance employ-

• The council reviewed bids for employee health insurance, after deliberation the bid was awarded to Bill Stewart Insurance for a policy that pays 90% with a \$500.00 deductible.

• Joe Clonts was reappointed to the Water Authority Board. Both Joe and Leon Burkham represent Knox City on the board.

• The board members from both the 4A and 4B boards of EDC were discussed, Mayor Lankford advised that no action was needed at this time.

• The council reviewed applications, then hired Donna Banks

back as the Swimming Pool Manager for the upcoming summer season. Councilman Fred Ledesma abstained from the vote.

• The council voted in favor of terminating the city's agreement with CellularOne. for three cell phones, citing poor service within the city limits.

• The council discussed the payment of \$300.00 to outside sources for each derelict house burned by the Knox City Fire Department. Council members agreed to save the city money by letting city workers try the cleanup instead of continued use of outside sources.

• The council discussed a 6 foot chain link fence that is required by State law around the water tower located behind The Supply House. Prices for building a fence will be obtained.

• Next on the agenda was a review of the Police Department's Policy Manual. After considerable deliberation, the council passed a motion by Councilman James Manning to prohibit any unauthorized persons from riding in the police cars. Councilman Fred Ledesma voted against the motion.

• Deliberation of the Public Works report was next on the agenda, but Maintenance Supervisor Scott Perry was not present for the meeting. Mayor Lankford commented that he thought the work of outside employees in the maintenance department was not coordinated. He also commented that the paving machine was not being utilized as originally planned when it was purchased. Councilman Fred Ledesma reported that he had talked with the employees and they were doing tasks such as repairing water leaks that they felt were more important than running the paving machine. He stated that employees in the maintenance department also complained of being given a job to do, but then being pulled off the job before they could finish the assigned task. Councilman Ledesma wanted to know who was pulling them off the job. Mayor Lankford replied that it was not him. City maintenance worker Wesley Espinosa then stood and interrupted the council, stating that the workers were being held up by Mayor Lankford. He informed the council members that the workers report to work early every morning and are assigned tasks by Maintenance supervisor Scott Perry, but then had to wait on Mayor Lankford to arrive and give them assignments. Espinosa also explained that the maintenance workers were giving high priority to repairing water leaks that are a big problem because of the age and condition of the city's water lines. He felt that citizens having good water to drink was more important than running the paving machine, and that the council needed to start thinking about laying some new water lines now that the weather

was good. He indicated that new

lines in some parts of town now would save the employees having to repair leak after leak on the same lines when the weather was freezing during the winter months.

• The Fire Department and Police Department reports were presented next for review. When discussing the Police Report, Councilman Jessie Rios wanted to know why the city's police officers were not present at the meeting. Councilman Fred Ledesma defended the officer's absence from the council meeting, stating that every time the officers are there, all the talk is negative and he did not blame them for not being there. Councilman James Manning commented that the officers had been told to be at the meeting, and that in business when someone does not do what they are told to do, they are usually fired. There was another brief exchange of words between Ledesma, Manning and Rios before the meeting continued with everyone smiling.

• City Secretary Barbara Rector then presented the financial reports, explaining that a new system was in place and the new style reporting would give better accounting for each department's income and expenditures. She also gave the council good news that all 60 and 90 day delinquent water accounts had either been paid or turned off.

• Councilman Leon Watson reported that the new sign was up at the city's RV Park on South East Third Street

• Voting results were next on the agenda, councilmen looked over the results of ballots cast in the election for three city council seats in both absentee and poll voting.

Mayor Lankford thanked Councilmen Jessie Rios and James Manning for their service to the council, then gave the oath of office to incoming council members Tommie (Bud) Reynolds, Domingo Garcia and reelected Councilman Fred Ledesma.

ADHD class to be held in Haskell starting on Monday

A six-week class offering education and support to parents and caregivers of children with ADHD (does not have to be diagnosed) will begin May 20 at the First Baptist Church in Haskell.

The group will meet each Monday evening from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Enrollment will be limited in order to keep the class small and allow discussion within the group. The class is free and there are no eligibility requirements.

