



Recently, I had the occasion to read an article that appeared in the Sunday, January 26 edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that described our area of the country.... or at least something that happened near here. While we are always glad to see our area get publicity, we are concerned when someone 'local' does something that earns bad publicity, because that kind of a reputation can hurt our area as a whole. With the economy out here in the rural areas being in the condition it is, what folks who visit here say about us when they leave is important to all of

Bob Hood's commentary in the Star-Telegram is titled 'Bad sports can spoil the fun for everyone' and talks about a recent geese hunt he took with Stanfield Outfitters in a maize field near Rochester. Bob was doing a feature story about a bird dog named Ria, that also appeared in the same edition of the paper.

The site was a harvested maize field that had been scouted the evening before, with hundreds of geese feeding there. The field was several hundred yards from another hunting headquarters, competitors

with the Stanfields. Shortly after daybreak, two flocks of Canadian geese arrived, and the hunters bagged four. But when a third bunch of birds approached and . cupped their wings, three quick shotgun blasts from the nearby outfitter's headquarters chased the geese away before they were in range of the hunters.

This scenario was repeated 13 more times as flocks of geese moved almost in range of the hunters. The neighbor wasn't being very neighborly, spoiling the hunt.

The man firing the shotgun, who was standing on the porch of a building belonging to the rival outfitters, was clearly photographed with a long distance lens while he was in the act of scaring the geese away from the hunters.


A Texas Game Warden was eventually called, however charges could not be filed because the man firing the shotgun and ruining the hunt was standing on his own property.

Despite the harassing shotgun blasts by a jealous competitor, the hunters bagged 12 geese before calling it quits at 11:30 in the morning. Without the harassment of the man with the shotgun, they could easily have bagged 20 or more.

Bob Hood said in his article: "Over the years, I have heard and seen a lot of jealousy expressed - by outfitters, guides, and ordinary hunters and anglers. In no case have I seen any reason for that jealousy to go beyond words spoken privately. There is no room for such acts. Not for shotgun blasts to scare off geese." Mr. Hood went on to thank the Stanfields, saying "My hat goes off to Stanfield Hunting Outfitters for handling the situation as they did by simply expressing a sense of pity for a jealous competitor. Such cases often lead to a different response, which would be just as wrong."

The commentary concluded with Bob saying "Harassment, even for revenge is unacceptable, and the same goes for jealousy, greed and other things that breed poor sportsmanship. It is a pity, indeed."

I couldn't agree more, and certainly couldn't phrase it any better than Bob Hood did in his commentary. I only hope that if he decides to give this area another chance in the future, that he is treated with courtesy and respect by EVERYONE, because after all, he is doing his part to help the economy of this area with feature stories in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that attract hunters to our neck of the woods.



Agriculture relies on many factors working together to create food and fiber for a growing world population. While science and technology are a major part of this work, agriculture's most important component is the people who live and work in it.

As I start my second four-year term as agriculture commissioner, one of my top priorities is to meet face-to-face with the farmers and ranchers of Texas to discuss initiatives important to them. With a state the size of Texas - nearly 800 miles wide, 800 miles long, encompassing 254 counties - this is no easy task, but it must

With about 500 employees statewide, it is a basic Texas Department of Agriculture philosophy to keep a local focus. Our Austin headquarters, five regional service offices, four satellite offices, seven laboratories and six livestock export facilities enable us to do this, but this spring I will take our local focus one step further.

In March I will hit the open road for town hall style meetings with producers and business people in many communities across Texas. I have held similar meetings in the past with much success. The plan is to visit a diverse collection of towns including Alpine, Crystal City, Rock Springs, Dell City, Booker, Vernon, Gainesville, Quitman, Pleasanton, Columbus and Yoakum. I will gather information on issues and concerns facing these communities directly from the best source possible - people who live and work in rural Texas.

As Texans, it's in our bones to believe that bigger is better, but this sentiment is going straight to our waistlines.

