(NAPS)—The National Cancer Institute urges Americans to fight disease with color. Eating 5 to 9 servings of colorful fruits and vegetables every day provides important phytochemicals that reduce the risk of cancer and



Deep orange and bright yellow fruits and vegetables, like sweet potatoes, peaches and carrots, contain the powerful antioxidant beta carotene, which reduces the risk of cancer and heart disease, and boosts the immune system.

Lycopene, which helps reduce the risk of cancer, can be found in tomato-based products, watermelon and pink grapefruit. Anthocyanins, which help control high blood pressure and protect against diabetes-related circulatory problems, are found in red raspberries, strawberries and beets, as well as blueberries and purple grapes.

Some purple fruits like eggplant and raisins contain phenolics, which help reduce the risk of heart disease and Alzheimer's.

Green leafy vegetables such as spinach and romaine lettuce are packed with lutein, a phytochemical crucial to maintaining good vision. Another group of phytochemicals called indoles are found in cruciferous vegetables such as broccoli and cauliflower, and help protect against breast cancer and

Flavor up your colorful dishes with nutrient-rich vegetables from the white group. Garlic, onions, and leeks contain allicin, which may help lower cholesterol and blood pressure, and increase the body's ability to fight infections.

SKIN CANCER

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States. The three major types of skin cancer are the highly curable basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas and the more serious malignant melanoma. The American Cancer Society estimates that a combined total of more than one million new cases of basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas and an additional 51,400 new cases of malignant melanoma will be diagnosed in 2001. In 2001 alone, skin cancer will claim the lives of almost 9,800 people.

Exposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays appears to be the most important factor in the development of skin cancer. Skin cancer is largely preventable when sun protection measures are consistently used. However, approximately 70% of American adults do not protect themselves from the sun's dangerous rays. According to the results of CDC's 1992 National Health Interview

- Only 30% of adults sought shade
- Only 28% wore protective clothing when exposed to sunlight Only 32% routinely used sunscreen lotion

The vast majority of skin cancers can be cured if diagnosed and treated early. Aside from protecting your skin from sun damage, it is important to recognize the early signs of skin cancer.

- · Skin sores that do not heal
- · Bumps or nodules in the skin that are enlarging, and
- Changes in existing moles (size, texture, color)

If you notice any of the factors listed above, see your doctor right away. If you have a spot or lump on your skin, your doctor may remove the growth and examine the tissue under the microscope. This is called a biopsy. A biopsy can usually be done in the doctor's office and usually involves numbing the skin with a local anesthetic. Examination of the biopsy under the microscope will tell the doctor if the skin lesion is a cancer (malignancy).