The classes will be designed to build upon one another, so commitment to attending as many classes as possible is important. The class will last through July 1. Topics will include:

• What is ADHD? (including tips on how to get an appropriate assessment and an accurate diagnosis).

• The importance of praise and building self-confidence.

• Methods to ease the parenting of children with ADHD, (particularly looking at techniques for managing behavior).

• Working with the school system and issues related to the child's education.

• Resources available for families affected by ADHD.

A group will meet at the same time for children with ADHD whose caregivers are attending the adult group. This group will focus on developing self-confidence, impulse control, and social and communication skills. Childcare will not be provided for siblings.







Veterans News Notes

Seven proposals submitted for Texas Veterans' cemetaries

AUSTIN-Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst and Texas Veterans Commission Chairman James Duncan, co-Chairs of the Texas State Veterans' Cemetery (TSVC) Committee, today announced receipt of seven formal proposals from communities that want a State Veterans' Cemetery. The seven proposals, which were received on or before the May 1 deadline, are being evaluated, and action on site selection will likely take place around mid-June.

"We received seven good proposals from seven great communities," Dewhurst said. "Now we have the difficult task of deciding which one or two of these will be nominated for federal funding for fiscal year 2003."

The communities and organizations that submitted formal proposals for a TSVC are the City of Killeen, the Hidalgo County Advisory Committee on Veterans Affairs, the Lamesa Economic Development Corporation, Tyler County, Duval County, the Winters Area: Business and Industrial Corporation and the Remembrance Foundation Charitable Trust in Lamar County.

Three other communities-the City of Wichita Falls, the City of Amarillo, and the Nueces County State Veterans Cemetery Advisory Committee-also expressed interest in being considered in the future for selection as a TSVC site, but did not file formal proposals at this time.

The TSVC Committee has indicated that it may issue requests for proposals in future years to consider these communities or any others that might then be interested.

Texas' Downgrade for cattle TB status

Texas livestock health officials are alerting cattle producers, veterinarians and livestock markets that the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) will strip Texas of its "Free" status for cattle tuberculosis (TB) eradication on or around June 1. The TB status downgrade will mean that the 150,000 or more breeding cattle hauled out of Texas each year must have a negative tuberculosis skin test prior to being moved. The USDA has placed a moratorium on additional restrictions until at least January 2003, when the state's feeder cattle must be identified with official ear tags before being transported out of state. "Since late February, we have worked with the USDA and cattle industry groups to prepare for the loss of Texas' TB-free status, which we initially thought would occur as early as April," explained Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. "This loss of status will have a great impact on the Texas livestock industry and, until producers are familiar with the process, it could slow the movement of breeding cattle out of the state."

"The downgrade in TB status comes as a result of the diagnosis and subsequent depopulation of two TB-infected cattle herds during 2001," she said. "Both infected herds were detected by slaughter plant inspectors, who found carcasses with internal lesions indicative of TB. Lesion samples were submitted to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) for examination, and we began skin-testing the herds where the animals originated. We closely examined the carcasses of test-positive animals from the herds and submitted lesions to the NVSL for examination and confirmation of TB." Dr. Logan said the two infected herds. found in South Central Texas in summer 2001, and in Southwest Texas in fall 2001, have been depopulated. More than 130 other herds have been tested, as TAHC and USDA officials search for the origin of the disease outbreak, and where it may have spread. No other infected herds have been detected, and veterinary epidemiologists have been unable to pinpoint the source of infection.

"Federal regulations mandate a loss of TB-free status when a state has two or more infected herds disclosed within a 48-month period. Texas will move from the TB-free status it has held since November 2000, to modified accredited advanced status, the second highest rung in an international five-tier ranking system for cattle TB eradication," said Dr. Logan. She said it will take at least two years without an infected herd for Texas to regain its coveted TB-free status enjoyed by all other states except Michigan.

The loss of status will immediately impact producers who move or sell breeding cattle out of state, explained Dr. Logan. Breeding animals are bred heifers, bulls and cows. Since many cattle sold at livestock markets are hauled out of state, producer groups have struggled with logistical problems sure to be encountered when untested animals are presented at livestock markets. She said breeding cattle are exempted from the interstate testing requirement only if they are from a TB accreditedfree herd (a herd that is tested for TB yearly and is enrolled in the TAHC's accreditation program), are moving to an approved feedyard, or are consigned directly to slaughter.

