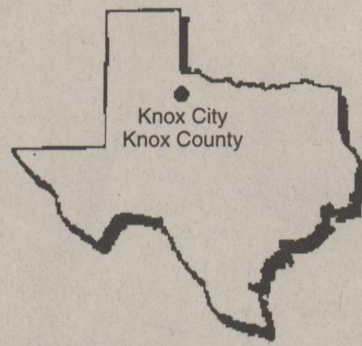

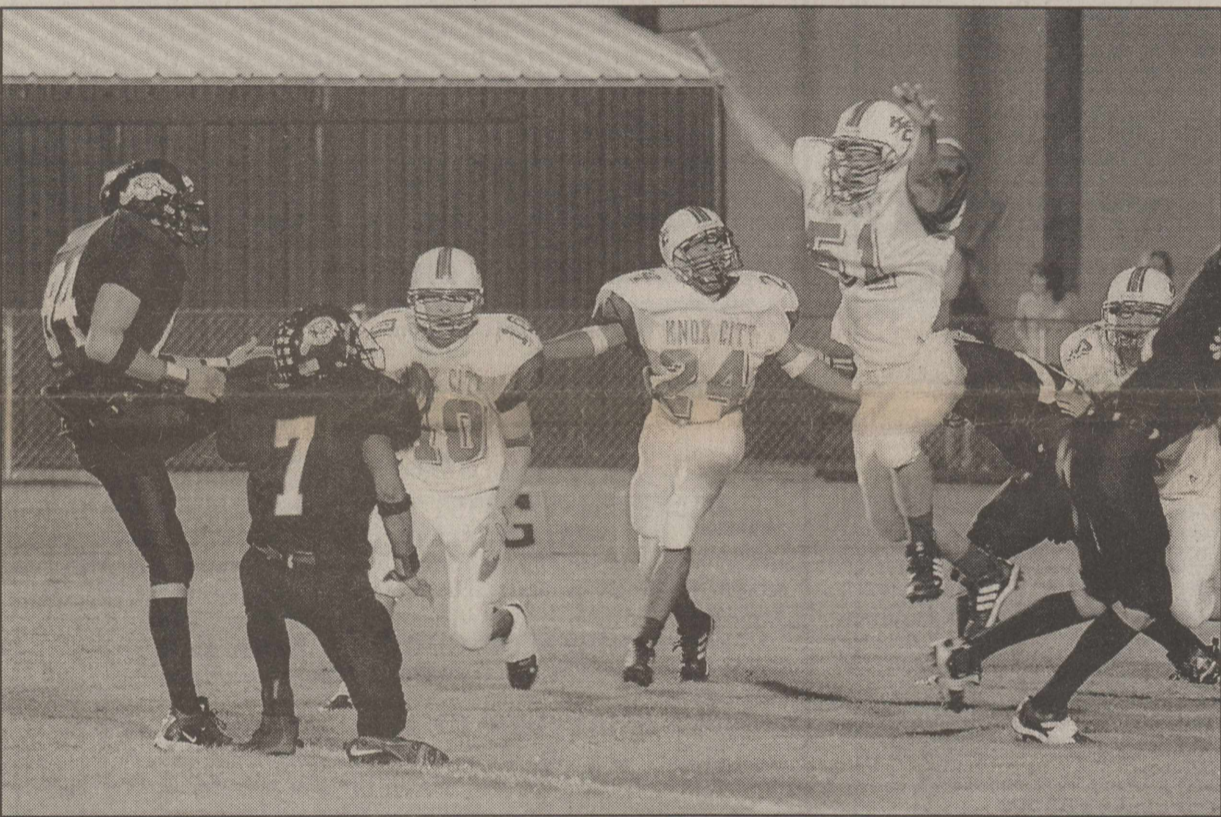

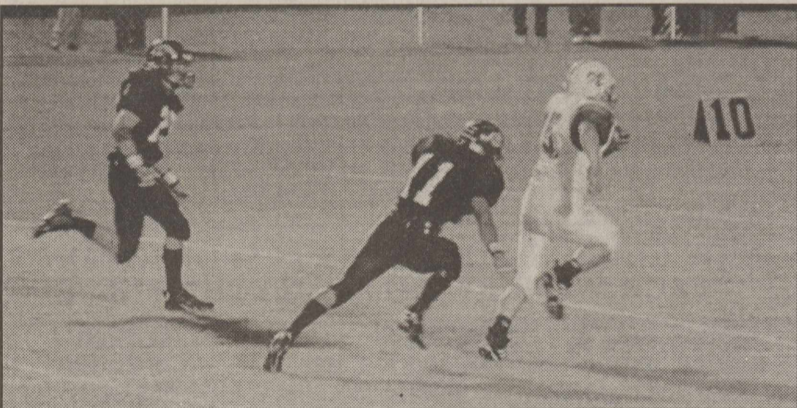

## Blood supply experiencing critical shortage, Meek Blood Bloodmobile to visit Monday

The Knox County Hospital Auxiliary will sponsor a community blood drive on Monday, September 22. The Meek Blood Center Bloodmobile will be parked at Knox County Hospital from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. Meek Blood Center supplies blood to Knox County Hospital and 15 other medical facilities in the Texas Midwest.

"The entire nation is experiencing a very critical blood shortage at this time. Meek Blood Center has been fortunate to have an adequate blood supply until recently," Frances Baker, donor recruiter, said. "Our blood supply has been critical since Labor Day. I am asking the people of Knox County to roll up their sleeves and help save lives."

The blood supply is dependent on volunteer donors. Donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and in good health, Aspirin, and most maintenance medications, including blood pressure, cholesterol, thyroid, hormones and anti-depressants are acceptable. Diabetics who are not insulin-dependent are also acceptable. There are some restrictions regarding some medications, certain medical conditions and some travel areas outside the U.S.

Those who have questions regarding donor eligibility may call Meek Blood Center at 325-670-2805. Donors are asked to eat a meal and drink plenty of fluids prior to giving blood.

