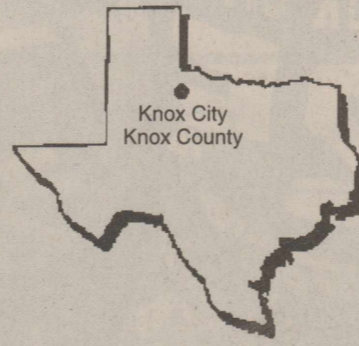

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Houndettes respond to new coach, 2003 season off to a strong start

KC Houndettes opened their season on Tuesday, September 19, 2003. We were off to a start... although it was a rough one. Needless to say, JV was defeated by Albany's JV soundly. The Varsity participated in a dual playing Gorman first and being defeated in 3. The scores were 21-25, G; 25-12, G; and 15-25, G. Against Albany it was the same story with scores of 16-25, A; 17-25, A; 17-25, A. Some good things did happen during the games, despite the fact that you cannot tell from the scores. The main thing that happened, was that the girls got fired up and decided they did not like losing. It made them hungry for a win, thus it made them realize that they had to come into the gym every day with their heads in practice. They did, and it led us to victory on Sat.

Junior Varsity Notes

The JV girls did extremely well. Although we did not show we won on the scoreboard, we are winning the battle of improving. I told my girls that I want them to learn to play the actual game of volleyball rather than jungle ball and once-over. They did everything I asked them to do, and it will benefit them tremendously, especially at the Varsity level, which is really what it is most important. In the long run, it will produce victories for the KC Houndettes. Unfortunately, when the other team plays jungle ball, it is hard for my girls to do all the things I'm telling them to do without reverting to their old ways. There is also the new scoring system and rules this year that my girls are having to adjust to. The

new scoring is as follows: We now play best out of 5, (unless it is JV, and then it is best out of 3) rally score, each game to 25. The team must win by two points still, but there is a cap of 30 points. If a 5th (or 3rd) game is needed, it is rally score to 15, and you must win by 2. Rally scoring simply means every ball is a point, and a team does not have to possess the serve in order to score. The other big rule change is Let Serves. If a ball hits the net on a serve, but goes over, it is considered legal play. So we have to get ready for those that barely roll over, etc.

Sondra Silva was our biggest scorer serving 5 in a row the first game and 15 in a row the second game. She was big at the net and does a good job of leading my JV squad. She's a player who could very possibly see some Varsity floor-time before the season ends. Vanessa Solis, Kursten Stafford, Erika Nevarez, and April Megana were also very strong at the net offensively and defensively. Erika and April are my JV setters and are coming along very well. Laura Harrington missed the first two weeks of practice due to surgery, but has come back with great heart and want to, and regardless of the missed practice is picking up the offenses and defenses and getting her skills down very well. The final score of the matches were 17-25, LA; 25-7, KC; and 10-15, LA.

Varsity Notes

The first home game turned out to be a victory for the Varsity Houndettes... but not by luck. The girls played exceptionally well for all of the new stuff I've been throwing at them. They did everything

I asked them, and even though there were times when LA made a run, my girls stuck to doing things the way we've been practicing and in the end, prevailed. We look like a totally different team than we did on Tuesday and I know we'll only continue to improve. Bridgett Billington was our big server claiming more than 6 points for KC in each game. Bridgett and Tiffany Wilde had numerous assists and excellent hands as our setters. Nikki Moss, Sam Gutierrez, Brittany Hawkins, and Jodi Chambers were our strong hitters averaging about 3 kills per game. Defensively, we did extremely well getting to our new base positions and digging up some hard hit balls. Lindsey Villa and Lindsey Penman were big factors in our backrow game. April Megana came in as our relief setter and did an excellent job of getting the ball to our hitters. The final scores for the match were 25-21, KC; 25-10, KC; and 25-19, KC.

The team and myself want to thank EVERYONE for coming and we hope to see you at the next game. This weeks schedule is: Thursday and Saturday at Albany. Thursday will only be Varsity pool play and we will begin at 11:40. Saturday will be JV and Varsity tourney play beginning at 8:00 in the morning.

Tuesday, September 2, we will play at home against Rochester. It will only be JH and Varsity and will begin at 5:30. The Albany Tourney will be tough and Rochester will begin our district play. We will need all the support we can get so come out and support the Houndettes!