"If sellers arrive at the livestock market with untested breeding cattle, the market management will need to designate the untested animals as 'Texas-only' cattle, restrict the cattle to slaughter only, or they will have to make arrangements for having the animals tested so they can move interstate," explained Dr. Logan. "Producers can avoid delays in moving their cattle, if they'll have their accredited veterinarian test animals prior to sale."

A TB skin test takes 72 hours to complete and must be conducted by an accredited veterinarian, who injects tuberculin into the skin near the animal's tail, in a site called the 'caudal fold,' After a 72-hour waiting period, the veterinarian examines the injection site for a response, such as redness or swelling. Animals without a response can move. If a response is detected, Dr. Logan said a second test must be applied on the animal's neck by a state or

federal regulatory veterinarian. This comparative cervical test also requires a waiting period of 72 hours after injection before it can be read, she said. Animals with negative results on the comparative cervical test also are free to move. "One or two percent of animals will test positive on the caudal fold test but then are cleared for movement with a negative comparative cervical test," said Dr. Logan. "If the animals have skin reactions on both tests, however, they need to be slaughtered and closely examined, as there is strong evidence that the animal has been infected with TB."

"Veterinarians from the TAHC and the USDA in Texas will work with private veterinary practitioners and producers to conduct all needed comparative cervical tests as quickly as possible," said Dr. Logan. "Preventing bottlenecks and keeping Texas livestock moving will be a key goal for our staff." Dr. Logan said that cattle industry groups continue to develop plans to address federal TB requirements that will apply to Texas feeder cattle as of January 2003. "More than 1.5 million feeder cattle leave Texas each year, and each of these animals will have to wear an official identification eartag," said Dr. Logan. "Currently, official tags are used to identify animals tested for brucellosis, and these must be applied by private veterinary practitioners, or state or federal staff. We are working with industry and the USDA to develop an acceptable ear tag that can be provided and applied by the cattle owner. The identification tags improve the ability to trace animals back to their herd of origin."

"We are trying to find an acceptable alternative to testing the 750,000 feeder heifers that move, as this would be require a greater number of veterinarians than are currently available to conduct the testing," said Dr. Logan. "We hope to strike an agreement with the USDA to allow approved pastures or feedlots in other states that would accept untested heifers. Heifers selected for breeding could be moved from these sites to a ranch after they've had a negative TB test."





Property Owners Sent Appraisal Letters for Tax Year 2002

State law requires county appraisal districts to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. On May 2, 2002 and May 10, 2002, the Knox County Appraisal District mailed property owners letters showing their 2002 proposed appraised value.

Stanton Brown, Chief Appraiser of the District, reminds property owners that the letter of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay - - this is not a bill," Brown said.

Brown emphasized the importance of this letter and the key information of this letter and the key information that it contains. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Knox County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and other areas," he said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called the "ARB", is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

What should a property owner carefully review? "Look at the proposed value for 2002," Brown said. "The letter states the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal letter also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value too.

Homeowners that qualify for property tax homestead exemptions have a limitation on their homes' appraised value, beginning with the second year they qualify their home for homestead exemptions. The appraisal district may not increase their home value by more than 10 percent for each year since the last reappraisal year. A homeowner's letter gives both the market value for the home and the limited home value.

Letters to the property owners whose values went up, or increased more than \$1,000 also will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new taxable value and estimated tax rates if the taxing units set tax rates for the same amount of operating dollars as last year. Taxing units will set final tax rates in August or September. Final tax amounts may vary from these "estimated" amounts.

Brown asks property owners to check the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no mistakes. "If the letter has an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October," Brown added.

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address. A property owner is liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time.

Property owners are encouraged to contact the appraisal district with any questions.

Brown added, "If you did not get a letter and want 2002 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at (940) 454-3891." The general deadline for protesting to the ARB is June 2, 2002, for notices mailed on May 2, 2002, and June 8, 2002, for notices mailed on May 10, 2002, for this year.






