Rochester considers merger with Knox City-O'Brien CISD

Small school district looks at second option

The tiny Rochester school district has broached consolidation with Rule and Haskell. Now, talk has turned to combining with the Knox City-O'Brien district.

Officials from both districts met last month to talk about the possibility of consolidation. The two districts have suffered declining enrollment, and Rochester school officials are worried about dwindling opportunities for their students. The district expects 105 students next year. Rochester is an agricultural community in Haskell County, about 60 miles

"We're trying to look out for the best interests of the students, faculty and the community," said Steve Self, superintendent of the Rochester Independent

School District.

The state makes consolidation attractive.

The smaller the district, the more costly it is to maintain. The state encourages

consolidation by decreasing state aid once a district's average daily attendance drops to fewer than 90 students, and offering an incentive for 10 years to the receiving district to help with the cost of educating more students.

Nearby Goree and Munday are merging their school districts this month. Voters approved their merger last fall. The consolidation was the Big Country's first since 1989-90.

Many small towns fear that consolidation and the possible closure of their schools will lead to their communities withering away. If there is a consolidation, Rochester would be the largest Big Country town to merge its school with another. Rochester had 378 people in the 2000 census.

Rochester had up to 175 students in the mid-1990s. Some classes last year had only four students, Self said. Still, Rochester offered six-man football and other sports, yearbook and theater. Its one-act play troupe advanced to the Rochester may be unable to offer as many activities for students if the district keeps shrinking, Self said. The possibility of more opportunities prompted school officials to begin shopping for a district with which Rochester

could consolidate. Talks with Rule, 10 miles south of Rochester, fell through two years ago. Last year, consolidation discussion turned

to Haskell, 17 miles southeast. Self said combining with Haskell has not been ruled out. "We're still talking to them," he said.

Self said he is impressed with how the Knox City-O'Brien district is willing

to work with Rochester. Knox City and O'Brien consolidated in 1976. Knox City is eight miles north of Rochester. The district has about 300

The district's high school principal, Mack Lowe, said combining with Rochester would benefit both districts because it would boost student numbers.

"All little schools are about in the same boat as enrollment is dropping," he said. Self said Rochester is interested in the best deal for everyone involved - more choices for students, jobs for faculty and, perhaps, keeping the campus open for the community. The district has one campus with eight buildings. The district

is not in "dire straits" that would force it to combine with another school system, Self said. Rochester may decide not

"We could be staying like we are," he said. "It's something we want to explore." Rochester will have a community meeting in August so school officials can explain what is happening with the district,


Self said. A consolidation must be voted on by citizens in both districts.

If the consolidation passes, the earliest the districts would combine would be in the 2004-05 school year.



Natalie, Landon return from three weeks in Great Britain with Newcombe tennis team







The Knox County News has completed the changeout of the camera system that we use to take photographs. We have made a complete switch to digital photographs for everything we cover, including all community, school, sports and other news events that we take pictures at. This change will result in a financial savings as we will no longer need to purchase film or pay to have the film developed and printed. Because of this change, we will no longer have print photographs for sale here in the NEWS office for parents, students, KCHS Annual Staff, etc. The demand for prints has reduced sharply in recent years and we can no longer justify the cost of developing and printing so many photographs. When the purchasing arrangements are made here in the office, we will send the jpeg photograph to the customer's e-mail address anywhere in the world by electronic mail.

As we have always done, we will still accept print film photographs for scanning and reproduction in stories and advertisements. This new change to digital will not affect photos brought in to us for publication.

Straight Talk

Insurance

For those who have never had to deal with an insurance company, be glad... very, very glad. If you have had to file a claim, you may have already experienced some of the things we have faced in the last month or so.

After paying very high prices that keep going up every year, we needed the medical insurance when I had my motorcycle accident back in April. Thankful that we had the coverage, we are also scratching our heads at the absurd letters we get in the mail almost every day as one bill after another is denied.