Each donor will receive a coffee mug and a complimentary total cholesterol reading.

A test for West Nile Virus will also be done at no charge with written permission from the donor. Results on both tests may be obtained two days after the blood drive by calling 325-670-2799.

## Bike-a-thon planned for September 27

The Knox City "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon to be held Saturday, September 27, at 9:00 a.m. in front of the Knox City Elementary has been announced by St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Nominees for Miss Firelighter are senior Ariana Gomez, sophomore Meagan Schur and sophomore Nikki Moss.

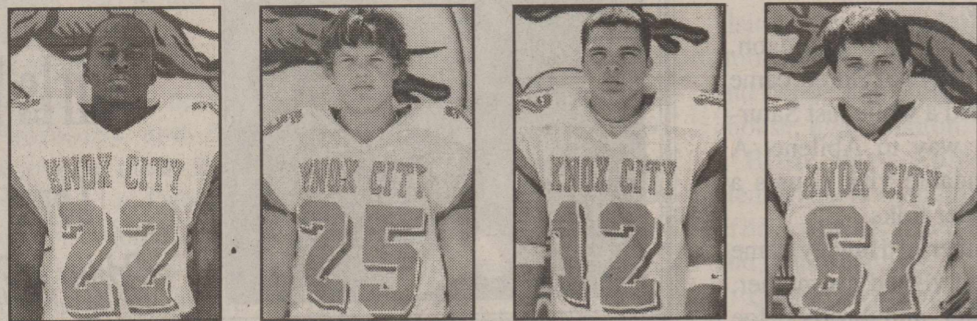
Band Sweetheart nominees are seniors Jodi Chambers, Ariana Gomez, Krystal Hutchinson and Sondra Lankford.

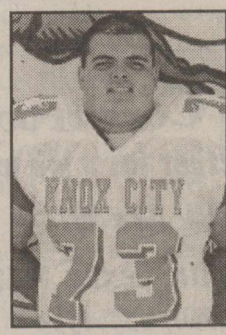

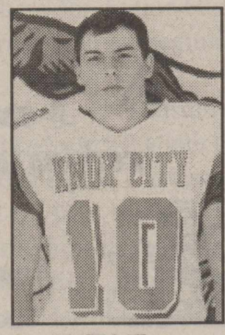

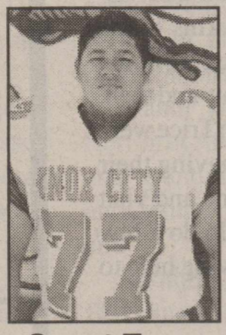

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**Food Pantry beginning 4th year of service**

The Knox County Food Pantry is beginning its fourth year of service for low income individuals and families of Knox and Haskell Counties. The pantry served 79 households last month with a total of 181 people benefiting from the program.

To qualify for assistance, an application form must be filled out and income guidelines must be met. Proof of income must be given. This service is for Knox City, Benjamin, O'Brien and Rochester residents only. Those registering are asked to bring proof of the following: Income - Salary, TANF/AFDC, Food Stamps, SSI, Medicaid, and other.