Our nation eats too much unhealthy food, and children are paying the consequences in the form of diabetes, high blood pressure, low self-esteem and other problems rooted in obesity. Study after study underscores the dangers of being overweight, and we must teach children that good nutrition means a longer and more fulfilling life.

With the 78th legislative session underway, we are pushing for a child nutrition package that addresses this growing epidemic. Through new legislation, the Texas Department of Agriculture's goals are to tighten the rules for school lunches and food marketing and pave the way for more fresh produce and other healthy items to replace junk food in schools. Vending machine use should be restricted, and they should offer healthier alternaand baked potato chips. Cafeterias should strive to prepare healthier food using fresh Texas produce.

Texas farmers and ranchers produce wholesome nutritious foods, and TDA works to bring these foods to schoolchildren across Texas to help combat childhood obesity - a problem that we can help solve by offering nutritious food to children and teaching them about healthy eating during the school day.



Lawsuit reform: The real consumers decide

For five months every two years, citizens get the chance to actually see if their legislators are true to the principles and promises made in their campaigns. But those who oppose the promises made by these elected public officials, and whose candidates lost their elections, often wage misinformation campaigns to intimidate legislators from making good on their campaign commitments. These opponents will try to win in the 2003 Legislature what they lost in the November 2002 elections.

The misinformation campaign against the effort to rein in abusive litigation is a perfect example. The overwhelming majority of elected officials believe that Texas should have a fair and balanced civil justice system, one in which neither the plaintiff nor the defendant has an unfair advantage. But a certain group of personal injury lawyers make literally billions of dollars by making sure the system is biased in their favor. So they call lawsuit reform "anti-consumer," and characterize reform as "the slamming of the courthouse door" or as "limiting lawsuits."

But the fact is that well crafted and well-reasoned tort reform is pro-consumer. Look at a few of

Currently many doctors are leaving Texas, or even leaving their profession, since they can no longer afford the risk of practicing medicine here. Those remaining pay huge medical insurance premiums, which then show up in higher health care costs and premiums for consumers. It is pro-consumer to protect the award of economic damages in medical malpractice

cases but to cap highly subjective non-economic damages, also known as "soft damages," so that Texans can have accessible, affordable health care. It is anti-consumer to allow a few plaintiffs and plaintiffs lawyers to hit the "lottery" and win millions at the expense of the rest of Texas con-

There is no "free lunch" for consumers in medical malpractice. When someone is awarded \$20 million, that cost is spread among all the rest of insurance consumers. The goal of litigation should be to fully and quickly compensate injured parties, not to make a few people and their lawyers instant millionaires. Also in the health care consumer's interest, we strongly support strict enforcement of medical standards of practice to protect patients from rogue practitioners.

Medical Malpractice Reform - Currently, virtually every lawsuit that a judge allows to be certified as a class action is settled because the defendant cannot afford the risk of trying such a lawsuit, even if the defendant is totally innocent. Texas juries never get to decide class action lawsuits on their merits. Outrageous settlement costs are often nothing more than legalized extortion, and are reflected in higher costs for the products and

services we all buy, lower returns on pensions and 401k plans, and fewer job opportunities for Texans. It is pro-consumer to make class certification appealable to the Supreme Court so that a consistent and equitable body of law can be created by the court.

Fair Settlements: What stops people from using lawsuits as a way to harass, punish and extort money from people or companies? In Texas, the answer is "almost nothing." Our courthouses are filled with cases that should not be there, and hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on costly and unnecessary pre-trial motions, discovery, and legal fees. It is proconsumer to institute a system in which a plaintiff who refuses to settle a case for a reasonable amount and then wins less than that amount is penalized by paying the other parties' legal fees and costs out of the proceeds of any judgment. It is also in the consumer's interest to create a system where defendants have an incentive to offer full and early settlements.

There are many other badly needed, common sense reforms to our legal system that will be debated this legislative session. These reforms will be opposed by those who profit from the system as it is today. But when you hear lawsuit reforms called "anti-consumer," look behind the attacks to the facts. Returning our court system to a place where it is appropriately used as a last resort to resolve legitimate disputes is good for the overwhelming majority of Texas' con-





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
