



Former resident and wife are new missionaries

Lance and Sarah Knight Cypert have joined more than 5,100 Southern Baptist International Mission Board workers sharing Christ in 185 countries and among 1,125 ethnic people groups. The Cyperts were among 67 people appointed May 21 by the International Mission Board during a service at its Missionary Learning Center in Rockville, Va. The new missionaries will fill diverse job assignments that range from starting churches to using sports, education and music as tools of ministry.

In 2001, International Mission Board missionaries and their overseas partners baptized 395,773 new believers. They started 5,775 churches and reported more than 5.8 million members in 61,569 churches overseas.

The Cyperts will minister among the 200,000 Criollo people of Argentina. He will lead a team in starting a church-planting movement; she will conduct outreach through church and home.

Since 1999, Cypert has served as pastor of First Baptist Church in Quitaque, Texas, where the family lives. He previously served as

With nearly 16 million members, the Southern Baptist Convention is the largest evangelical denomination in the United States; its International Mission Board is the largest evangelical missionary-sending agency.







What are Coliforms'

Coliform bacteria are used as indicators of microbial contamination of drinking water because they are easily detected and found in the digestive tract of warm blooded animals. While not themselves disease producers, they are often found in association with other microbes that are capable of causing disease. Coliform bacteria are more hardy than many disease. causing organisms; therefore their absence from water is a good indication that the water is bacteriologically safe for

Fecal coliform (mostly E-coli), is a portion of the coliform bacteria group originating in the intestinal tract of warm-blooded animals that passes into the environment as feces. Fecal coliform is often used as an indicator of the fecal contamination