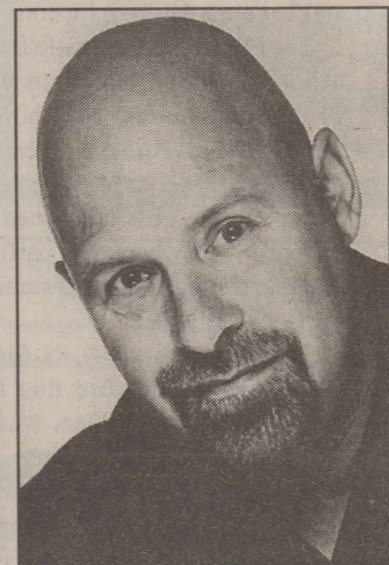

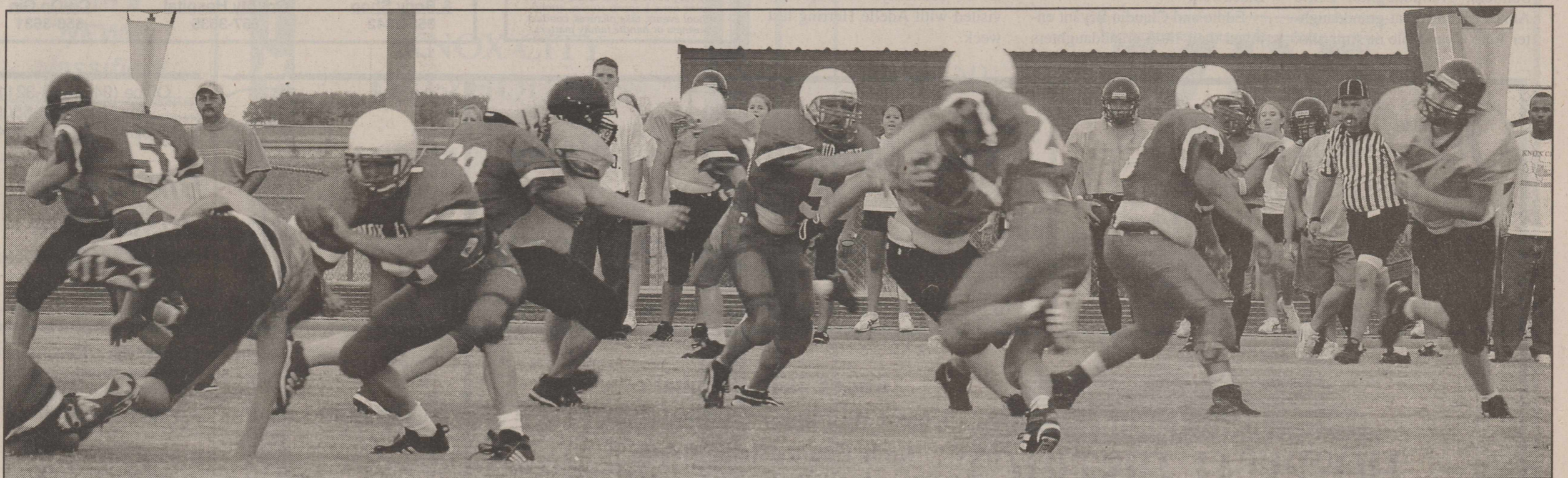
He is scheduled to speak in school assemblies on Thursday of this week.

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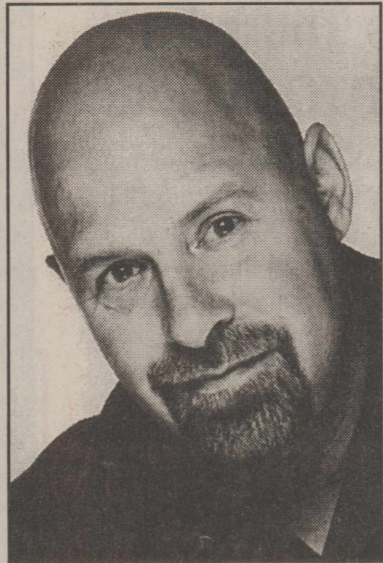

Now, as director of Gregg Martinez Outreach, he impacts lives and urges young people to make the right choices in life. He shares his story and talents through his school assembly called Generation Next, Born Choosers.

He performs concerts in churches, at youth rallies, and festivals across the U.S. and is in great demand.