The pantry, sponsored by the Women In Action of the First Baptist Church of Knox City, is supported by charitable donations from people, businesses and churches of the community. David Counts has donated the use of the building.

The First Baptist Church bible school and "Cross Roads", as well as the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Brownies, have helped with food drives to collect canned goods. The Knox City-O'Brien schools have held contests in the past to collect food during the holiday season.

The Food Pantry pays 16 cents a pound with 75% of the food being free. Last month's food cost was only \$16. The largest expense associated with the operation of the pantry is utility expenses.

Those wishing to help with these expenses are asked to bring their generous donation to the food pantry on the days it is open or send the month to The Knox County Food Pantry, % First Baptist Church, Box 355, Knox City, TX 79529.

**USDA livestock assistance program to help livestock producers sign-up is now underway**

Knox County livestock producers who have suffered grazing losses caused by natural disasters will find some relief through the Livestock Assistance Program (LAP) offered by the USDA, Farm Service Agency (FSA).

"This program provides additional relief to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses due to severe weather and related causes," said Michael McDonald, County Executive Director.

To date, the Knox County Office has received 10 applications from producers seeking relief. The LAP sign-up period began August 6 and ends October 24, 2003.

"LAP is intended to address the needs of producers who were not adequately covered by the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP), but producers cannot receive payments under both programs for the same loss," McDonald said.

McDonald added, a producer's LAP payment will be reduced by the amount(s) the producer received under 2002 Cattle Feed Program, Livestock Compensation Program - I and Livestock Compensation Program - II regardless of whether the LAP payment is for 2001 or 2002.

Authorized by the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, LAP pro-

vides \$250 million, nationwide, to livestock producers for grazing losses that occurred in either 2001 or 2002.

Under LAP, a producer's grazing land must be located in a county that was declared a primary disaster area under a Presidential or Secretarial declaration. The county must have been approved after January 1, 2001, and a designation requested no later than February 20, 2003, and subsequently approved. Contiguous counties are not eligible.

For those counties designated as a disaster area for 2001 or 2002, additional LAP eligibility criteria must be met for each year. A county must have experienced an average of 40 percent or greater loss of normal precipitation for four consecutive months during the applicable year and suffered at least a 40 percent grazing loss for three or more consecutive months in a calendar year in order to be eligible for that year.

A county may meet eligibility requirements for both 2001 and 2002; however, a producer in that county may receive a LAP payment for only one of the years.

Although LAP is a grazing loss program, payments are based on the lesser of the calculated pasture value or the value of live-

stock feed allowance multiplied by the producer's maximum grazing loss. The eligible amount is 50 percent of the loss amount. A producer must have control of adequate grazing land to support the eligible livestock.

During 2001 or 2002, a livestock producer must have suffered a 40 percent or greater loss of grazing production for three or more consecutive months due to drought, hot weather, disease, insect infestation, flood, fire, hurricane, earthquake, severe storm or other natural disasters.

"Because funding for LAP is limited, a national factor will apply," said McDonald. "This factor will be announced after the sign-up period ends."

The 2003 Act requires that an adjusted gross income (AGI) limitation apply - a change from previous LAP provisions. A \$40,000 payment limitation also applies to LAP assistance.

The total value of all applications will be determined and, if in excess of \$250 million, will be adjusted proportionately.

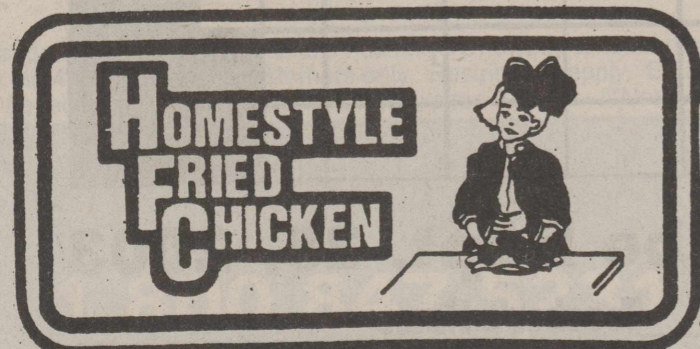

- Making a cash gift to Rehab if this is the wrong time of year to cut out an animal to donate

• Notifying Rehab or a local chairman now of an intent to have an auction house cut a check to Rehab for one or more animals sold later in the year.

There are eight sales with the Abilene sale taking place September 23.