This weekend's mail brought the ultimate in absurdity when we opened a letter that said the bill submitted by the medical equipment rental company had been denied by the insurance company as "not medically necessary". Now, here is what they considered as "medically not necessary": My right leg was broken in 10 places, so I could not walk. All of the ribs on my right side were broken, several front and rear both. My right collarbone was broken, as was my sternum. Because of those injuries, I could not use crutches or a walker as I could not use my upper body to support any weight, so a wheelchair was needed. In order to get into my house, a ramp was needed because of the three steps out front. Because of the upper body injuries, I could not lay flat in bed, and had to use an overhead bar to aid in getting out of bed. A hospital bed was brought in so I could sleep at night.

Before I was allowed to be dismissed from the rehab hospital in Abilene, the wheelchair, ramp, and hospital bed had to be in place. It was the job of one employee there to assist us in securing those items and to make sure they were ready before I was released to go home. Now, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas has deemed them "not medically necessary." Pardon me? How did they expect me to survive once I got home? Or would they rather I stayed in the hospital for another month? In order to survive, those items were 'medically necessary" !! We can appeal and have the doctor send in a 'letter of medical necessity', but that is just more needless hassle that Blue Cross and Blue Shield seems to thrive on.

Another thing we learned the hard way in the last couple of weeks involves the 'amount of coverage' for certain things. When we set the policy up, we specifically asked the agent if the policy covered (a) my riding a motorcycle, and (b) medical helicopter flights, since they are used more and more out here in the wide open spaces of north Texas. The reply was "yes, you are covered". With that in mind, imagine our shock when we received a letter from Blue Cross and Blue Shield stating they had paid \$1,400 on a medical helicopter bill of over \$9,000.... and we owed the rest. In a not so nice phone call to the claims department, we were told that technically the agent was right, we were 'covered', but the amount of coverage was only "up to \$1,500." We were also told that the insurance company is not responsible for what an agent says, they are only responsible for what is in print on the policy we received. Adding insult, the lady

on the phone stated that it was my fault if I did not read all the fine print on the policy. Hmmm.... I had to hold my tongue on that one because she was right. What I was guilty of was small town thinking... taking the word of my agent at face value when he handed me the policy, then putting it in my desk drawer, unread because of small town trust.

So folks, after you read this I hope you will take heed and pull your insurance policies out of wherever you have them stored and read them.... in detail! We all know how many times the medical helicopters fly in and out of Knox city as they transport patients to larger facilities..... would you be covered if it was you or a family member being airlifted out? If you have questions, ask your agent to explain it to your satisfaction. Even if they have to call the company direct, the answer to any question can be obtained. If there is a hassle with the company in finding out information, let your agent deal with it.... they get paid to do just that.

The bottom line is that I hope you know what coverage you have... before you need it and find out the hard way that doing business the old fashioned 'good old boy' way doesn't cut it any more.

In conclusion, let me make it clear that I am not knocking any of our local insurance agents or agencies. I feel that we are fortunate to have insurance agents in our community who do care very much for their customers. Often, they are just as frustrated with the large companies as their policy holders are. The point I am trying to make is that each of us, as consumers, have to be very aware these days because the big insurance companies are not playing by 'the good old boy' rules anymore. They are motivated only by profit and the more they can turn the screws and have customers paying outrageous sums of money for services they thought were covered, the more profit they

USDA accepting applications for grassland reserve program

Financial assistance for the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) is now available to eligible landowners. GRP is authorized by the Food Security Act of 1985, as amended by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002. The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) administer the program, in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service. Funding for the GRP comes from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC).

According to Dr. Larry D. Butler, NRCS State Conservationist, "This voluntary program helps landowners and operators restore and protest grassland, including rangeland and pastureland, and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as grazing lands. The program emphasizes support for grazing operations, plant and animal biodiversity, and grassland



To participate in GRP, offers must be private land that includes at least 40 contiguous acres. Participants voluntarily limit future use of the land while retaining the right to conduct common grazing practices; produce hay, mow, or harvest for seed production (subject to certain restrictions during the nesting season of bird species that are in significant decline or those that are protected under Federal or State law); conduct fire rehabilitation; and construct firebreaks and fences.

Applications for participation will be accepted on a continuous basis with the local office of NRCS or FSA. For the current funding cycle, an application must be received by August 1, 2003. All applications received by that date will be ranked on specific selection criteria to ensure only the highest priority areas (lands) are protected. Once funding has been exhausted, eligible applications will remain on file until additional funding becomes available. Applications accepted after August 1, 2003, will be held for ranking during the next funding cycle.