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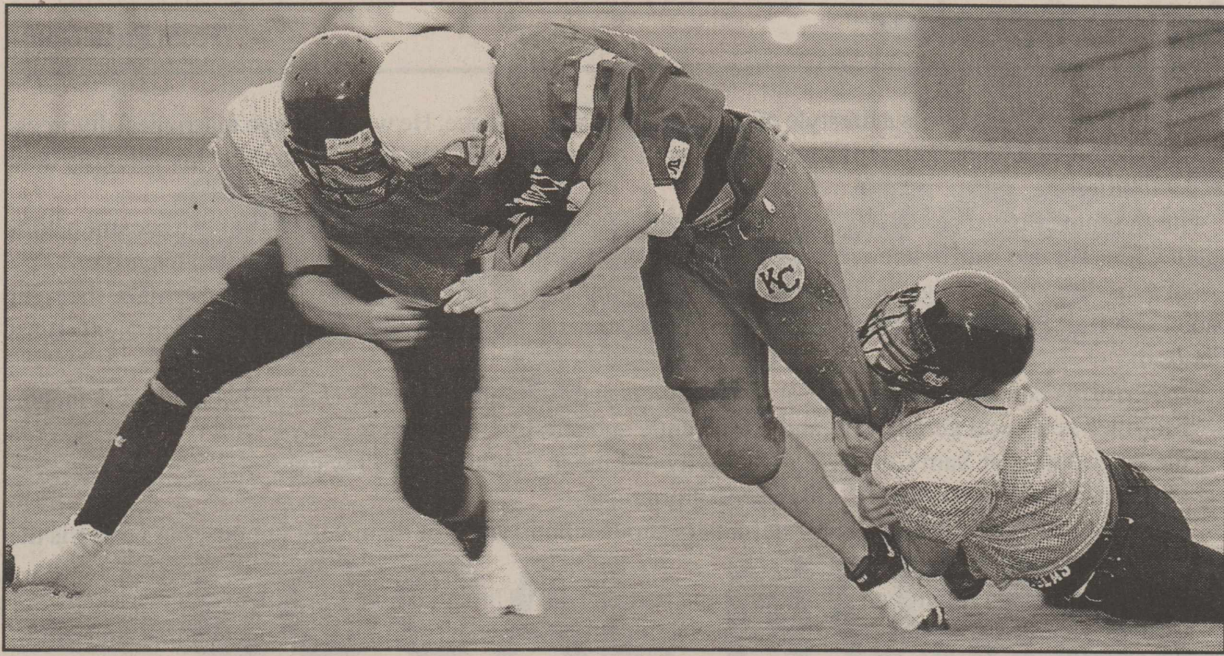

All elementary school parents are invited and encouraged to come and get involved.