Chris, Tammy and Kyla Lindley of Abilene visited with Don Brothers and Charlene Broth-

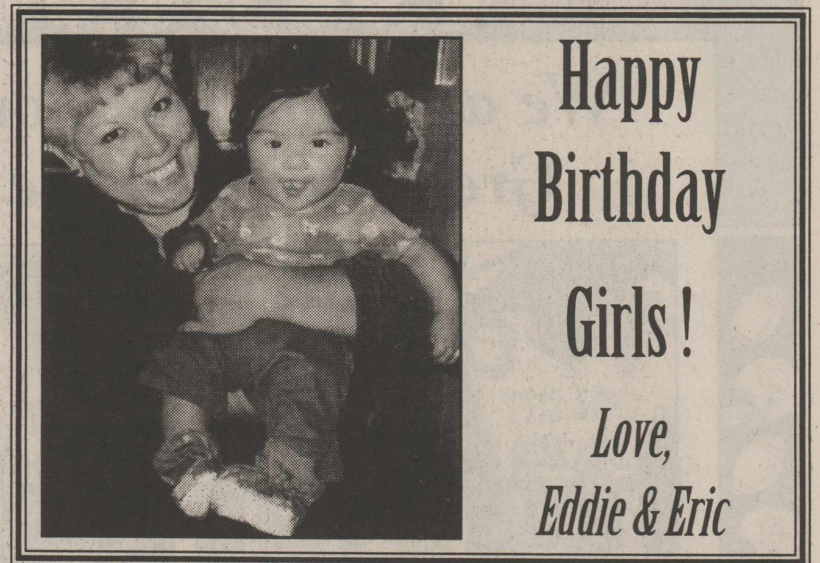
ers Sunday. This was the first visit Kyla has made to see her grandpa, Don. She slept most of the time, but does weigh six pounds now.

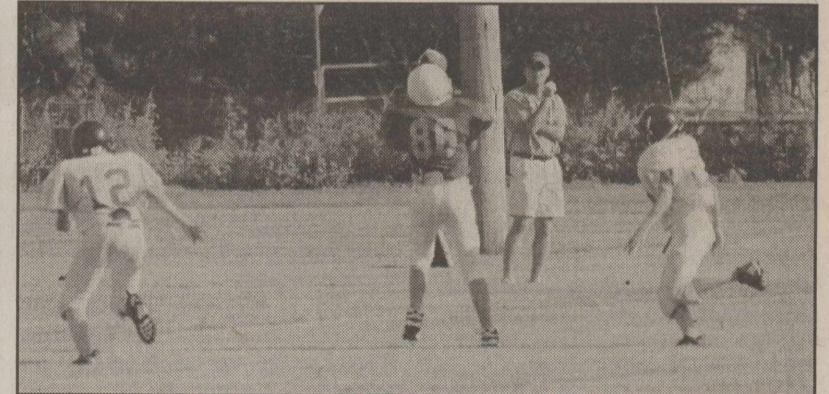

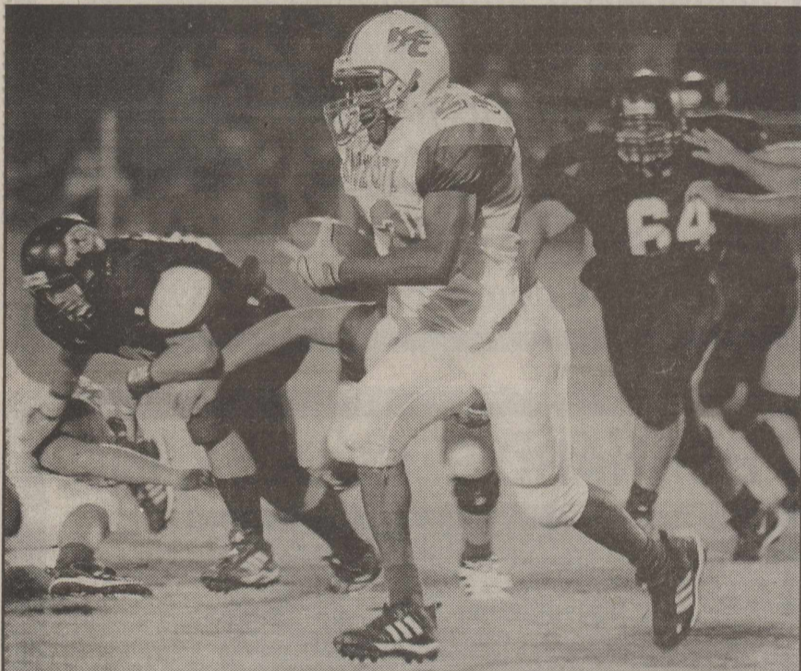
