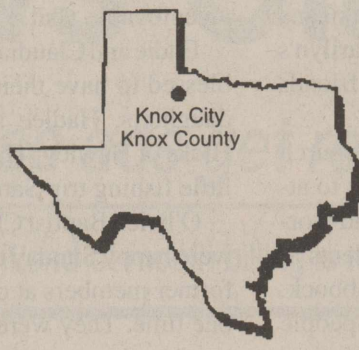

Mayor's race is only contested race Saturday

Voters are reminded to go to the polls at the Knox County Aging Center this Saturday, May 3, and cast their ballots in the contest for Knox City mayor.

Former mayor Bud Reynolds and incumbent Charles Lankford have filed for the seat.

Candidates for the two seats on the council are Darren Clark and Aaron Lewis. Councilmen J.M. Emerson and Leon Watson did not seek re-election. Holdover council members include Fred Ledesma and Domingo Garcia.

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD along with the Knox County Hospital are always included in the Joint Election. However, there are no contested races for either board.

Gene Ward and incumbent Todd Lewis are seeking the two seats on the school board. Ward had been appointed when Greg Clonts resigned to become County Judge. Holdover school board members are Dale Turner, Charlie Schur, Bill Stewart, Raul Espinosa and Scott Lynn.

Incumbent Clint Jones is the only candidate for the hospital board. Holdover members are JoAnn Albus and Jim Reid. The hospital board has three elected members and four who are appointed.

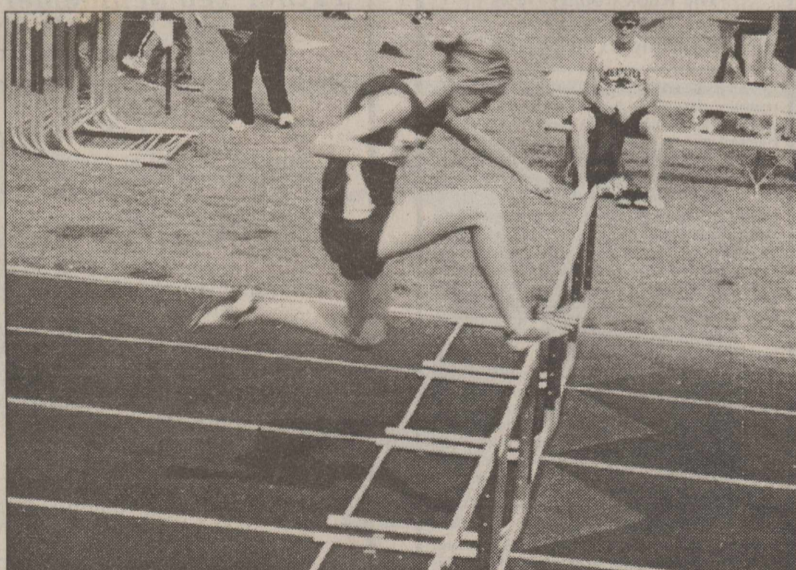

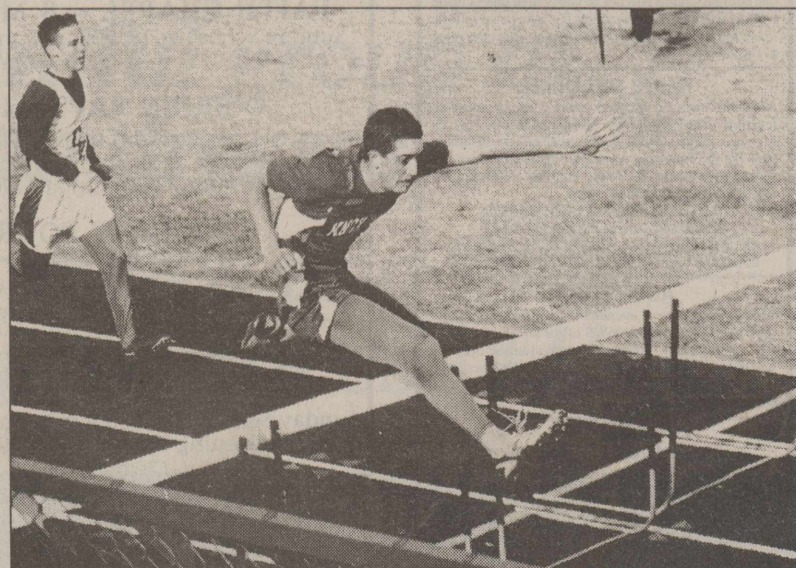

Knox City-O'Brien CISD recognized for success in implementing safety programs

Knox City-O'Brien CISD, represented by Louis Baty, Superintendent, was recognized by the West Texas Educational Insurance Association for success in implementing safety programs designed to prevent employee injuries in the workplace.

The program will provide information and starting points for talking to children about sensitive issues. Parents are strongly encouraged to attend the presentation, school officials said.

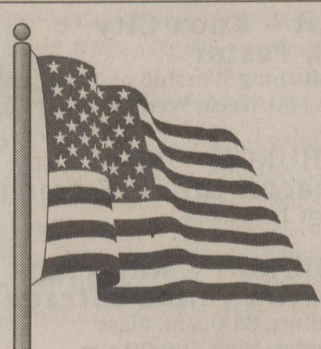
Straight Talk.....By Dave Thompson

Veeta Reid was in Fort Worth last week for a few days to visit her little new granddaughter of her daughters Angela and hus-

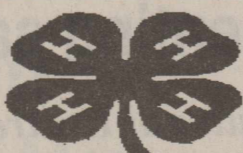
band and big brother Sam and had an enjoyable visit.

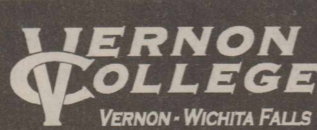
Dr. Whorl of AgriPro Wheat will discuss the wheat seed varieties that were planed and their outcome in Knox / Haskell County.