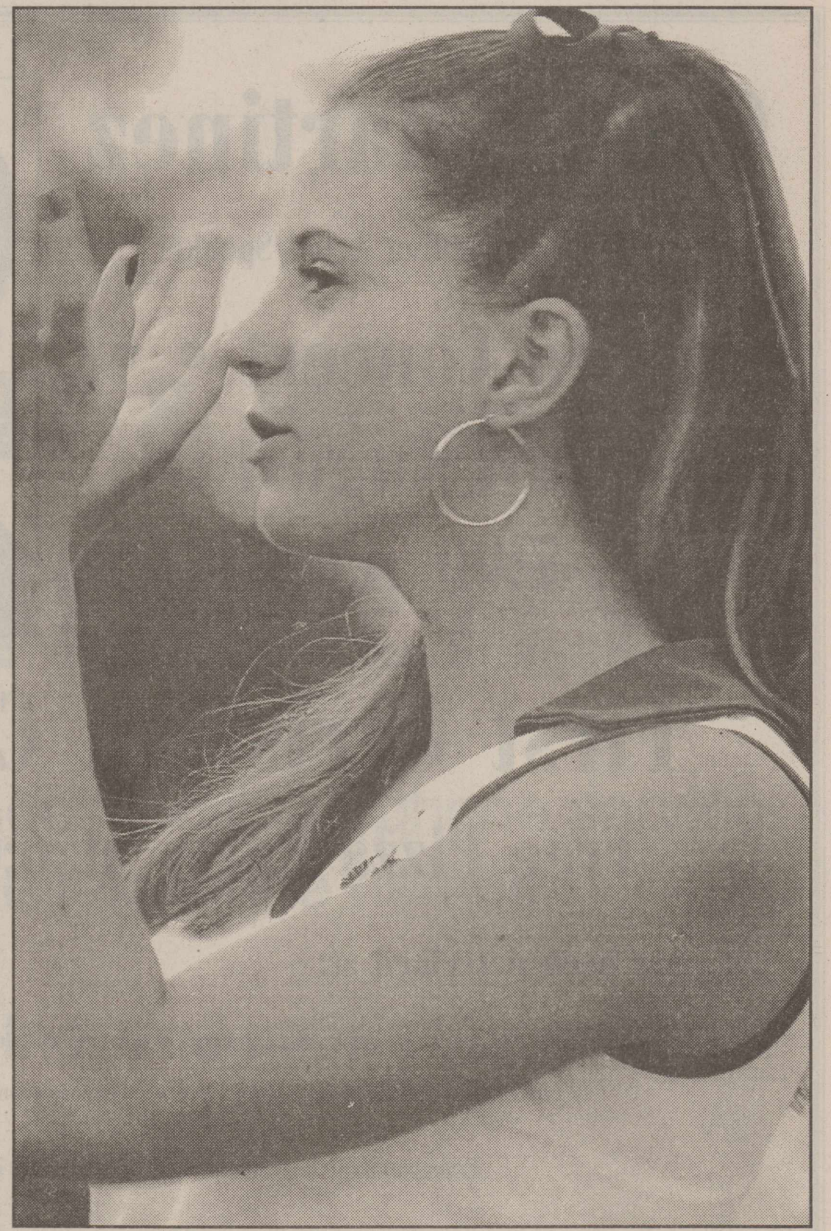

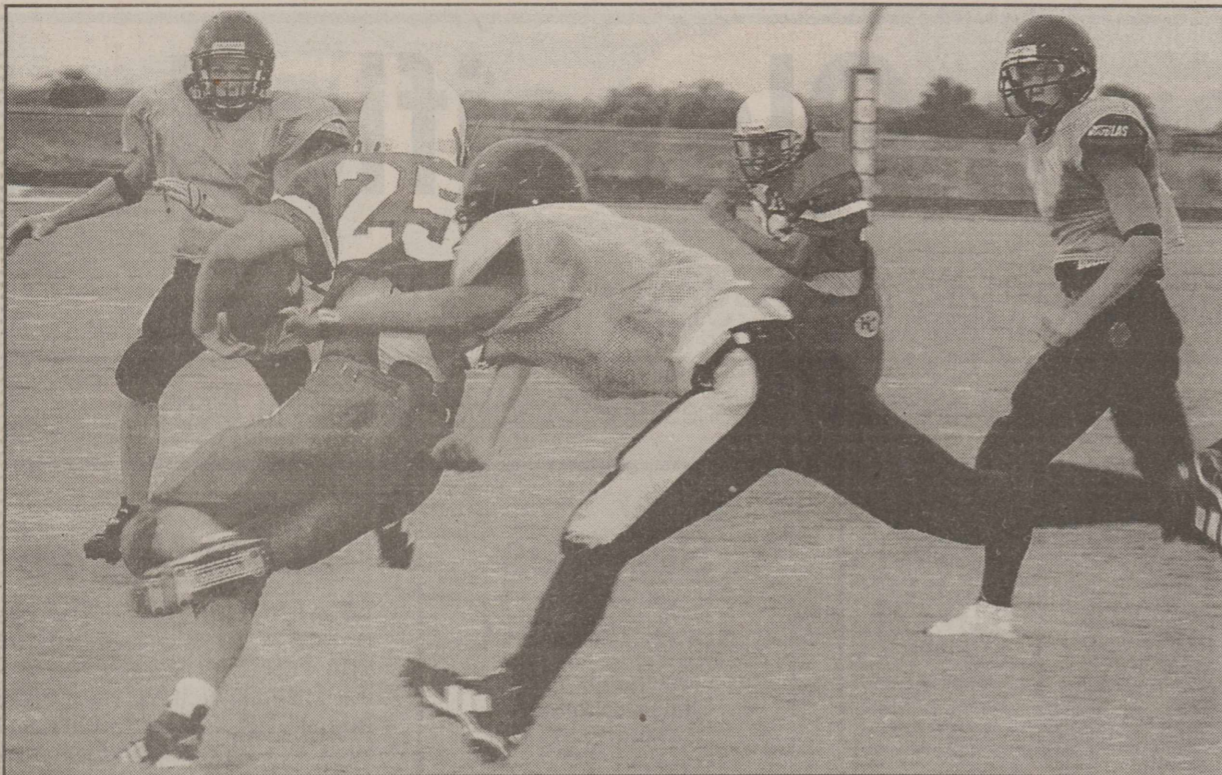
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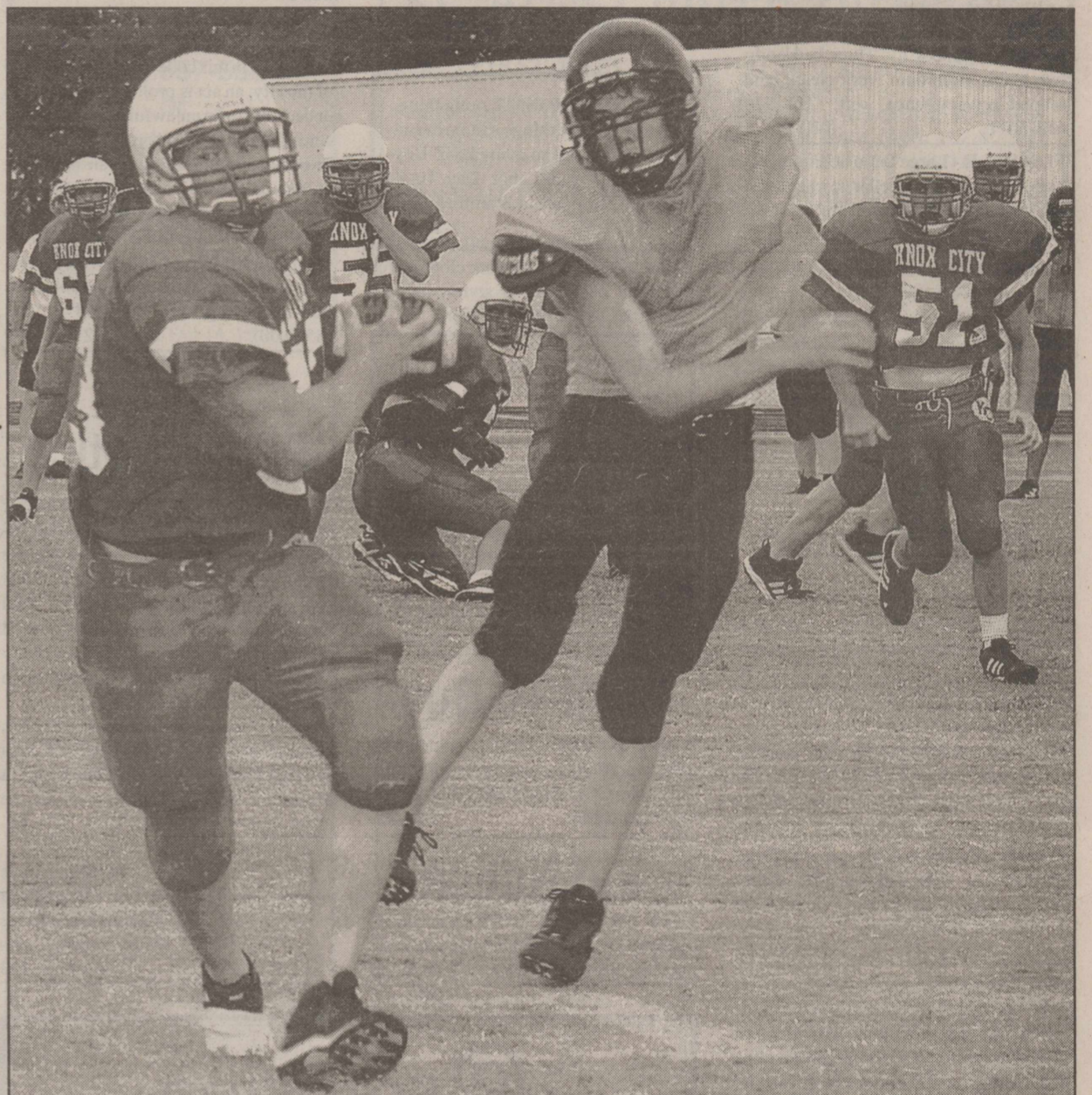
